## WARRANT.

#### State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing,
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the town library.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the current expenses of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to put in additional fire alarms, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of the town debt and to defray the interest thereon for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to reshingle the town hall and repair the chimneys, and make appropriation for the same.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to sell the merl pit which it bought of Daniel Baker, on Thompson Street, nearly opposite the residence of Horace Bickford.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to recind the vote taken at the March meeting 1901, under article 14 of the warrant providing for the appointment of public weighers. If not to recind said vote to see what action the town will take to instruct the Selectmen or other agents appointed by the town to hire, lease or purchase a new set of scales for the use of the town, and make appropriation for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for the term of ten years. The Toilet Paper Manufacturing Establishment, proposed to be erected and put in operation therein by the Continental Paper Bag Company, in connection with their Paper Mill Plant, and the capital used in operating the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Supt. of the town water works to allow the Green Grove Cemetery Association, the right to take water to water the lots therein free of charge. It being understood that the association meet the expense of putting in the same.

## REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of A shland.

Your Fire Wards have this report to present you for the past year, ending February 14th. Although we have had more loss by fire this year than last, still, it is not so bad as might be expected by one riding through our village and taking notice of the very many chimneys, which are badly out of repair and need to be built over. Your attention has already been called to this matter in a former report, and should be looked after by the owners of the property, as we believe it a duty which they owe to themselves as well as to the company in which they are insured.

The fires as they have occurred are as follows: The first was April 10th, chimney fire in house of Brooks and Hardy, no damage; next, April 25, Geo. Kelley's house occupied by Lewis Sherburne, loss about \$1500.00 with no insurance, caused by defective chimney; May 29 we were called by an alarm at 9:45 A. M. to Hill Street to the house of Alvah Huckins, damage \$237 75, insurance paid. This house was occupied by Louis Toutant and Albert Cote, their loss was about \$100.00 with no insurance, caused by rats and matches. The next was Oct. 27, still alarm at the Thompson House, owned by C. B. Woodman, damage \$20.00 which was paid in full, caused by defective chimney. Oct. 29 at 3:50 of the clock in the morning we were called to the dwelling of Mrs. Kate Earnest, loss of \$30.80 to buildings and about \$10.00 to contents. She was fully insured on her building but nothing on contents. There is no doubt but this fire was caused by rats and matches. Again on Jan. 6th about 10:30 A. M. we were

called to the house of A. E. Porter and found his barn in flames. Total Loss 550.00 which was paid in full. The cause of this fire is uncertain but we called it spontaneous combustion in our report to the Insurance Commissioner.

You will notice that the cause of our fires are defective chimneys or rats and matches. If we had good chimneys and kept our matches where rats could not get them to carry away, many of our fires would be prevented.

Our fire fighting implements are in first class shape and the boys are contented and are trying to raise enough money to buy themselves uniforms and have been giving social dances for the purpose, which ought to be well patronized. Hoping that our loss by fire, next year will be less, we are yours truly.

During the year the water has been analyzed twice, in July and in October, by the state Chemist and reported as being a very satisfactory supply.

There has been an increase over last year in the amount received for water rents of \$180-52. The current expenses less the New Hampton tax is \$377-96, this amount includes the eight new services which have been added during the year, and the expense of raising the hydrant on Gordan Street. The total earnings this year above expenses amounts to \$1859-76. Besides this the town has the use of 48 hydrants and water for the public buildings and drinking fountains.

The system is at present in a good working condition with very little complaint in the quality of the water and and this is caused mostly from being riled by the use of the hydrants and the sediment which collects in the pipes.
