In some of the grades the pupils were taught how to express their thoughts correctly in speaking and writing the English language. The acquirement of this power should be prominent in every child's education from the time he enters school till he graduates, if he would be a successful scholar.

Pupils entering the school at six years of age and continuing till sixteen can graduate with a good grammar school education, qualified for honorable positions in the future. We shall labor for larger results the coming year.
