### WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department, including the services of the Firemen.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of the concrete streets and sidewalks.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the Town Library.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the District Nurse Association.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the Town Poor.

- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of continuing the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
- 12. To see what action the town will take in regards to selling the Electric Light Plant and Saw Mill.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to extend the electric lights on Thompson street as far as George Bryant's.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to cut down the number of lights on the cluster light system on Main street.
- 15. To see what action the town will take in regards to improving and widening the road at the junction of Main, River and Highland streets, and keep all permanent obstructions out of the highways of Ashland.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to install fire alarm boxes on Collins, West Main and Highland streets.
- 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the Town Debt.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to provide a suitable public bathing place and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to flood the Play Grounds for a Skating Rink.
- 20. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase and equip a truck for the use of the Fire Department.
- 21. To see if the town will pay for the bonding of the town officers.

### BUDGET



### To the Citizens of Ashland Special School District:

On March 1, 1924, a fire orginating in the attic threatened the destruction of the elementary school building, but through the energetic efforts of the firemen, the fire was confined to the upper story, although much damage by water was done to the lower floors. A satisfactory adjustment with the insurance companies was made; a temporary roof was put on, and on March 10, after only one week's delay, the building was reopened for regular school sessions.

During the summer vacation the building was thoroughly renovated. The burned timbers were removed, and replaced; a new roof with asbestos shingles was put on; the outside woodwork was painted two and three coats; new steps to the three doorways were built; the weather vane was gilded anew. Inside, metal ceilings were put on in all the rooms and halls throughout the building. All water-soaked plaster was removed and new plaster put on the walls, which were then painted light buff. All woodwork was revarnished, including the desks, which were either refinished or fitted with new tops as needed.

The lighting system was entirely changed. All old wiring was entirely removed. The new wiring is led through the building in metal conduits, and every connection is according to standard specifications. Each room is lighted from five hanging fixtures fitted with 125 watt lamps and frosted globes, insuring a light that is ample, yet is free from glare or shadows. This improvement in lighting has been long needed in this building.

Many little things, as replacing broken or cracked windows, repairing gutters, etc., were attended to. The building as it now stands is in first class condition, and we know of no repairs that will be needed on this

building for several years.

The brick coping on the roof of the high school building was taken down to the level of the roof, and relaid in cement mortar that will last. Formerly, water seeped into this brick work, froze during the winter, and pushed the bricks out of line. To insure this not being done in the future, a plank top was laid on the coping, and the whole covered with galvanized iron. The roof of the building was re-surfaced, and the chimneys re-topped. The roof is now water tight, as no leakage has shown in any place since the work was done.

Inside, the walls and ceilings were muriscoed in light cream, the woodwork was thoroughly cleaned and refinished where necessary. The two buildings now present a good appearance, both inside and out, and are a credit to the community.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

## To the School Board of Ashland Special School District:

I take pleasure in submitting my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools:

### **Program of Studies**

The curriculum for boys has been enriched by the addition of biology in the sophomore year. This subject is most desirable for boys of high school age, and the present class is finding it both interesting and profitable. A new microscope has been added to the equipment of the school, and will be found most valuable in all laboratory work in science.

It has long been recognized that high school pupils forget many of the fundamental operations learned in the lower grades, as their high school subjects do not require continue use of these basal facts and procedures. To keep alive these important operations in arithmetic, facts of geography and grammar, and standards in writing and spelling, fifteen minutes have been added to the school day, and all pupils are given drill on these elementary school subjects until definite standards are attained; the individual pupil is then released from that particular drill. Through this means, it is hoped that pupils going out from our high school will be able to use efficiently the common tools of learning, and have freshly in mind many practical facts learned in the grades, which, without reviewing, would most likely be forgotten.

### Parent-Teacher Association

The activities of the Parent-Teacher Association seem to fill a need that could not be filled by any other organization. The public meetings held are helpful and enjoyable. In September a reception was given to the teachers; in November, Mr. Norris J. Cotton gave a most interesting address on "New Hampshire;" at the January meeting, Mr. E. W. Butterfield, Commissioner of Education, spoke very skillfully and clearly on "Religion in the Public Schools." At the March meeting a program will be put on by the schools.

The health activities of the association are most important. A fund has been raised for providing milk and noon lunches for all deserving under-weight children; plans are in anticipation for looking after the teeth and diseased tonsils of needy children. On Tag Day last fall, \$70 was collected by the association for this work; later, this amount was increased by Mr. L. W. Packard, who voluntarily sent his personal check for \$100 for this fund. Milk is served every morning at the school, and hot lunches provided for children who bring their dinners.

Last spring, a dental clinic was held, and the teeth of over one hundred children were put in good condition, the work being done by our local dentist, Dr. Werden. We hope to make a similar arrange-

ment the coming spring.

For eight weeks last summer the association provided supervisiors for the playground. The apparatus donated by Mr. Packard was set up among the trees at the far end of the grounds, and was used by the smaller children throughout the day. The larger boys were taken care of largely through baseball activities. Arrangements should be made for providing the playground with water, both for drinking purposes and play activities. A basin could be built at small cost which would provide pleasure to many children for sailing boats and paddling.

### Physical Development Work in the Schools

Arrangements have been made for all pupils in the high school to have physical development exercises during the regular hours of school. The pupils of Grades VII and VIII have one regular period, and the pupils of the senior high, two periods, weekly. The use of the town hall has been granted to the school for this purpose, the school providing its own wood and janitor service. Basket ball practice for the school team is held every night after school hours. A girls' basket ball team has been organized this year; we shall hope to have this a permanent feature of our athletic activities.

An exhibition of all health activities of the elementary and high schools was given last fall. Regular school sessions were held Saturday morning; in the afternoon, the 300 school pupils marched through the main street of the town in class formations, headed by drum corps and flag carriers. The street in front of the post office had been roped off and many forms of the physical development and health exercises were given here by the various grades and groups.

The work in physical development is made possible through the special appropriation of \$300, and we trust this amount will be appropriated for the com-

ing year.

Standard Tests

The Stanford Achievement Test has been given to all the pupils in Grades III to XII. Papers have been scored, graphs made, and grades recorded. These papers are on a file at the school, and the standing of any pupil may be inspected by the parent upon application to the teacher in charge of the grade.
