

FROM STATE TAX COMMISSION.

The following extract from a circular prepared by the State Tax Commission is well worthy the careful consideration of all voters and tax payers in Ashland and elsewhere:

"Taxes as defined have increased by reaps and bounds in recent years. In 1903 the sum of all the taxes assessed by and within the state of New Hampshire was \$5,373,420.33; in 1913 it was \$8,765,039.07, an increase of \$3,391,618.85, or 63 per cent., in ten years. But these figures do not adequately represent the velocity the upward movement has now attained. To show that it is necessary to divide the ten-year period: The levy in 1908 was \$924,388.79, or 17 per cent. greater than in 1903, while that in 1913 was \$2,467,-230.06, or 39 per cent. greater than in 1908. much did the advance in the last half of said period exceed that in the first half. These figures will be the more alarming if it is remembered that while taxes already sufficiently heavy were advancing 63 per cent., the population of the state increased only about 41/9 per cent., and while the one was advancing 39 per cent.. the other increased only about 21/4 per cent.

From the per capita standpoint the situation is not less disturbing. In 1913 there were assessed \$12.88 in taxes for each man, woman and child in the state. Five years later there were assessed \$14.75 for each individual, and in five years more \$20.09. If in 1913 taxes had been equally distributed among an the people it would have meant a burden of \$100.00 for each family of five members. Though in reality there was little such equality in the assessment there was much

in the payment. The fact is that those who occupy, use or consume property, no matter who owns it, are those who in the last analysis pay most, if not all, of the taxes thereon. If the wage earner or the man of limited means understood he was in reality paying something like \$100.00 a year in state and municipal and half as much more in federal taxes for the government of himself, his wife and three children his innuence and his vote would more frequently make for economy in appropriations and expenditures than heretofore.

WARRANT.

The State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitantn of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton, in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the town library.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of the town debt and to defray the interest thereon for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the current expenses of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see what action the town will take for the suppression of the Gypsy and Brown Tail moths and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the town poor.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to repair the concrete street and sidewalks, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to place a street light on West Main street, near the residence of Mrs. Sadie E. Prescott.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to place two additional street lights on Winter street, one near tenement of Mrs. Francella Perkins and one near No. 3 paper mill.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to move the Town Scales from their present location, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to make any changes in the present system of allowing discounts in the payment of taxes, especially in regard to the discount on poll taxes.

During the past year there has been expended for concreting, above appropriation, \$915.60; for bank wall, \$1,725.22; for repairs and renewals at town hall, \$245.32; a total of \$2,936.88. If these amounts had been applied to payments on notes, the Selectmen could have shown a reduction of debt of \$4,412.10, possibly the best financial showing made in any one year in the history of the town. But it was deemed better policy to make these needed improvements and repairs without increasing taxes and pay less on the principal of the debt.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES.

To the Citizens of Ashland:

We respectfully submit the second annual report of the Trustees of the Public Library.

At the last town meeting the sum of fifty dollars was appropriated to catalogue the books. At first the trustees were of the opinion they could save time and money by having this work done with local assistance, but after visiting several libraries and looking into the question thoroughly, it was decided to employ some person familiar with this kind of work and have the library organized properly. This has been done but some delay resulted in finding the cataluguer and the Trustees regret that this could not be finished in time for this report, but they feel sure that you will find a convenient, well organized Library as the result.

There are now 3,800 books, after removing those unfit for circulation and some past repair.

Thirty-six books have been added and some fifty others, mostly for children, are held to be catalogued and will be ready for circulation the latter part of March, also those which have been presented.

We call your attention to the question of insurance. There are many valuable books which, as a whole, could not be replaced for less than four thousand dollars. We therefore suggest the contents of the Library room to be insured for two thousand five hundred dollars. The fact that we have gone so many years without loss can hardly be used as an argument against it. The large number of books taken out during the year, 9,375, seems to prove the usefulness and popularity of a town library.

The Trustees recommend an appropriation of \$100 to cover the expense to complete reorganizing, binding old books, etc.

The Trustees will feel well paid for their work for the future of the Library if their efforts meet with your approval.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.

To the Citizens of Ashland we beg to submit the following report:

This has been another fortunate year as regards fire damage.

April 24th, the Fire Warden and help were called to extinguish a forest fire in North Ashland on land of Mary Chase and Holderness School.

January 1, an alarm was rung from box 57 for a fire in the house owned by Paul Poulin. Damage to building, \$485.00, was paid by insurance company.

July 11th, the dwelling house of Dr. J. M. Cheney was struck by lightning and the upper part of the main house set on fire. The firemen responded to a call from box 68 and the blaze was extinguished by chemicals. Damages of \$254.00 were paid on house and contents.

October 21, an alarm was rung from box 62 for a fire in the Squam Lake House annex. This was extinguished with chemicals. There was no damage.

An alarm was rung from box 72 for a fire at the residence of Charles Pattee on School street. When the firemen arrived the barn was a mass of flames and it was necessary to lay three lines of hose. The fire was stopped in the barn, where it originated, and the firemen did creditable work. Damages of \$940.00 on buildings and contents was awarded by insurance company.

November 19, still alarm for chimney fire in the house owned by Frank Chick on River street. Extinguished with chemicals. No damage.

December 21, needless alarm was rung from box 59 for chimney fire in the house occupied by George Jacobs.

The Department is in first class condition. New hose has been bought during the year, which took quite a sum from the appropriation.



REPORT OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

ASHLAND SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT.

To the Citizens of Ashland:

At the recommendation of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction the courses of study offered this year in the High school have been made somewhat different from those offered in the past. The College Preparatory or Latin Course is retained unchanged. The Commercial course has been subject to revision and its most valuable features have been retained in the English course. This course offers book-keeping in the first year and commercial arithmetic in the second. These are the chief Commercial features of the course. In addition the course offers enough in the way of History, Mathematics and Languages to enable its graduates to enter college on its preparation.

The course in Domestic Arts has been introduced in the belief that it will prove a desirable course to such pupils as have no intention of entering college. This course does, of course, offer a wide range of subjects outside of those that pertain to the home. and the work along that line is only a fourth of the work that must be taken each year by the student. The first year's work in household subjects is half sewing and the other half plain cooking. The second year a study of Household Mechanical Appliances and of Household Sanitation and Hygiene is taken. The first of these subjects deals largely with Heating Appliances, Plumbing, Electricity, Forms of Lighting, and Means of Power in the Household. It is practically the science of Physics applied, The third year Physiology is studied and laboratory work in that subject is performed. Under the general head of Nursing, the care of children, the sick and the aged is studied, and cooking for the sick is studied and practiced. In the fourth year of the course advanced cooking is studied. A study is made of keeping household accounts and of marketing with reference to cost, to income, and to rood values. The four years' course offers a wide range of subjects. We believe it especially valuable to such students who do not desire to prepare for entrance to college. Graduates from this course are admitted to Normal school as from other courses.

The maximum registration in the High school this year has been 44. At present there are registered 21 girls and 20 boys in courses as follows: College course, 6; English course, 14; Domestic Arts course, 20; Specials, 1. Four girls of the Domestic Arts course are taking Latin as an extra subject, and one girl is taking Geometry as an extra.

Such scientific apparatus and reference books as have been needed to supplement our list have been bought. Among the latter is to be mentioned a set of Encyclopedias.

The heads of the departments have been as follows: Science and Mathematics, Frank A. Knight, A. B.; Latin and French, Mary Smith, A. B.; History, English and Domestic Arts, Marguerite Poore, B. S.

The grades are under the supervision of the High school principal. The attendance has been very satisfactory this year. There have been very few cases of wilful truancy and those few have been dealt with.

The following teachers have been employed since September: Mary Ireland, 8th grade; Lillian Carmichael, 7th grade; Anna Carrigan, 6th grade; Marjorie Boothe, 5th grade; Minnie Thompson, 4th grade; Blanche Rogers, 3rd grade; Mildred Smith, 2nd grade;

Mary Roberts, 1st grade.

As will be seen from the above list the 7th and 8th grades are now taught apart from each other. This change has been to the great advantage of both grades.
