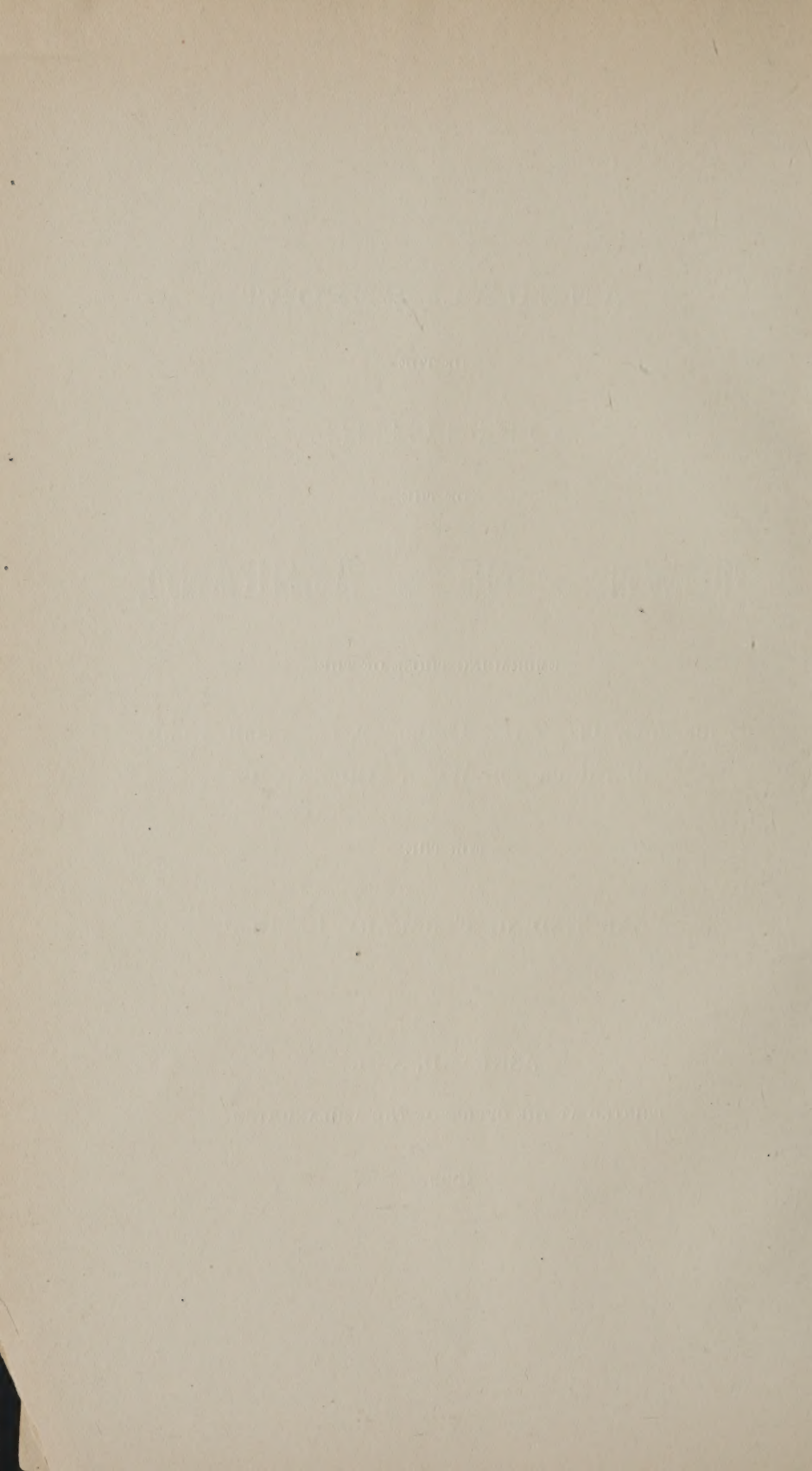

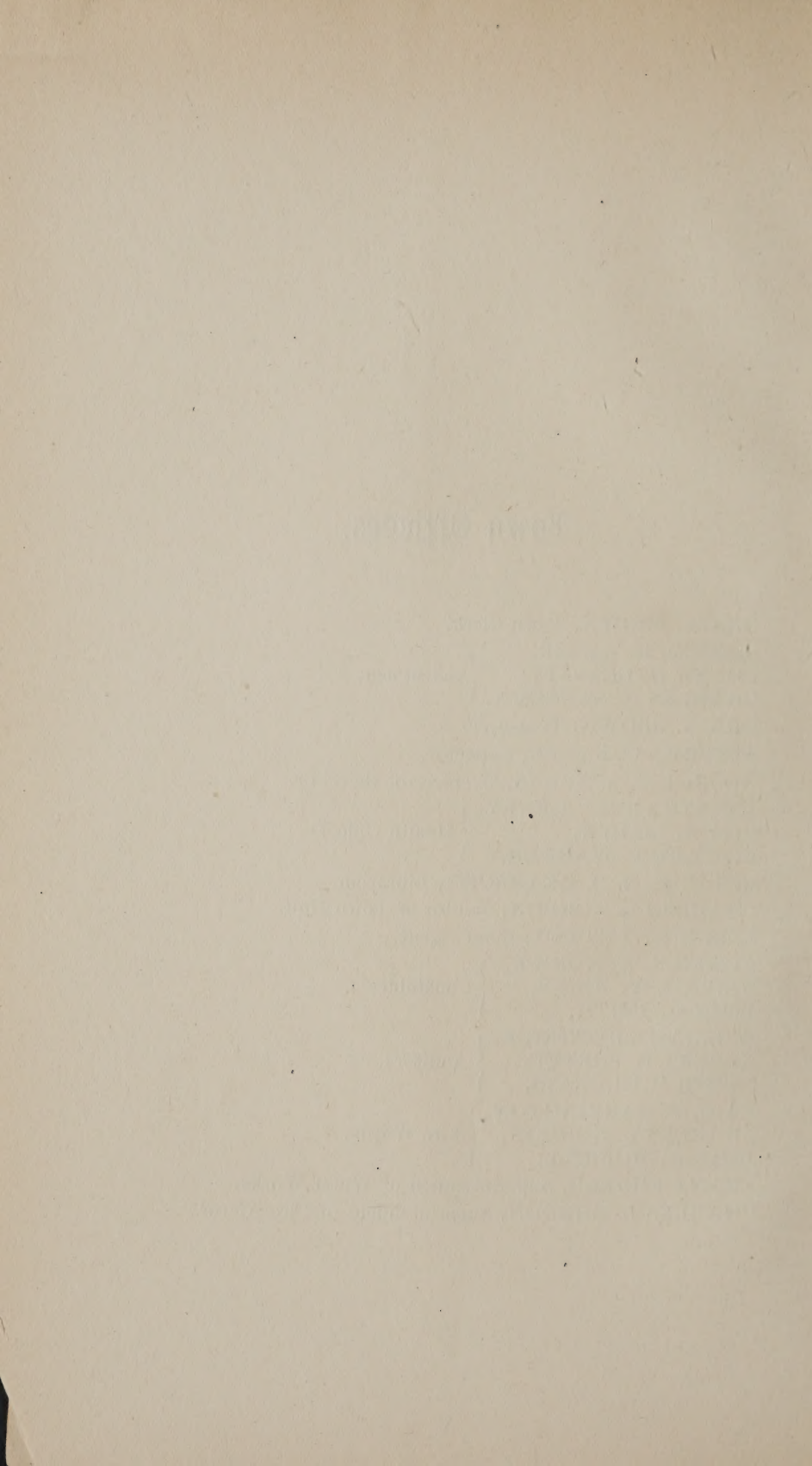

To the Selectmen of the Town of Ashland :

We have the honor to submit to you the following report of the Firewards of the Ashland Fire Department :

Our firemen, during the past two years, have had several calls, to which they responded promptly and did good and efficient work which won for them the praise of our surrounding towns. On March 23, about 1:30 p. m., there was an alarm pulled in from Box 47, which proved to be a house owned by George B. Stevens, on Murray St. The house was on fire throughout the partitions when the boys got there; in a very short time we had three streams of water on it and the fire was soon out. On May 31, about 8:30 p. m., we were called by Box 43, and we found there had been a blaze in the Ashland Knitting Co.'s office, but the automatic sprinklers had the fire out before we got there, and we had nothing to do. On October 16, at 1:30 p. m., we were called by Box 64, and found the Squam Lake House stable and a barn owned by G. B. Peavey ablaze and the wind blowing a gale; but in a very short time we had five streams of water on it, and there was no trouble in subduing what at one time looked to be something that was going to send up in smoke the best part of our village. This was the time that our water works paid all that they ever cost us. Again, on the morning of Jan. 31, about 4:25, we had another call from Box 43; then we found the blacksmith shop of T. E. Carr was all on fire inside; we soon had three streams of water on that building. There again we saw the benefit of our water works; as the shop stood between two dwelling houses, and there was no material damage done to either of them, and the shop was burned to a total loss.

We have added to our Department in the past year, 500 feet of rubber-lined hose, and rubber hats and coats for the ladder men. We have on hand 1500 feet of hose: all that we need at present. The Department is in fine working order,

every man is well drilled, knows his position and can be found there when wanted, ready for his work. We often hear the firemen speak of the church bell as a very poor place for our fire alarm to be called on, and we still believe in the suggestion that we made last year. Aside from that, everything is satisfactory, but we hope before many years, something better can be arranged.

Hoping that we shall have fewer fires next year than we have had in this, We remain respectfully,

The fifth annual report shows the water works yet on the increase. The past year there was collected for water, eighteen hundred seventy-three dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$1,873.39). Out of the amount collected, all bills have been paid, amounting to four hundred sixty-four dollars and twenty cents (\$464.20), and the balance of the amount collected (\$1,409.19) paid to the town treasurer. This amount (\$1,409.19) pays the interest on the town debt for the past year, and leaves a balance of \$90.92 to pay on the debt. The past year the bushes have been cut fifteen feet from each side of Jackson brook, and the water in the reservoir drawn out and the reservoir cleared of all dirt and rubbish. # Report of the Board of Education.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR DIST. NO 1.

Your Board is pleased to report that we have been able to maintain a school of thirty-three weeks in each of the four departments, with a fair degree of success, considering the chaotic condition of the grading in our schools. This report covers the year commencing Aug. 1, 1897, and closing Aug. 1, 1898. We are now arranging a new system of grading of the studies in the four departments and hope when another year comes around, to show some good results of our work.

The first two terms in the Primary grade were taught by Miss Lillian Pollard, and the third term by Miss Edith M. Bryant. The whole number of different pupils registered was 79, and the average daily attendance 57. In spite of the crowded condition of this room, the pupils have been able to make good progress and good discipline has been maintained. We are in hopes to relieve the congested condition of this school the coming year.

The three terms of the Intermediate grade were taught by Miss Lillian J. Brown, with marked success. The whole number of scholars registered was 57, and the average daily attendance was 39. There were twenty-five pupils in this school who were not absent a single half-day during the year; a fact which speaks volumes, not only for the teacher, but also for the parents and children.

In the Lower Grammar grade, the first, and about one-half of second term were taught by Miss Martha P. Shepard and the balance of the year by Miss Nettie M. Davis. It is always a misfortune for a school to be obliged to change teachers in the middle of a term; and we think Miss Davis did exceedingly well, in taking up Miss Shepard's work so well begun, and carrying it through to the close of the year. The

whole number of scholars registered was 35 ; average attendance, 25. The number who were not absent a half-day during the year was 2.

The Higher Grammar grade was taught by Miss L. M. Bryant, who deserves great credit for the manner in which she has conducted this department ; she, having a general supervision over the other departments, has done much towards making them successful, also. The whole number of pupils registered was 28 ; the average attendance, 22.

There is one great evil that must be remedied before our schools can attain that high degree of success that they should. We refer to the many instances of tardiness reported by the teachers. In the Higher Grammar, 60 ; in the Lower Grammar, 80 ; in the Intermediate, 146 ; and in the Primary, 102 tardinesses were recorded for the last term alone. These figures are appalling and the remedy is with the parents. The loss of a few minutes of school in the morning or at noon is not of as much account as the bad habit the scholar forms, of thinking that any time will do. We hope it will be sufficient to call the attention of parents to this evil.

I feel that more money should be raised for school purposes, to place us on a nearer level with sister towns. Plymouth has thirty-six weeks school, while we have twenty or less. Do we not think as much of our children as people of other towns, and don't they need as thorough education? If so, give us means to do it with. We have tried hard to have a good school and have succeeded fairly, in the attempt.

Last term of school year began Dec. 28, '98; continued 9 weeks, to Feb. 25, '99; Mr. W. H. Miller, teacher; wages paid, including board, \$7.50 per week. All were pleased with his work; the pupils showed thoroughness and made rapid progress in their studies, more especially in writing.
