WARRANT.

The State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton, in said State; qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the town library.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of the town debt and to defray the interest thereon for the ensuing year.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the current expenses of the fire department for the ensuing year.

8. To see what action the town will take for the suppression of the Gyjsy and Brown Tail moths and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the town poor.

10. To see if the town will vote to repair the concrete street and sidewalks, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to sell or dispose of the gravel pit on River street near Squam Lake Lumber Company Mills, and take any action relative thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to make any change in the present manner of giving discounts in the payment of taxes.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF ASHLAND PUBLIC LIBRARY.

To the Citizens of Ashland:

We respectfully submit the first report given by a Board of Trustees of the Ashland Public Library.

As there was raised for the support of the Library the same amount of money as in the past years, we were able to make only minor changes.

We wish to thank all who aided in the purchasing of the ten volumes of Histories on the Civil War. They are very useful reference books.

During the months of November and January we have had the Library open on Wednesday evenings in addition to Saturday afternoons and evenings. The citizens have appreciated this very much, as it enabled them to have greater access to the library and diminished the amount of fines.

We have purchased books of fiction, histories and reference books. We believe that more reference books should be purchased and less fiction. We made all new books seven day books until January 1st, and this proved beneficial.

We recommend that a sufficient amount of money be raised to catalogue the library.

We recommend that the library be opened on Wednesday evenings at least ten months in the year in addition to the hours on Saturday.

We recommend that the librarian only, have access to the shelves.

We recommend a few minor repairs in order to carry out the previous recommendation.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.

To the Citizens of Ashland we beg to submit the following report:

This has been a year of no serious fire loss but an exceptionally large number of calls have been received, many of which were still alarms attended to by one or two firemen with chemicals.

April 23, a brush fire in New Hampton was attended to by the fire warden and help.

April 24, the fire warden and help were called to extinguish a fire on the property of A. F. Jones. This proved to be a bad fire and resulted in the loss of the barn.

April 27, a small fire was attended to on the land of Charles Dow.

May 3, 6, 11 and 15, brush fires were reported and looked after by the fire warden.

June 2, an alarm was rung in for fire in the Thompson house, occupied by Ernest Smith.

The firemen responded to this alarm to find the fire just across the line in the town of New Hampton. To have waited to receive orders from the Selectmen of New Hampton would have meant loss of time and total destruction of the buildings. The firemen made the best stop yet and saved the main house. We incurred our heaviest expense of the year at this fire and as yet the Selectmen of New Hampton have taken no action in regard to bill rendered them.

June 28, a brush fire at Bridgewater Station was attended to.

August 3, a brush fire on the highway leading to Union Bridge was looked after.

August 18, a forest fire on Benjamin Pease land.

August 19, a forest fire on Dr. Schubmehl's land in Holderness.

September 12, a brush fire was attended to on land near Union Bridge.

October 30, a chimney fire in the house of Ed Boynton was taken care of in answer to a still alarm.

November 14, the town of Sandwich called for help and our department responded. The Selectmen of Sandwich promptly paid all expenses.

December 16, an alarm was rung for fire in the Victor Minnon house.

January 13, an alarm was rung from Box 66 for chimney fire at Mrs. Sadie Prescott's.

On September 24, we were honored by the State Firemen holding their annual convention with us. These expenses were paid by the untiring efforts of the firemen and the liberal subscriptions of our business men.

We have overdrawn our appropriation this year although we spent only what money was absolutely necessary and we will have to have an appropriation of at least \$650.00 for the coming year.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

ASHLAND SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT.

To the Citizens of Ashland:

This report we have divided into two heads, the High school and the Grades.

In the High School we have now a four year's course in each of the three branches, Commercial, English and College.

We have registered in the College course 17, in the English 19, and in the Commercial 18.

At the beginning of the year we introduced music in our schools under the direction of a special instructor. This has proved beneficial in many ways.

The number of reference books in our High School library has been greatly increased during the year, thereby providing a greater amount of material for the History and Science departments.

A chemical laboratory has been equipped with the necessary apparatus to meet the approval of the Department of Public Instruction, and thus giving to our pupils something more than theoretical knowledge.

From the Department of Public Instruction at Concord we received recently a favorable report concerning the condition of the High school.

The heads of the departments have been as follows: Science and Mathematics, William H. Buker, A. B.; French and English, Bertha Payson, A. B.; Latin and History, Mary Smith, A. B.; Commerce, Verena Griswold.

In the grades the schools have been under the same supervision as for the past three years. We are

glad to report that the average attendance to February first is the highest for several years, due we believe to the monthly reports which the teachers have been required to present for the inspection of the Principal and truant officer. We can still increase the per cent. of attendance if parents would only realize that illness is the only excuse permitted by law for being absent.

The following teachers have been employed in the respective grades: Gertrude Sullivan, Mabel Estes and Marjorie Parker, seventh and eighth; Mabel Estes, Mrs. Grace Johnson and Caroline Pearson, sixth grade; Caroline Pearson, Harriet Welch and Edith James, fifth grade; Blanche Rogers, Minnie Thompson, fourth grade; Bernice Houston and Blanche Rogers, third grade; Mildred Smith, second grade; Mary Roberts, first grade.

The last year previous to starting the High school, the town paid out for tuitions \$735.06, while this year we received \$341.77, and many pupils who are now attending school would not have been able to have gone out of town to school.
