

WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Ashland, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 4 To elect three selectmen: one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year, and to choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 3 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the Town Library.

Article 4 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 5 To see what additional sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of enlarging and improving the Town Hall.

Article 6 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year. Article 7 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the town poor.

Article 8 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the concrete streets and sidewalks,

Article 9 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department, including the services of the firemen.

Article 10 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the Town debt.

Article 44 To see if the Town will vote to reconsider the vote passed at the Annual Town Meeting in March, 1920, whereby the sum of five hundred dollars was voted for the purpose of buying a street sprinkler, and vote to appropriate this money for other purposes.

Article 12 To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken at the Annual Town Meeting in March, 1919, in regard to having a uniformed policeman to serve for a year and elect three policemen by ballot as usual, one of them to be on regular police duty during the months of June, July, August, September and October, and paid according to his duties,

Article 13 To see what action the Town will take in reference to compensating Fred J., and Earl O. Sanborn for alleged loss occasioned by the non-fulfillment on the part of the town to furnish electric power to the said Fred J., and Earl O. Sanborn, in accordance with contract.

Article 14 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot system for town meetings,

Article 15 To see if the Town will vote to abolish its Municipal Electric Light Commission. The vote to be taken by printed ballot, yes or no.

Article 16 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to procure a tablet for the Spanish War Veterans of the Town of Ashland.

Given under our hands and seal, this nineteenth day of February in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twenty-one.

The Ashland Water Works were constructed during the year 1894, at a cost of \$30,821.87, as shown by the Town Report at the end of that year. Later appropriations were made amounting to \$3,982.40. Interest figured year by year has reached \$30,423.80, making the total cost and interest, \$65,228.07. Payments to the Town Treasurer from Water

Payments to the Town Treasurer from Water Rents have reached a total of \$45,272.05, leaving the net debt of the Water Department, \$19,956.02.

No account is made here of the value of the water

used in the town buildings and fire hydrants, which, if it had been bought from outside parties, would have cost the town more than \$30,000.00 in the last 26 years.

REPORT OF THE ASHLAND MUNICIPAL ELECTRIC COMMISSION

At the last annual town meeting, \$9,000 was voted for the purpose of providing a new boiler and new chimney for the electric lighting plant. No time was lost in making the necessary arrangements for these improvements, but owing to conditions beyond our control, there was a most distressing delay in securing the equipment; prices of both labor and material were greatly advanced and a further appropriation of \$7,000 was necessary. During the time much inconvenience was felt and the earning power of the plant was, for a considerable length of time, impaired. The work was finally completed and the plant is now in good condition and producing satisfactory results, both as to service and revenue.

The financial report shows earnings for the year, including rentals, to have been \$10,117.07. During the year, many houses have been connected for lighting and with the present rate, it is expected that the revenue from light and power, for the current year, will be not less than \$9,000; probably more. Rentals of more than \$2,000 will bring the gross revenue up to \$11,000 at least. No new work is contemplated for the present year and with operating ex-

penses the same as last year, about \$4,500 and repairs and replacements about \$1,200, making a total outlay of \$5.700, which deducted from the probable income of \$11,000, should leave net earnings of \$5,-300 for the year, which may be applied on outstanding notes.

No account has been made of street lighting, which would probably cost \$2,500 a year, if the town did not own the plant.

It must be remembered that property of this kind depreciates fast and reasonable allowance should be made for this. We believe the present earnings are sufficient to allow for depreciation and pay the interest on the capital invested in the plant.

There are no outstanding bills against the commission. There is a supply of coal on hand valued at \$750 and cash in the treasury, \$580.42.

The figures published below, while giving in outline the work done during 1920, yet convey to the readers' mind but a faint idea of the good accomplished through the labor of love of the Association's capable, experienced and ever-willing nurse. While many a sufferer will long bless her memory, the school children will never forget the kind hand that so often cleansed their sores and helped brighten or cheer their young lives. SCHOOL REPORT

ASHLAND SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Superintendent's Report

The following staff of teachers are in charge of our schools for the year 1920-21:

Grades—VI, Flora E. Richardson; V, Marion Chase; IV, Angie B. McLellan; III, Anna M. Holland; II, Blanche G. Rogers; I, Rena M. Ballam.

Music Supervisor-Fred A. Barker.

Evening School—Gertrude M. Harris, Alice J. Buzzell.

Practically no changes have been made in the program of studies since we began to change over gradually to the new courses approved by the State Department of Education. By another year all classes will be working on the new courses, and some of the present difficulties of trying to carry on two programs with a small staff of teachers will be eliminated. Although the present program was introduced in Grades VII and VIII two years ago, we did not ask the State Department to recognize us as an approved Junior High School until this year, or until we had assured ourselves of the practicability of the courses and their adaptability to our needs. The work is proving attractive and beneficial to the pupils, and without doubt will serve to keep in school, and contentedly, more pupils beyond the legal age for school attendance.

There are 249 pupils attending our schools at the present time, 120 hoys and 129 girls. The classes range from 18 pupils in Grade VIII to 43 in Grade I We have 18 tuition pupils in the elementary schools and 7 in the high school. Our average membership will be considerably higher than that of last year.

Many reasons contribute to the small number attending the high school. The two upper classes lost many members the last two years, the abnormal pay in the mills proving too great a temptation to the pupils of earning power. Fourteen pupils were graduated last year, and only eight were promoted from Grade VIII. After this year, the school will soon get back to normal numbers, as we shall lose nc registered seniors and the prospects are good for a large entering class.

Partly for economic reasons, but largely for the welfare of the pupil himself, arrangements were made to pay the tuition at Plymouth of the one senior. To be the only member of a class is somewhat of a discouraging proposition.

Doctor Orton was appointed medical examiner of

our schools for this year. The table below gives in comparative form the record of the examination.

A noted improvement is shown in the one year in the general condition of the children. Several cases are being treated at the present time, so that next year even better results should appear. Miss McDerby, the district nurse, has been of very great service to the school in the follow-up work.

The school committee are actively at work formulating plans for repairing the present fire escape so that it will be wholly safe. The pupils march out of the building by the stairway in less than one minute from the time the bell is rung for the practice drills, but the fire escape is a necessary part of the present building and in its present form it has many dangerous features.

The school work is going along very regularly and efficiently. The teachers are giving their wholehearted endeavors to their work, and a fine spirit of co-operation and harmony prevails.

The final grading of the elementary schools was practically completed last June. This accounts for the large percentage of pupils held back in the upper grades. It is an unwise policy to pass on deficient pupils, as they soon lose interest in vainly striving to do something for which they are not fitted The coming year, only the mormal percentage of pupils should necessarily be held back.

During the year, 225 different pupils were registered in the elementary schools and 48 in the high school. The average membership for our schools was 227. There were 22 tuition pupils, several of whom attended only a few weeks. The per cent of attendance for the year was 93, while that of the state was 91.6.

The District should be very grateful for having a school board that is so vitally interested in the welfare of their schools, and who give so ungrudgingly

of their services to promote the efficiency of the schools of Ashland.
