We have to show for this increase, an ex-tension of the water works pipes, at a cost to the town of four-teen hundred sixty-one dollars and sixteen cents ( $\$ 1461.16$, )also the fire alarm system, at a cost for the system and main-tenance, to the town, of seven hundred sixty-three dollars andsixty cents (\$763.60.) With these added improvements wethink the financial standing for the past year will compare fa-vorably with any of the preceding years.

In making my third annual report, I find at the present time everything in connection with the water works working finely, and the quality of the water excellent. During the months of Iuly and August, the natural flow of water from Jackson pond was not sufticient to supply the village with all the water required at that time, and I was obliged to open the gate and draw the water directly from the pond. During those months I found it necessary to change the water in the pipes quite often and experienced some difficulty in doing it, by there not

This statement is not exactly correct for the whole year, there being some bills yet due the district, and there will be some more to be paid by treasurer ; but it is the best that can be made at this time.

Our teachers have been fairly successful during the past year. Good order has been maintained and it has been the intention of the Board of Education to sustain the teachers in enforcing proper discipline. While not advising unreasonable punishment for those who have not been willing to submit to the regulations of the school, it has not been thought best to discharge disobedient pupils. It is the better way for scholars that cannot be influenced by kind treatment, to be brought to understand that the school is a state affair and that, in order to bring about the best results, the teachers must manage the school. It is not considered good policy to allow boys who have reached the "ripe age" of ten or fifteen years, to take a very prominent part in the management. Miss Knox who has taught the grammar department for several years, has retired from the school. Her services have been faithful and satisfactory and it will be a difficult matter to find a person so well qualified to interest the scholars and afford them so grand an opportunity for improvement.

Our schools for the year have, I think, been a success. The first term of six weeks, taught by Mary B. Ames, I visited twice and was pleased that good order prevailed and each pupil was in place ; yet, to effect this, required continual discipline. Miss Ames deserves much credit for the energy and good will she puts into the work. I think she did her best for the good of the school, and the pupils showed good progress in their studies; though some showed dissatisfaction. I heartily endorse Miss Ames as a good teacher.

The second term was taught by Flora F. Cilley of Hill, a Normal student, class of ' 77 . Her twenty years experience in teaching, before and since graduating, has made her an excellent teacher. The quiet, easy way she has of keeping good order, and of gaining the pupils' good will and attention, can only be attained, in my judgment, by long experience, or from a bountiful natural gift, or both. In both visits I made the school I felt our money was being well laid out. Parent and pupil alike, speak well of Miss Cilley. Being short of funds, it was proposed that board and wood be contributed, thus giving us more school. Accordingly, Messrs. Cummings, Calley, Smith and Stevens, gave $\$ 16$ in board and wood, which gave us eight weeks school instead of five.
