To the inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department, including the services of the Firemen.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the town will vote to improve the Seven Pines Road and raise and appropriate money for the same.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of the concrete streets and sidewalks.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the Town Library.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the District Nurse Association.

10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the town poor.

11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of continuing the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

13. To see if the town will vote to construct and maintain a sewer to run from near the tenement of

Mrs. A. W. Harriman on Depot Street, and to follow along the general line of the small brook which now drains that region to the Squam River near the barn now owned by Fred E. Currier on Glove Street. Raise and appropriate money for same.

14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the town debt.

15. To see if the town will vote to provide additional equipment and apparatus for the Fire Department and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to buy a Tractor and Snow Plow and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to install a street light in front of John Ernest's house on Depot Street and extend the light line on Collins Street to provide a light near the bridge on Squam River near Elmer Goud's house.

18. To see what the town will do in regard to bill for shooting horse of John Ernest at the time Chief of Police Dow was shot Nov. 9, 1925.

19. To see if the town will vote to indemnify George E. Dow for time lost resulting from injuries received Nov. 9, 1925, while on duty as Police Officer of the town of Ashland.

20. To see what action the town will take in regard to selling the Electric Light Plant, Saw Mill, Water Privilege, Land, Transmission Lines and Equipment.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of aiding the Emily Balch and Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.

22. To see if the town will vote to make a test case of the way the valuation of some property was raised in 1925 and raise and appropriate money for the same, and elect a committee of three at this time to handle the same.

23. To see what action the town will take in regard to the land at the junction of Main, Highland, and River Streets, also on the side of River Street at the Mill Pond and the land on both sides of the bridge at the foot of Little Squam Lake.

24. To see what action the town will take in regard to officers that do not do what the town votes to do at the annual town meeting.

Attention is called to the large number of chimney fires that the department was called upon to attend to, twenty in all. Chimney fires are always dangerous, not only to the building in which the chimney is, but to adjoining property. It is expensive to the town for the Fire Department to have to clean out chimneys. Property owners should have their chimneys cleaned out at least once a year.

Three new Fire Alarm Boxes have been installed, as follows:

Box 55, Collins St., back of Ross Sanborn's.

Box 76, West Main St., near E. O. & F. J. Sanborn's.

Box 78, Highland St., near A. Kahler's.

The appropriation, made at last town meeting, for the installing of the above boxes, was \$500. It was found necessary to renew the wire, cross arms, etc., in many places. This extra work is responsible for the money spent by the Supt. of the Fire Alarm, in excess of the original appropriation.

Last year the appropriation for the Fire Dep't. was \$1,700. Of this amount over \$1,600 was spent for the salaries of the firemen, labor shoveling out hydrants, labor at Hose House, forest fires, etc. In order to meet the regular expenses for the coming year, to provide for the upkeep of our apparatus, the buying of new hose, new steam valve for the Fire Alarm at the Paper Mill, and other necessary equipment, an appropriation sufficient to cover these necessary expenses will be required.

During the month of August very much needed repairs were made on the Union School house under the direction of Mr. Amsden. The expense of these repairs were shared by the new Hampton School District. A coat of outside paint is needed and the underpinning should be looked after to make the job complete.

In November, 1925, it became advisable to reopen the Calley school. We were fortunate to obtain a trained and experienced teacher. At the present time there are 11 pupils in the school. The number will be a variable quantity, but will be sufficient to warrant the maintenance of a school there for two years presumably. The opening of this school reduced the tuition bill in the Plymouth district, also the cost of transportation. However the opening of the second school is requiring the expenditure of a larger budget than was anticipated and will cause us to suggest somewhat larger appropriations for the year 1926-1927.

Miss McAllister of the Union school attended the Plymouth Normal summer school last summer and will attend the Normal extension school in Coos County in the month of March.

The superintendent wishes to express an appreciation of the cordial manner and the courtesy which has been his to meet thus far in the school year.

#### To the Citizens of Ashland Special School District:

As stated by the Treasurer, our financial report, herewith published, is for the year which ended June 30, 1925, therefore a large part of the present school year has elapsed since the close of the year covered by this report.

Following a long established custom, the School Report is published with the Town Report. If the Citizens so desire, the report may be published soon after the close of the school year. In our last report we explained what had been done in the way of repairs and improvements, following the fire in the grade building.

A detailed account of expenditures for these repairs and improvements is given in this report, as the work was done during the year herein covered.

The concrete around the buildings and leading to School St., was re-covered during the summer. The plaster ceiling in the 8th grade room at the High School was so badly damaged that it was necessary to replace it.

This was done with steel ceiling and new lights were installed in this room. Safety locking devices have been placed on the main exit doors of both buildings, whereby the doors can never be locked from the inside and can always be opened from the inside by pressure against a bar. These were required by State law.

A few months before the close of the last school year, Supt. C. M. Harris, who had been with us for nearly seven years, tendered his resignation, that he might accept a position in Massachusetts. The resignation was accepted by your board, acting jointly with the boards of the other districts comprising this supervisory union. There were many applicants for the position of Superintendent, and after much consideration, Mr. Guy F. Williams of North Anson, Maine, was elected to the position. Mr. Williams promptly took up the work of supervision and is doing excellent work for us.

The question of fuel is a serious one. It was impossible to get Anthracite coal and the burning of Bituminous through two or three winters had seriously damaged the High School building, so that it was a problem as how best to heat that building. Your board finally decided to install oil burning equipment there, which was done and the building is being well heated by this method. A close comparison of the cost of heating with coal and with oil, is being made but we will be unable to determine which is the more economical until the heating season is over. As required by law, we herewith submit estimates for payments of the District debt:

Notes payable, \$1,000. Interest, \$10.00. This is the last payment for the High School building and is all the District owes.

We wish to thank the Citizens of Ashland Special School District for their interest in and generous support of our schools.

Woody Arithmetic Scales, grades 9 to 12.

Stone's Reasoning test, grades 5 to 8.

Haggerty Reading test, grades 1 and 2.

Pressey-Richards' American History test, grades 7, 8 and 12.

Rich's Chemistry test, grades 10, 11 and 12.

Herman's Latin and French tests, grades 9 and 10.

Monroe's Silent Reading test, grades 3 to 12.

A special teacher has been placed in the high school building to work with individuals and with groups of students who need special attention and help to rise to accepted standards for promotion in June. The elementary teachers are asked to follow the State Program of studies as a minimum requirement. And the teachers of grades 7 to 12 follow a special program of studies prepared for this school district and approved by the State Board of Education. This program of studies is based on the suggestive State Program for those grades.

Much appreciation should be expressed for the helpfulness of the Parent-Teacher Association to the school system of Ashland. Besides cooperating in every way with the regular work of the schools, it has done much to help in the physical and recreational life of the pupils in town; by means of its programs, much inspiration has been brought to the teachers and town's people; and during the winter months it has financed milk lunches at recess time and a hot dish of some nourishing food at noon time for those pupils whose weight is under normal or whose general health warrants special attention.

The work of the dictrict nurse, Miss McDerby, and the school physician, Dr. L. M. Orton, has been very helpful and beneficial. Both have manifested a fine spirit of interest and cooperation.

In closing, the superintendent wishes to extend thanks to the members of the school board for their many acts of helpfulness and thoughtfulness during the year; to the town's people for their fine spirit of cooperation and interest in the school; and to the teachers for their spirit of loyalty and earnestness; and to the pupils for their spirit of reverence and courtesy.
