In presenting the report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1901, would say, the balance against the town has increased \$2,120.98 during the year. Of this amount, \$1,582.49 was expended in extending the water works system, and the Kusumpe Lumber Co. has guaranteed an income for water used, sufficient to pay the whole amount of interest on the cost of the extension. The remainder of the balance against the town, \$538.49, was incurred by a deficiency in the highway money of \$150.21, the expenses attending the scarlet fever epidemic etc., of \$159.10, the extremely large cost of \$137.91, for maintaining the fire alarm, and also by the bills growing out of lawsuits, to which the town was a party, amounting to more than \$150.00, which have all been paid. No special appropriation was made to meet any of these bills, and the one made for the usual current expenses was insufficient. A new sidewalk plow, costing \$67.56, was bought and charged to the highway account. 1757 yards new concrete sidewalks, and about 640 yards street pavement have been laid; also 2457 yards sidewalks have been re-covered. All departments have been kept within their appropriations, except the highway account and the current expenses; as stated.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Ashland :

Once more the time has arrived when we are called upon to make a report in regard to our Fire Department. The past year has been one of our lucky ones, for we have had very small loss from fire ; although the firemen have been called out several times, they found no fire but once. The first was Oct. 6, about 1 :30 p. m., from Box 47 ; the fire was all out before the firemen got there, and there was no loss. The second call

was from Box 43, on Oct 16: a slight blaze in the hosiery mill; the fire was put out by mill help, without any damage. In either these cases there was no need of pulling in an alarm, as the fires could have been, and were easily put out, before any help arrived, and the town would have been saved several dollars. On Oct. 23. there was a fire in the house occupied by Geo. Brown, which had considerable headway when discovered; but by the presence of mind and quick action of H. S. Lyford and Vivian Shaw it was put out with a garden hose, with very small damage, and no alarm was given. During the night of Nov. 20, about 11 o'clock, two false alarms were pulled in, within about thirty minutes, one from Box 59, the other from Box 43, which aroused several firemen and quite a number of citizens. Suspicion pointed to certain persons, but for lack of evidence, we could do nothing to punish them. On the morning of Jan. 4, we were called up about 3:15 o'clock, to a fire in a house owned by Anna Deane, and occupied by Chas. Fogg and others. The tenants lost nearly all their furniture and clothing, on which there was no insurance. The loss to building was estimated at \$800, fully insured. At this fire, our fire alarm refused to work after striking a few times; but the firemen were nearly all on hand, did good work, and soon had the fire out. We have had some trouble, as is well known, with our fire alarm, since the middle of last summer, when it was struck by lightning. But our Superintendent of Fire Alarm has overhauled it, and now it is in first class condition (so stated by an expert), and we expect no further trouble from it. Our fire apparatus is in first class shape and we have all we need at present, and hope that we shall not have to use it very often.

Report Board of Education.

DISTRICT NO. 1, FROM AUG. 1, 1899, TO AUG. 1, 1900.

The past school year consisted of thirty-six weeks. Unfortunately, during this year, as in the previous year, an epidemic of sickness greatly interfered with continuous work. Still, by the unremitting efforts of pupils and teachers, the year closed with a good average per cent. deserving promotion.

Increased visiting of the schools by parents, the public exhibitions of the pupils' work, and the closing exercises of the schools, together with the remarkably successful prize speaking of last year, have served to place our schools high in the estimation of our citizens; also, the goodly reports that come back to us from our recent graduates who have entered higher institutions on our certificates, show us that our school system is reaching and maintaining a high standard of excellence. The improvements provided by the citizens, by liberal appropriations, are not without their due educational influence.

The system of schools consists of nine grades, divided among five schools, the First Primary having the first grade and kindergarten work, and each of the other schools having two grades.

The First Primary was taught by Miss Alice P. Sargent. Whole number of pupils, 54; average attendance, 27.

The Second Primary was taught by Miss Lillian J. Brown. Whole number of pupils, 46; average attendance, 29.

The Intermediate was taught by Miss Gladys M. Baker. Whole number of pupils, 38; average attendance, 27.

The First Grammar was taught by Miss Augusta M. Tappan. Whole number of pupils, 57; average attendance, 21.

The Second Grammar was taught by Miss Lula M. Bryant. Whole number of pupils, 28; average attendance, 18.

The entire system has been under the superintendence of Mr. John Keniston for two years. The fact that the Superintendent was re-elected without any opposition, and that his recommendation of all the above teachers was confirmed for this present school year, beginning with September, 1900, is, of itself, to be taken as a testimonial of our confidence in their faithfulness and efficiency for the positions they fill.

The following pupils graduated from the ninth grade, June, 1900: Ethel M. Carpenter, Eva E. Crockett, Bertha Lobdell, Everett E. Atwood and Arthur Morrison.

APPROPRIATIONS.

We need an annual stipend for the purchase of a school reference library; electric lights, so that the eyes may not be overtaxed in the winter months, and so that the older pupils may have ample facilities for study in the school rooms; a system of electric bells for the school fire alarm; a system of ventilation adequate to provide the needed fresh air; new hard wood floors to replace the floors in the old school rooms, which are worn out, untidy, and dangerous for preserving and spreading contagious diseases. The old chimneys ought to be discarded altogether and a large one built at the rear of the building, and the boiler also moved to the rear and set over, and furnace built for coal. It is to be hoped that the district will continue to provide for the improvement of the school facilities, something, at least, each year, thus avoiding a greater outlay in some single year.
