

WARRANT.

The State of New Hampshire,

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton, in said State; qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the town library.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of the town debt and to defray the interest thereon for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the current expenses of the fire department for the ensuing year.

- 8. To see what action the town will take as to the suppression of the Gyspy and Brown Tail moths, and raise and appropriate money for the ssme.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the town poor.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to enlarge the stage and install a heating apparatus at the town hall and to make all other changes and improvements which the town may vote, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the purpose of setting out shade trees from the village to the cemetery and caring for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to build a band stand, locate the same and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to have the town library managed by a board of trustees as provided for in the Public Statutes, and elect the same.
- 14. To see if the sown will vote to allow the present janitor of the town hall to recind, alter, or amend all previous acts of the town in demanding pay for the town hall for public political rallys.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to fix a standing price for the town hall, for citizens of Ashland, and also for all others, and for what purpose the citizens shall have the free use of the same.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to place a street light on East Main street near the residence of B. K. Smythe.
- 17. To see if the town will accept the bequest of Martha A. Cummings of \$200.00 to care for the family lot in Green Grove cemetery.

- 18. To see if the town will vote to shingle the Firemen's building, paint the same, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 19. To see if the town will allow the Ashland Band the use of the hall on the second floor in the town hall building, free of charge, for band meetings.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to repair the concrete streets and sidewalks, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any money towards building the sidewalk on River street, if so how much.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.

To the Citizens of Ashland we beg to submit the following report:

On March 9, the house owned and occupied by S. H. Baker caught fire from an overheated chimney. This was put out by the use of chemicals without turning on the water. Insurance on the buildings and contents, \$2600. A damage of \$25.00 was paid by the insurance company.

March 25, a chimney fire in building of Mrs. Calvin Andrews was extinguished with chemicals. No damage.

May 3, a chimney fire at D. W. Carey's house was attended to with chemicals. No damage of any amount.

On May 3, a call by telephone for help at forest fire in Bridgewater was responded to.

May 28, there was a small forest fire at Green Grove cemetery put out without any damage.

June 12, a chimney fire at Mrs. Sadie Prescott's. Chemicals used. No damage.

On July 4, the forest fire alarm was rung for a fire on the land of Gordon Peavey which was not completely extinguished until July 6.

Dec. 9, the building owned by Squam Lake Woolen mill and used as a dwelling house caught fire by the thawing out of frozen water pipes. This fire was extinguished with chemicals. Insurance \$600. Damage of \$25.00 was paid by insurance company.

Dec. 26, a chimney fire at Mrs. Anna Whipple's and Dec. 29, at Mrs. Margaret Horrigan's was attended to. No damage.

February third, at 10.30 A. M., an alarm from box 74 was rung in for our worst fire of the season at the Squam Lake Lumber Co's., mill, caused probably by a hot box. The mill itself was totally destroyed, the dwelling house damaged, and the electric light plant across the river on fire several times.

The Squam Lake Lumber Co's., property was insured for \$3,800.00. Damage of \$3,575.00 was paid by the insurance company. The Electric Light Co.'s, property was damaged to the extent of \$150.00, which has been paid by the insurance company.

At this fire the firemen laid 1,400 feet of hose, and received many favorable comments on their promptness and efficiency. The Squam Lake Lumber Company presented them with a check for \$25.00 toward the fund for getting the state convention here at their next annual meeting.

This year we have equipped the ladder truck with sleds for winter use and the apparatus is in first class condition.

The fire wards recommend an appropriation of \$650.00 to defray the expenses for the coming year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

ASHLAND SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Voters, Parents and Friends of Public Schools of Ashland:

We take pleasure again in submitting the annual school report of the public schools.

In September, it became necessary on account of the overcrowded condition to divide the fifth and sixth grades, thus requiring one more teacher in the grades, and this has improvided conditions so greatly that none of the rooms are over taxed, except the first grade which has far too many pupils.

A physical laboratory has been newly equipped in the High school with the most modern apparatus, thus giving our students an equal chance in getting an education along a practical side of life,

In order to give the larger majority of students a business training, we have added a complete Commercial course. This includes arithmetic, commercial geography, penmanship, bookkeeping, shorthand and typewriting.

Our enrollment has been the largest in the history of our schools, averaging two hundred and fifty pupils, an increase of twenty-nine over the previous year. This is due partially to the High school.

Next fall we start the fourth year in High school, and we think our High school will compare favorably with any in the state. The town will not be obliged to pay for tuition of any pupils to outside schools.

In order that all may be informed concerning the tennis courts which were constructed in September, we will briefly state that the district did not spend one cent for their construction, they being paid for by pupils in the High school.

We have been very successful in employing only Normal graduates or those having a State Certificate, and thereby we

have received a rebate from the state; also, we can see far better results in the schools by employing teachers who meet these conditions.

(Last year we figured the interest as four per cent., after this we learned that the notes were taxable and we were obliged to pay six per cent., which explains why more money is required for this purpose. This makes but little difference as all these six per cent. notes are held by residents of Ashland and the town gets the tax,)

In conclusion we urge all parents and friends to visit the schools and discover for themselves what the pupils are receiving from the public schools. Furthermore, it would aid and improve conditions if parents would impress continually upon their children the need of an education.
