

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Ashland on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise \$5,625.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. to defray the expense of the Police Department.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500. to defray the expense of the Fire Department.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300. for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital, \$3,000 of which is to be used for the construction of the new hospital.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700. for the District Nursing Association.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. to defray the general expense of the Highway Department.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$318.65 for Town Road Aid. (State to contribute \$1,274.58).

- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. to defray the expense of repairing the Leatherboard Mill bridge.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. to defray the expense of surfacing School Street. (Petitioned).
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. to defray the expense of surfacing Glove Street. (Petitioned.) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for oiling streets.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the Capital Reserve Fund.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. for the Town Library.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the extension of the water main on West Main Street.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$195.00 for the Lakes Region Association.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for the Ashland Booster Club; this amount to be used for the installation of toilets, equipment and supervision of the Playground during the summer months.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. to move the World War I Memorial (now attached to the Town Hall) and the Spanish American War Memorial (now in the Town Hall yard) to the so-called Deane Lot on Main St., now known as a "Memorial to all war veterans." (Petitioned.)
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150. for Memorial Day.

- 21. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an annual audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175. to cover the expense of such audit. (Petitioned.) (Not recommended by Budget Committee.)
- 22. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Town Manager Plan as provided by Chapter 55 of the Revised Laws as amended. (Petitioned)
- 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000. for Town Manager's salary. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
- 24. To see if the town will vote to empower the Public Utilities Commission to appoint its own employees. (Petitioned)
- 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Public Utilities Commission to sell the Power Plant or any parts thereof that have become obsolete.
- 26. To see if the town will vote to grant to the Public Utilities Commission the right to manage Funds and Accounts derived from the operation of the Electric and water departments in order to allow the Public Utilities Commission to make each department self-supporting and to establish a reserve fund for each department. (Petitioned)
- 27. To see if the town will vote to transfer from its Capital Reserve Fund to the School District of said town, the funds, and interest thereon, heretofore raised and appropriated for the purchase of land and the erection of an assembly building.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to observe, during the month of August 1949, the 50th Anniversary of "Old Home Week" and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
- 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and that the notes evidencing such borrowing be payable one year and from the taxes of the current year.

- 30. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the Observation Post now located on Carr Avenue.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these

man-caused fires are preventable.

Today we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen

will help, as follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without

delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

#### REPORT OF PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION

The Town of Ashland, by vote under Article No. 27 in the Town Warrant of 1948, vested the construction, management, control, and direction of the Electric Light and Water Works Departments in a board of Commissioners, to consist of three citizens of the town. Roscoe M. Whitcomb, John A. Biladeau and Raymond J. Micklon were elected. Mr. Whitcomb and Mr. Biladeau resigned. Albert Cote and Oliver LaPointe were appointed to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations, until the Town Meeting of 1949. As a result of the temporary appointments, the voters must at the Town Meeting of 1949, elect a Commissioner for a period of three years to succeed Mr. Cote who was appointed for the unexpired term of Mr. Whitcomb, and elect a Commissioner for one year to succeed Mr. LaPointe, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Biladeau. Unfortunately, the powers of the Commission were not specifically defined at Town Meeting. A conference was requested with the Board of Selectmen and the Town's Attorney, Mr. Nighswander in order to prescribe the powers of the Com-The conference was held and the powers were prescribed. For the benefit of the Tax-Payers, the powers were advertised in the Ashland Citizen.

Under the laws of N. H.. each municipal utility is required to make an annual report to the Public Service Commission of the State. This annual report must be filed not later than March 31, of each year. The form of the report is prescribed by the Public Service Commission, pursuant to the provisions of Section 1, Chpt. 153 of the Law of 1935. The Town of Ashland filed its report for the period of 1943 to 1947, inclusive, but they were not accepted by the Public Service Commission. Under the law, the Town could have been severely penalized. Before the Public Utilities Commission was qualified, the Board of Selectmen engaged John E. Rich, C.P.A.. of Concord, to analyse the records and compile the reports for this period. The Public Utilities Commission reimbursed him

\$593.23 for his services. After this expenditure, Mrs. Doris Bavis was engaged to keep suitable accounts to satisfy the Public Service Commission, and has completed the records for the year of 1948.

The Board of Selectmen had previously authorized the construction of a new Primary Circuit from the Sub-Station to the corner of Winter and Mill Streets. The cest of this construction was \$4,803.15; exclusive of labor of Robert H. Eastman and his men.

It will be seen that the Public Utilities Commission paid for charges that were authorized before its inception.

The Public Utilities Commission understands and regrets the misunderstanding that the Property Owners seem to have about the Revised Water Rates. Both new rates and old rates were published in the Ashland Citizen. They are here printed for comparison purposes.

The Schedule of Water Rates, rules and regulations, adopted by the Board of Selectmen, Sept. 5, 1894, is in part as follows:

#### Annual Domestic Rates

The total of rates collectible from each service shall be at least \$6.00 per annum.

Family not exceeding 8 persons, for one faucet \$6.00

Two families or more on one service (same owner)

The old rates were set up in 1894. Ashland at that time had 6 bathtubs, 10 water closets, and 6 washbowls. It is evident that many changes have been made in almost all houses and business places, since 1894. Few adjustments had been made in the Water Rents. The Commission found some property owners with 2, 3, or 4 apartment houses paying about the same rate as others with single houses. Many single houses were paying a very low rate. A revisal in rates was necessary.

The Public Utilities Commission conferred with the Asnland Paper Mills and the L. W. Packard & Co. mills, in regard to the revisal of Water Rates. They agreed that the rates were very outdated and voluntarily agreed to pay an increase in Water Rates for the Mills of about 10%.

The Public Utilities Commission is unable to give an exact financial picture insofar as the Water Works Dept. is concerned. It has been the custom for the Water Works Dept. to have two collections annually, one in January and the other in July. The 1948 January Collection was started during Dec., 1947. The collection amounted to \$2,287.26. This amount of money was turned over to the Town Treasurer prior to Jan. 1, 1948, and was credited to the Water Works Dept. for the year 1947. It is evident that the sum of \$2,287.26, collected for Jan. 1, 1948 Water Rents should have been credited to the Water Works Dept. for 1948. Such credit was not given.

As a result there was only one Water Rent Collection (in July) to credit to the Department as Revenue for the year 1948. As you study the financial statement it is evident that the Water Works Dept. shows a Net Loss of \$458.66. If the sum of \$2,287.26 had been credited to this Dept. as it should have been, the Water Works Dept. would have shown a creditable profit.

The Public Utilities Commission has a detailed Physical Inventory, including Stock on Hand, in both departments. The equipment and stock of the Electric Light Dept. is housed in the Town Garage and that of the Water Works Dept. is housed in the former tractor shed, in the rear of the Fire Station.

The books of the Public Utilities Commission and any information are available to any Tax-Payer at any time.

The Public Utilities Commission wishes to thank Robert H. Eastman, Supt. of Electric Lights and Albert P. Blake, Supt. of Water Works, for their cooperation.

#### Remarks:

The Electric Light Department purchased 658,113 K.W.H. of current from the Public Service Co. of N. H. The above mentioned buildings and Street Light system consumed 84,038 K.W.H. in the specified periods. The cost of K.W.H. of current, plus cost of maintenance is estimated at 3c per K.W.H. Computed at this rate, the Electric Light Dept. has supplied the Town of Ashland with \$2,521.14 of current as detailed above. Had we had the figures for the entire year, it would have been much more. A meter was installed in the Fire Station on Dec. 1, 1948. These details do not include the Scribner Memorial Bldg. as that meter had not been read regularly. We plan to have all meters in Town Buildings read regularly and the Commission can give the townspeople exact figures on this in the next Town Report.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### Our School Buildings

The major building improvement during the past summer was the completion of the interior painting of the elementary school, including four classrooms, halls and stairways. The oil burner at the shop had been reported as unsafe and has been replaced by a new unit. Fluorescent lights have also been installed in the shop as recommended last year.

The improvement that seems most needed at the present time is the installation of better lights in the elementary grade rooms. The new lights in our high school laboratory presents a very striking contrast to those provided for our pupils in the elementary grades. An investment in better illumination ought to make it unnecessary for so many of our young children to be fitted to glasses before they get to high school.

#### Increasing Enrollments

Last year it was reported that there were 38 in the first grade. This year's enrollment shows 36. A reasonable maximum for one teacher to handle in the primary grade is 25. While Mrs. Keniston has been doing very commendable work with the large class assigned to her, it goes without saying she could do much more for each individual if the group were not so large.

Figures for the state of New Hampshire as well as for the country as a whole go to prove that the next few years will see a great increase in all primary school enrollments. The little folks are coming. It seems to me a very short time indeed before Ashland as well as many other towns in this state must make more adequate provision for elementary school pupils.

#### School Marks

One of the commonest complaints that people bring to the superintendent and school board is that their children are not getting good marks, and they often blame the teacher. It would seem that any teacher who is willing to give pupils A's and B's, whether they have earned them or not, is considered a good teacher. On the other hand, most of us older persons can remember some one teacher who was really a severe marker but who taught us more than many others who were more lenient. The really important question for parents is, Are my children learning and gaining more power? instead of, Do they get A's and B's?

Some educational writers advocate dispensing with school marks altogether. Perhaps this would be a good thing; but parents seem to expect them and pupils will work hard to get better marks. I do feel strongly that a teacher should not be blamed if a pupil's marks are low. The chances are she is really teaching more than some teachers who take the easy road to give Johnny and Marie an A just because they tried hard, whether they understood the work or not.

# Cooperative School Districts

The problem of over-crowded schools is not confined to Ashland. The school board, as requested by the vote of the district last year, has met with other school boards in this area to investigate the possibility of a cooperative school district under the laws of 1947. From all directions the same report of over-crowded conditions was heard. The little ones keep coming in and we have not room to teach them.

One solution to the problems of all these districts might be the formation of a cooperative district for high school purposes and the construction of a central high school which would take care of all secondary pupils in this area. This would mean that Ashland high school as a separate institution would no longer exist but it would be merged into a larger regional high school along with one or two other small schools in this section of the state. The building facilities now used for high school purposes in all these towns might then become available for the increased number of grade children so they could be adequately housed for some years to come.

This is a very radical proposal and it may not turn out to be the right or reasonable thing to do. The only alternative, however, that I can see is the construction of additional elementary buildings in the various towns that they may provide room for the little ones who keep coming in. Then, if we do have to build a new primary school in 1950 or 1951, how will we care for the larger group that will be ready for high school six or eight years later?

# New Hampshire Legislative Program

Several fundamental changes in our school laws for New Hampshire are under consideration in the 1949 legislature. Among these are (a) continued state aid, with some increase in certain towns so good schools can be maintained without excessive tax rate; (b) a law permitting higher rates for tuition so high schools will not be forced to continue to accept tuition pupils at less than cost; (c) state aid for transportation of high school pupils; (d) some state aid for new school buildings, and (e) encouragement for formation of cooperative school districts in various areas of the state.

It seems likely that a program of Federal Aid to help pay for new construction, as well as current expenses of schools, may be voted by this present Congress. The uncertainty as to what changes will be made in school laws at this time makes it advisable to postpone plans for new construction or forming of larger cooperative districts for another year at least. Let us find out where we are going before we start—and let us try to plan a long-range program as far as possible, facing the increased enrollments that are expected in Ashland as well as in the state and nation as a whole.

# The Parent-Teacher Association

Appreciative mention should be made here of the interest and enthusiasm shown for the newly formed Ashland Parent-Teacher Association. It is too early to cite specific accomplishments by this organization, but the large attendance at the start and the business-

like and cooperative attitude of officers and committees lead us to hope that the community and teaching staff can work together in many ways for the benefit of the children.

## REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

I herewith submit the report of the headmaster of Ashland high school for the first half of the 1948-49 school year.

#### Curriculum

The program offered this year compares favorably with that offered by many of the much larger schools. This has been made possible through diligent work of the teaching staff and the cooperation of the student body.

This year, we have attempted to vitalize school work by having qualified students work in town on jobs offering actual practice closely related to school subjects. One pupil, to date, has done this with excellent results. We hope to extend this program as fast as we can offer qualified workers and local businesses find opportunities to use and help train them.

Driver Training had to be dropped this year as no qualified instructor was available. I believe this was unfortunate for recent surveys show that more than 90% of present high school students will be drivers during adulthood. Further surveys show that graduates of driver-training courses are involved in 60% fewer accidents than comparable groups not taking the course. This saving in lives, injury and property loss returns many-fold the cost of instruction. Certainly, one of the crying needs of the present day is greater safety on the highways. I believe the vital answer is to train future drivers before they drive.

The increasingly popular Hot Lunch Program, which began operations the second week of school, has served an average of one hundred forty-three pupils daily. The important part this program plays in building healthy minds and bodies cannot be estimated. It not only fills the need for a hot, substantial, balanced meal; but it offers an opportunity to correlate good manners, bodily food requirements, meal planning and social attitudes for group conduct with class work in

all grades. The credit for the successful operation of the program goes to Mrs. Moody, Mrs. St. Arnauld, Mrs. Kimball, student helpers and many interested citizens who have given fruit, vegetables, money, time, etc.

#### Guidance

One of the most challenging problems in education today is guiding pupils to select vocations they are suited for and to help them plan to become adequately qualified so that they may lead profitable and well-adjusted lives.

Through the use of Personality Interests Tests, Vocational Interests Tests and Mental Maturity Tests, one may build fairly reliable objective data on each pupil, but more important is incorporating this information into the pupil's program. This necessitates curriculum modification. It demands that each program be planned in line with the economic facilities of the home and community—this necessitates unlimited cooperation between homes and schools.

## **Athletics**

The athletic program must do more than turn out good basketball and baseball clubs; it must help build strong bodies for the entire student group; it must offer corrective exercises for posture and unbalanced development of bodies; it must inculcate good sportsmanship through active participation and support of participants; and increasingly important, it must produce social beings with interest and skill in sports as a constructive fulfiller of leisure time.

Mr. Snow has run the Physical Education and Intra-mural Programs in line with these objectives. I personally feel he has done a fine job and congratulate him for his success. The immediate measure of this success is the constant flow of favorable comments from visiting teams; the ultimate measure is the enriched lives these future citizens will lead.

# Pupil Activities

Through technological developments, the working day and week have been greatly reduced. With this change has come an unprecedented increase in the leisure time which confronts each citizen. One or two things must inevitably result—either constructive use of leisure time in hobbies, personal enrichment and social activities, or destructive use of leisure in wasted time, crime and anti-social behavior.

To prepare future citizens for the better use of their free time, the school offers an activity period of one hour or more each week. It is during this period that the various clubs and activities meet. Clubs this year are Knitting and Sewing, Dancing, Indoor Recreation, Girls' Shop, Art, Literary, Dramatics, Glee Club and Personal Typing.

### Glances Ahead

In the face of an ever-increasing enrollment and our present crowded conditions new problems are bound to arise. Greater numbers of pupils not only will necessitate larger facilities, but also will present greater diversity of needs; these increased needs will be met only through more offerings and trained personnel.

It is imperative that much thought and planning be given by all agencies involved to assure that the best possible solution will be reached.

I wish to thank the staff, the school board, parents, citizens, pupils and Mr. Bushnell for support and cooperation, for therein lies the credit for a successful school year.
