To the Selectmen of the Town of Ashland.
We have the honor to present to you the following report of the Fire Wards of the Ashland Fire Department:

This being the second report given since the Fire Department has been organized, perhaps it would be well to explain to the citizens what we have to fight fire with.

We have two as nice hose carriages as any town needsnot expensive, but good, substantial carriages ; one new hose sleigh which was added to the department the last year ; also two chemical fire extinguishers which cost us $\$ 27$; and we believe that they ought to be put into every public building, store and mill in town, for they are worth their weight in gold, and one moment at the starting of a fire, is worth more than an hour at the last. We have, also, 1000 feet of cotton, rubberlined fire hose, 27 rubber coats and hats, one extension ladder which is 40 feet long, three shorter ones, to use on roofs etc., and a truck to carry them on.

On May 7th, we organized a Hook \& Ladder Co., consisting of seven men, to look after and handle our ladders at a fire. We have in our department, thirty-one of the best young men in town ; they are good, reliable and honest men, and if your house was on fire and they picked up any valuables, we believe they would be returned to you just as they found them.

We think the town ought to buy 500 feet more hose, for in case we had a conflagration, we fear we should be short of hose. Our Hook and Ladder men should have rubber coats and hats ; and we surely ought to have something different from the church bell to sound a fire alarm on, for several reasons: First, the bell being attached to the town clock, strikes every hour ; again, it is rung often for meetings, and as they ring it, sometimes striking a number on one of the fire alarm boxes, often puzzles our firemen to tell whether the bell is ringing for
church or striking an alarm of fire. We need something entirely different. We would suggest that the town place a bell or gong on the hose house, to be used for fire alarms only, and, if arrangements could be made with the mill owners, also attach it to the steam whistles, and do away with the church bell entirely, for fire alarms. The expense would not be so great but what we could afford it, and we believe it would be much better.

We have been very fortunate the past year, as regards fires. April 23, we were called out to put out a fire which started near the Morse place and went through the woods to near Charles Clough's buildings. April 25 , we were called up to Union bridge, to save the bridge from a fire which caught from a passing train. On July 20, an alarm was pulled in from box 64 , but we found that it was a false alarm. Dec. 19, an alarm from box 43 , called us to Brogan's Inn, to a small fire in a partition; again, on Jan. 9, we were needlessly called to Brogan's Inn, to a burning chimney. Some youug man thought it would be a smart trick to call out the fire department, and did so ; but it costs money every time the firemen are called out, and there is quite a fine for fooling with, and ringing in, fire alarms when not needed.

Hoping that our town may be as fortunate in the future, in regard to fires, as it has been in the past,

In my fourth annual report, I am able to show that the amount received for water sold, has more than paid the interest on the cost of construction, also for maintenance the past year; this does not include the benefit the town receives from the forty-four hydrants and two fountains owned by the town.

The disagreement between Ashland and New Hampton, in regard to the valuation of the Ashland water works in New Hampton, has been settled by referee; he, reducing the valuation made by the selectmen of New Hampton, $(\$ 1 \overline{5}, 000)$, to a valuation of $\$ 10,080$, and the selectmen of New Hampton have paid back to the town of Ashland, two hundred twenty-four dollars and one cent, $(\$ 2.24 .01)$ as the amount (principal and interest) overtaxed the past three years.

Calley who deserves much credit for the success attained in her first school. I did not visit school while Miss Stevens was teaching, but, from what I learn of others, she, too, was well qualified, for a beginner.

Whole number pupils registered, 12; average number belonging to school, 10 ; average daily attendance, 10 ; number perfect attendance, $\bar{\delta}$.

Fall term of 11 weeks, in Calley district, began Oct. 5, '97, Walter H. Miller of New Durham, teacher. I am very much pleased with Mr. Miller's work; he enters into it with a vim and a determination of success, only found in a teacher whose heart is in the work; he does not care to shirk, and still bette $r$, does not allow his pupils to, either. Wages paid him, $\$ 5$ per week and board, though, seemingly, large for the place, were, to my mind, well earned ; as well, profitably spent, for the good of the rising generation. I am of the opinion that more money should be raised for school purposes.

Average number pupils belonging to school, 15 ; average daily attendance, 15 ; number perfect attendance, 2 ; whole number pupils registered, 17 ; per cent. attendance, 93.75.
