## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at 9 (nine) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department, including the services of the firemen and fire alarm system.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the laying out, building and repairing of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of the concrete streets and sidewalks, and to see if the town will vote to extend the sidewalk on School Street to the home of Henry A. Jewell.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the increase and support of the Town Library.
8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the District Nurse Association.
9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the town poor.
10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of continuing the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the town debt.

13. To see if the town will vote to hire counsel for the purpose of enforcing the law in regard to the Childrens Bathing Beach and Bath House at the foot of Little Squam Lake and raise and appropriate money for the same and elect a committee of three by ballot to handle it.

14. To see if the town will vote to provide additional equipment apparatus for the Fire Department and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to buy a Tractor and Snow Plow and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to install new strainers at the Reservoir and build a new and enlarged Gate House, raise and appropriate money for the same or authorize the Seperintendent to finance the expenditure from the current revenue from the Water Works Department.

17. "Are you in favor of adopting the law to provide a pension for Firemen, Police Officers and Constables?" And if adopted to see what action the town will take in regard to George E. Dow.

18. To see if the town will vote to except the provisions of the bill introduced in the New Hampshire Legislature relating to the establishment of a state aid road leading from Ashland to New Hampton on the east side of the Pemigewasset River, provided the town of New Hampton takes similar action, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to exempt the Sons of Veterans from paying rent and electric lights for their quarters in the Town Hall building.

20. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway on Hicks Hill from the Taglibeau house to the highway leading from Holderness to Plymouth near the W. B. Smith place, also the highway from the Sam Holmes barn on the Lambert road to the old Leavitt Farm House.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Given under our hands and seal this nineteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twenty-seven.

Every thousand dollars more or less raised or of the outside money used to lower the rate will make a difference of about five cents of the above estimated rate.

During the year 1925-1926 the Union School was maintained for the whole year, admitting New Hampton pupils at a tuition rate of \$1.00 a week. The Calley School was maintained for the last 24 weeks of the year. There was a total registration of 26 pupils, 18 of whom were promoted to the next grade at the end of the year, and among those, Roger Amsden and Thelma Brown were promoted to high school work. The average attendance for the year was 93.65%.

There were 5 visits in the schools by School Board members, 28 by the Superintendent and 71 by citizens; and there were five meetings of the school board.

In the year 1926-1927 two schools were opened. At the end of the 16th week the Calley school was closed, the registration there having dropped to 3 pupils. The instability of the maintenance of homes in the Calley neighborhood has made it hard to figure the budget of finances for the year in advance. The school board feels at this writing that by the continuance of very strict economy, the budget of revenue will come very close if not fully meet the expenditures for the year.

For the year 1927-1928 the school board recommends a few repairs on Union School House.
