#### DISTRICT NO 1.

The three schools in district No. 1 the past year have been divided into three terms of ten weeks each. all in session at the same time. I will say, that in the first grade, our scholars show better improvement than ever befroe. For many years we have had excellent teachers in this department, and if I report more progress this year, it is no reflection upon former teachers, but a proof, that the employment of the best teachers ensures continual improvement. With a proper school room, suitably furnished, and gool surroundings, this grade is better for our scholars than any Academy in the state. Now, it is a miserable, unhealthy place, and prevents in a great degree, that improvement which should result from our expenditures.

The four last were tardy once from snow drifts.

Of the second grade, I will say, we have never had better progress. The teacher is particularly suited to the necessities of the scholars, and in my opinion can do better for this school than any new teacher. Here, too, the school room is unsuitable, unfurnished, badly located, and inadequate for the accommodation of so many pupils the seats being too low, and very uncomfortable in many respects.

In the third grade, for the last six terms, we have had wonderfully good management. The pupils have shown vast impaovement, having been taught a great variety of matters, all of importance to the infint mind, and in such a manner as to keep them continually employed without wearying. The first term this year was taught by Miss Alice F. Hinkley, and gave perfect satisfaction. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Anna G. Clement, and I can truly say. I have never spent a half day in visiting schools with more interest than in this department. Even, in the matter of penmanship, these little minds are profitably employed, and show much improvement. Here, also, the room and surroundingr are miserable, unhealthy, and too small, In this department there are more than fifty scholars. In district No. 1 to properly expend our school money, and give the pupils the best schooling, we should have four grades, good rooms, well furnished, to convene them in, and such teachers as we have employed for the last few years. Then, for our money we should give to our children as good schools as any in the State.

#### DISTRICT NO. 2.

In this district there has been two terms of six weeks each. The teacher was well qualified and faithful, the pupils attentive, orderly and showed good improvement.

#### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Here they have had two terms only; the first of eight, and the second of ten weeks. This is a union district of Ashland and Holderness, with a good school room, and retired and pleasant surroundings. The same teacher has been employed for a number of terms past, with bennfit, as the scholars show marked improvement, and the result of good discipline.

#### DISTRICT NO. 4.

This district has been united with No. 5, it has a new shool hou well situated, and with more furniture, black boards, etc. it wou be a convenient school room. There has been only one term thirteen weeks and a fraction this year. The teacher did her duties well, she is qualified, and faithfull; the scholars, or their parents are faulty in their relations to the school; as more than half of the puplis have been absent nearly half the time. No one can get much profit besides being an actual injury to others in their classes, from such irregular attendance, and it behooves the parents to look well to this matter, and insist upon their children attending promptly and regularly.

#### DISTRICT NO. 6.

Here, there has been only one term, of ten weeks; this year, this is a union school with Center Harbor, and New Hampton, there is a fair schoal room, it being somewhat broken, and having no apparatus. The teacher was well qualified and indefatigable in her duties. The pupils show fair progress.
