


WARRANT.

State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashlahd in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March 1904, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the town library.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the current expenses of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to put in additional fire alarms, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of the town debt and to defray the interest thereon for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to lay out a highway from the dwelling house of Wm. C. Currier in said town across the land of said Currier and land of Mrs. C. A. Curtis to the highway near the dwelling house of said Mrs. C. A. Curtis.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to have built on the rear end of the Town Hall a suitable fire-escape for an exit from Masonic hall, so called, in case of fire, and make an appropriation for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to reshingle the town hall and make an appropriation for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to reshingle the town shed and make an appropriation for the same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to grant a franchise for the setting of poles and constructing a telephone line in and over the streets of Ashland to the Citizen's Telephone Co. of Laconia or any other company connected with it that will give the patrons the free use of all of the lines of the Citizen's Telephone Co. and its connections.

To the Citizens of Ashland:

Ten years have passed since the completion of the system for fire purposes. It is in good condition with a gradual decrease in the pressure, which is one hundred pounds on Main Street, at rest. Owing to the number

of services and the continued waste from them it has cut the pressure down twenty five (25) pounds, so that the leaks and the unnecessary waste of water, should be guarded against for the reason, if there is plenty of water, as all the pressure is needed in case of fire.

The bushes have been cut between the reservoir and pond and all the brook cleared of any thing that would contaminate the water, as the reservoir is governed entirely by the gate at the outlet of the pond.

During the past year we have secured split sleeves of the different sizes of pipe for repairs in case of a break and also a pipe cutter for the same purpose. We would recommend that an extra hydrant be procured the coming year to replace any that might be broken, without any delay.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.

To the Selectmen of Ashland: We have a very short report to make this year and, as we believe a good one. The damage or loss by fire in our town has for the past year been very small as compaired with last year.

On the 20th of July we received notice of a brush fire up towards Bridgewater station, and with a few men we attempted to put it out, and to all appearances did but upon the following day we had to pull in an alarm and take nearly all the department out to get it under control and we had to repeat nearly the same thing the next day.

Owing to the fire being on a mountain it was very difficult to control. It was on the land owned by the Railroad Co., and the land owned by Wm. H. Morse. The damage was small. On the afternoon of Oct. 2nd we were called out to a fire in the block owned by E. G. Gammons and occupied by E. G. Gammons, W. B. Cogswell and Fred Jordan.

Damage to the building \$300 00
Contents of Gammon's part 30 00
'' Cogswell's part 700 00

These were fully covered by insurance, but Jordan's loss was about \$25,00 upon which there was no insurance. But let us say that the most of the damage was caused by water. The fire burned but very little. There is no doubt but that this fire was caused by a cigar stub, thrown among some papers kept in a back room. At this fire two of our firemen received injuries, one was thrown off a ladder and the other's hand was cut by glass, but our firemen are far sighted and all are insured in the State Firemen's association, and receive \$2,00 per day for all the time they are laid up with injuries received at a fire.

We have a few hydrants that are set so low that it is almost impossible to keep the snow and ice from completely covering them up, This should be remedied in some way. We still believe that there should be several more Fire Alarm boxes added and when the town feels able we trust it will be done, but we fear that it will be put of too long or until some that live on the outer edge of our village have their buildings burned to the ground before they can go to the alarm box to ring in an alarm

We have been extremely lucky in our town with regard to fires and let us be careful what we do with our ashes, look over our chimneys and stovepipes often, and try in every way to prevent a fire, for as the old saying is "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure".

There is nothing of moment to record in regard to our school at this time. The work is being carried on quietly and successfully. There seems to be a hearty cooperation between teachers and scholars which is of the greatest value in maintaining the high standard of discipline which prevails throughout the schools. During the year the windows on the upper floor have been fitted with storm windows, adding much to the comfort of the pupils beside saving fuel. The fire escape has been connected with the ground so that, if necessary, the scholars from the upper rooms can march to the ground without jumping or using ladders. The schools have so increased during the past year that it has been necessary to borrow seats from the Normal School at Plymouth and one of the appropriations to be asked for at the coming school meeting will be for additional seats.


