# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION,

IN DISTRICT NO. 1.

The money for educational purposes the past year amounted to \$1474. 54, affording schools for 33 weeks, which was divided into three terms of 11 weeks each. The teachers of the four departments were severally paid \$13, \$9, \$8 and \$7 per week.

Of 194 different pupils there was an average attendance of 151.

The prevalence of whooping cough and mumps was unfavorable to the regular attendance, as will be seen by the average attendance compared with last year. The change of teachers was unavoidable. The Board consider the district and themselves fortunate in securing the services of industrious and faithful teachers. Parents and residents of the district continue to manifest a lively interest in the welfare of the schools.

TO THE TOWN OF ASHLAND :

In compliance with the laws of the state, I herewith submit the following report of the schools of the town district for the year 1886.

The money for educational purposes the past year amounted to \$158, affording schools for fifteen weeks, which was divided into a summer and fall term of seven and eight weeks respectively.

The summer term in what was formerly district No. 2, was taught by Miss Nettie L. Rogers of Plymouth. Whole number of scholars, 11; average attendance, 11; classed as follows: reading, 11; spelling, 11; arithmetic, 9; geography, 3; grammar, 2; penmanship, 9. The Roll of Honor for this term was Jennie A. Currier, Alice M. Currier, Alson B. Currier, Herbert Jones, Della Jones. Number of visitors, 9. The fall term was taught by the same teacher, and the whole number of scholars registered was 12; average number belonging to the school, 11; average attendance, 10. The classification was the same as for the summer term. The Roll of Honor comprised the names of Jennie A. Currier, Alice M. Currier, Alson B. Currier, Fred E. Currier. Number of visitors, 9. Miss Rogers is a young but energetic teacher, who went about her duties determined to achieve success. Her discipline was mild yet firm, and she succeeded in gaining the confidence of



her pupils and inspired them with a thirst for knowledge. The closing examinations of both the summer and fall terms attested well to the success of her efforts. The register was well kept.

The summer term in what was formerly district No. 4 was taught by Miss S. Helen Stickney, of Campton. Whole number of pupils, 13; average attendance, 13; classed as follows: reading, 13; spelling, 13; arithmetic, 12; geography, 6; grammar, 2; physiology, 2; penmanship, 8. The Roll of Honor was as follows: Stella M. Leavitt, Madge Pease, Roxy J. Sanborn, Lulu B. Sanborn, Mabel M. Sargent, Frank B. Eastman, Harry E. Leavitt, Horace Leavitt, Harl Pease, John B. Wadleigh. Number of visitors, 9. Miss Stickney is a teacher of considerable experience and a maintainer of order, and under her instructions the school prospered. The exercises at the close of the school showed a marked improvement, and it was much to be regretted that the term was of necessity so short. The fall term was taught by Miss Mary E. Webster of Centre Harbor. Whole number of scholars, 13; average number belonging to the school, 12; average attendance, 11; classed as follows: reading, 13; spelling, 13; arithmetic, 12; geography, 7; grammar, 2; physiology, 2; penmanship, 11. The Roll of Honor for the term was Mabel M. Sargent, Roxy J. Sanborn, Lulu B. Sanborn. Number of visitors, 9. Register well kept. Miss Webster seems endowed with patience, perseverance and thoroughness, three requisite qualifications in a teacher, and has for her motto, "Not how much, but how well." She soon acquired the respect and esteem of parents and pupils, and thus secured that cooperation which is so essential to the best results. The closing examination fully equalled my expectation, and in my anticipation of a good school, I was not disappointed.

We had four scholars who attended the school taught by Miss Emma H. Gordon, in what was formerly the Union district in New Hampton. This school was in session 8 weeks, being sustained in part by contributions from citizens of the

district. I visited the school at the commencement of the fifth week, and found the pupils attentive to study, and a manifest desire on the part of all for a profitable term. I saw no reason why good results should not be secured. I did not make a second visit, but have been informed that the work accomplished was creditable to both teacher and scholars.
