#### TOWN WARRANT.

The State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton, in said State, gualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and apdropriate for the support of the town library.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of town poor.

6 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to install a heater in the hose house, and to defray the current expenses of the Fire Department for the eusuing year.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of the town debt, and to defray the interest thereon for the ensuing year.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the building of a concrete sidewalk on River street from the end of the present walk to the Asquam Transportation Company's boat house, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the town will vote to place a street light at the bridge over Squam River, on River street.

11. To see if the town will vote to place one or more street lights on East Main street, near the residence of Byron K. Smythe.

12. To see if the town will vote to place one street light on Glove street, near the building of Gordon B. Peavey.

13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase a street sweeper.

14. To see if the town will choose one or more highway surveyors.

#### **REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.**

To the citizens of Ashland, we beg to submit the following report:

The year just past has been exceptional in the small fire loss and few alarms rung in. On May 17, box 62 was rung in for a small fire caused by an oil stove in the tenement house of Mrs. J. B. Carr and occupied by Harry Morey. The loss of \$25.00 was paid by the insurance company. On July 12 and 13 the forest fire signal was rung to answer calls from the selectmen of New Hampton to help extinguish a fire in New Hampton woods, the expense of which has been paid by the town of New Hampton. On July 26, box 41 was rung in for a small fire in the Scribner block. No damage was done. On Dec. 8, a false alarm was rung in from box 72. On account of the age of the boy who did this no action was taken against him. The department is in first-class condition. We need a few supplies this year and in order to keep our chemicals from freezing and to protect our hose from freezing temperature we should have a hot air heater installed in the cellar of the hose house. This would cost less than \$200.00 and would save the town at least \$150.00 per year, as that much hose is destroyed every year by remaining frozen so long. This could also be used to heat the town library and selectmen's We recommend an appropriation of room when needed. \$700.00, the same as last year.

#### **REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.**

#### ASHLAND SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Since our last report some important changes have been made in the schools. An approved High school has been established and a one year course maintained with more than twenty pupils, mostly residents of this district, although there are a few from other districts who pay regular tuition. We recommend continuing this until a full four years' course has been established.

The attendance has been very large and for a time, at the beginning of the year, one of the grades was moved to the town building, but when the weather became very cold it was found to be impossible to maintain comfortable quarters there without considerable expense and this grade was taken back to the school building, in the room where it formerly was, and the teacher employed as an assistant.

The number of pupils enrolled is 233, and the average attendance is 95 per cent. Mr. Samuel A. Burleigh still continues as superientendent, and Mr. William H. Buker, a graduate of Bates college, was employed as principal and has taught the High school class and the eighth grade, doing excellent work in both these divisions, as well as throughout the entire school.

The other grade teachers are: Grade 1, Miss Florence C. Willis. 2, Miss Mary E. Cheney. 3, Miss Mary Barnett. 4 and 5, Miss Mabel M. Estes, Miss Winnifred B. Weeks. 6 and 7, Miss Grace E. Lord.

During the first part of the year, Miss Olive J. Walker taught the 4th grade but was obliged to retire on account of illness of her mother. The teachers are very efficient and we are satisfied that the condition of the school is good evidence of this fact.

For several years it has been known that more room would be required, and we feel that the time has now come when the matter of providing it should be taken up. We believe that good schools are an important factor in the development and standing of a town and in order to have what will be required, a new school building should be erected and ready for use at the beginning of the next school year in September.

It is so certain that several more school rooms will soon be required that it would seem a waste of money to provide temporary quarters. The district owns land which may well be used for this purpose.
