



Board of Education in District No. 1.

The sum of \$1,618.32 was expended the past year for the support of schools. Length of schools 32 weeks, divided into three terms, one of 10 weeks and two of 11 weeks each. Wages of teachers,\$51, \$40, \$36, \$32, and \$28, per month.

Whole No. of different pupils registered 236. Average daily fattendance, 132.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

3 terms taught by Miss Grace T. Bailey. Whole No. of different pupils registered, 93; average daily attendance, 45.

INTERMEDIATE.

3 terms. 1st taught by Miss Susie W. Child, 2d and 3d terms taught by Miss Cora McDaniels. Whole No. of different pupils registered, 58; average daily attendance, 32.

LOWER GRAMMAR.

3 terms. 1st term taught by Miss Mary C. Jones, 2d and 3d terms taught by Miss Alice L. Knox. Whole No. of different pupils registered, 50; average daily attendance, 32.

HIGHER GRAMMAR.

3 terms. 1st term taught by Miss Agnes T. Fay, 2d and 3d terms taught by D. W. C. Durgin. Whole No. of different pupils registered, 35; average daily attendance, 23.

By reason of the presence of the measles in nearly every family in the district, the average attendance for the last term does not compare favorably with the previous terms.

The most serious obstacle to the success of our schools has been the irregular attendance. The days and half days of absence, of dismissals, and of tardiness is amazing. Can it be true that the parents know of all this, or were they too busy with other cares to give proper attention to the education of the children? And thus the precious hours for laving the foundation of mental discipline are allowed to be wasted in less important pursuits. With well equipped school-rooms, intelligent, industrious and faithful teachers to make the schools a success, the parents must take interest enough in the education of their children to know that they attend punctually and promptly the sessions of the schools. The 453 visits from parents, citizens and others, serve to encourage and strengthen the teachers in their responsible work. A better acquaintance with our schools, and with our toiling and self-sacrificing teachers, could not fail to arouse an interest in education that would be lasting.

School Report.

To the Town of Ashland:

I herewith submit the following report of the schools of the town district for the year 1887.

The school at the Pease school-house, so called, was taught by Mary E. Webster, of Centre Harbot, who taught this school in the Fall of 1886. In the Summer term which consisted of eight weeks, the whole number of pupils registered was 15, average attendance, 10, classed as follows: reading 10, penmanship, 9, arithmetic, 10, geography, 7.

The Roll of Honor for this term was Harry E. Leavitt. Mabel Leavitt, Harl Pease, Roxey J. Sanborn, Etta M. Sanborn. Number of visitors 10. The fall term likewise consisted of eight weeks, the whole number of scholars belonging to this school was 11, average attendance, 11, classed as follows: reading, 11, spelling, 11, penmanship, 9, arithmetic, 10, geography, 7.

The Roll of Honor was Harry E.Leavitt, Harl Pease, Roxy J. Sanborn, Lulu B. Sanborn, Etta M. Sanborn, Number of visitors, 8. The closing examinations were very satisfactory, and evinced a degree of thoroughness highly commendable.

The Summer term at the Edwin B. Currier school-house. consisted of but 7 weeks, and was taught by Emma H. Gordon, of New Hampton. The whole number of scholars was 10, average a tendance, 9, classed as follows: reading, 10, spelling, 9, penmanship, 8, arithmetic, 8, geography, 3.

The Roll of Honor for this term was Fred E. Currier. Dennis Calley, Fred W. Moore, Alice Currier, Hattie M. Calley, Della S. Jones. The fall term taught by the same teach-

er, consisted of 9 weeks, and the whole number belonging to the school was 8, average attendance, 7, classed as follows: reading, 8, spelling, 7, penmanship, 7, arithmetic, 5, geography, 5.

The name of Della S. Jones is the only one which appears on the Roll of Honor for this term. Fred Currier was tardy but once. The Summer term was necessarily short, but considerable interest was awakened which was carried through the fall term, and good progress was the result.

We had three scholars who attended the Summer school at what was formerly the Union school house in New Hampton, and which was taught by Mary E. Huckins. This school was quiet and orderly and gave good satisfaction.
