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TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Report to the Taxpayers of Ashland, N. H.

This report covering the activities of the Town of Ashland for the year 1952, is to acquaint you briefly with the financial condition of the Town and the accomplishments of your chosen officials.

The Selectmen met with the Manager every week during the year with one exception, when it was inconvenient for some of the members and the need for answers to existent problems, was not immediate. That is a record of which the Board of Selectmen may justly be proud.

Your Manager attended the meetings of the State Association of Managers, where problems of individual communities as well as those concerning the group as a whole were discussed. In addition, four days of his vacation were spent at the New England conference of Managers, which is held annually at Orono, Maine, under the sponsorship of the Department of Government of the University of Maine.

Included in this report is a complete financial report along with brief summaries both written and pictorial of the activities of the various departments of the government. Further details relative to the operation of these departments are available at the Manager's Office. Sincere requests by the citizens to better learn how their municipal government operates and suggestions for its improvement, will be always welcomed.

Town Warrant for 1952

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said Ashland on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To see if the Town will vote to keep the Town Manager plan as provided in Chapter 55 of the Revised laws as amended. Yes—270. No—159.
- 3 Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised laws relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town. Yes—319. No—49.
- 4 To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age & Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$590.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof, being 2% of the estimated total Town payroll for all employees and officials for the year 1952. Voted to adopt.
- 5 If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Board of Selectmen as the officers to be responsible for the administration of the plan. Voted.
- 6 To see if the Town will approve and adopt the special recommendations of the Budget Committee and vote to raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the Budget as follows:

7 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$50,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year. Voted.

8 To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken by the Town to adopt the so-called Australian Ballot, the same now being in use, and to see if the Town will vote to adopt in place thereof, the Non-Partisan ballot system, as provided in the Election Laws for 1952, Chapter 34, Sections 112 to 125, the system not to be in effect in said Town until the Town Meeting next following the meeting at which such action is taken. (Petitioned). Voted.

- 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the removal of a large boulder on Thompson Street, opposite the R. M. Whitcomb's garage, which hinders traffic dangerously; also for the widening, grading and oiling of High Street which is off Thompson Street in said Ashland, New Hampshire. Drainage of surface water is very inadequate. (Petitioned—appropriation not recommended by the Budget Committee). Voted \$1,000, but declared illegal vote by State Tax Commission—not allowed.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to take over and maintain as a Town Road the piece of road running from Winter Street to Farmer's Grain Store and to empower the Selectmen to take any necessary action thereto. (Petitioned). Voted.
- 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the construction of a new sidewalk on River Street. (Petitioned—petition received too late for Budget Committee consideration) Voted. But declared illegal vote by State Tax Commission and not allowed.
- 12 To see if the Town will vote to plow all driveways and roads leading to houses of taxpayers, which has been done in the past. (Petitioned) Dismissed.
- 13 To see if the Town will vote to reopen the Brogan Road, so-called. (Petitioned) Dismissed.
- 14 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- 4 To see if the Town will approve and adopt the special recommendations of the Budget Committee and vote to raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the budget as follows:

- 5 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$50,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.
- 6 To see if the Town will vote to have the State Tax Commission reappraise all improved property in the Town for assessment purposes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 to defray the cost thereof.
- 7 To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of House Bill 44 as finally adopted by the General Court relative to the financing of T. R. A. construction, and to raise and appropriate a sum or sums not exceeding \$20,000 for the purpose of accomplishing such T. R. A. construction as shall be permitted under such law as finally adopted by the General Court, such sum or sums to be raised through the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, and amendments thereto, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes, and to determine the time and place of payment thereof, under such terms and conditions as they may deem to be in the best interests of the Town. (Two-thirds vote required for adoption).
- 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of relocating the telephone and electric light poles and rebuilding and resurfacing of Leavitt Hill Road. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters).
- 9 To see if the Town will vote to reconstruct Highland Street from Summer Street to the top of the hill near the driveway to the residence of Mrs. L. W. Packard and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to defray the cost thereof.
- 10 To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Ashland for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Water and Electric Light Departments, Municipal Court and Library.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1951 and December 31, 1952, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Surplus increased by \$3,849.34 in 1952.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures —Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$764.19, plus a net revenue surplus of \$1,725.22, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,489.41.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1952, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

It is noted that the Town maintained a current surplus position in 1952, as shown by the following statement:

Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer is written in the amount of \$5,000.00. Inasmuch as the total amount of the Treasurer's receipts in 1952 was \$184,581.13, the amount of the surety bond is disproportionate and should be increased in 1953 to \$12,000.00.

Conclusion:

The accounts of the officials which we examined were found to be in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Ashland for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Report of Town Clerk

During the past year, there have been 46 births, 36 deaths and 25 marriages recorded in the Town of Ashland. The average age of our deaths being 62.2, follows the pattern of our entire State, in that people are living longer in New Hampshire.

This office has warned three elections this past year; i. e. Town Meeting in March, the Primary in September, and the Presidential Election and Biennial in November.

There were 170 Dog licenses issued as against 143 last year.

Automobiles taxed during the year numbered 662 as against 731 for the previous year.

Besides the usual records kept and filed in the Town Clerk's Office, reports have gone out to various agencies, bureaus and Town Offices at the average rate of 10 per month.

The duties of a Town Clerk today are much more complex than ever before and a vast knowledge and background of experience is necessary to conduct the office in a comprehensive manner, the scope of its activities being spread over a period of years. Records have become such an important part of our daily life that the keeping of the same also becomes a primary factor.

Library Report

Cooperation with our schools to make our Library more helpful to the students continues, evidenced by the groups which may be found there evenings when the Library is open.

The World set of reference books is proving inadequate, and we are happy that the interest from the Ordway fund has now accumulated to the point where it can be supplemented with a small amount from the regular book fund to purchase another but equally good set of reference books. These we hope to obtain in the near future.

The "Children's Digest," a magazine purchased last year, has proved so very popular we now have two subscriptions to this magazine. The Ashland Citizen may now be read in the Library and "Current Biographies" is still another magazine we feel is going to be very helpful to our high school students in their reference work. We now have upwards of twenty-five magazines and papers on our magazine rack.

Believing one method of combatting the present obscene literature menace is to supply entertaining, worthwhile reading matter for those whose reading habits are in the formative stage, particular attention is being given to the selection of books for children of pre-school age, through the grades and high school.

We are starting two new bookshelves, one for reference books (adults) and a hobby shelf. These are both in their infancy, but we hope to see them grow.

It has been suggested that our fiscal year be made to coincide with that of the Town. This will take a little time, but we hope to accomplish it in the next twelve months. There will of necessity, always be a balance, due to the fact we have planned insurance and magazine programs, and the interest from the trust funds will be allowed to accumulate until something worthwhile, not otherwise obtainable, can be purchased.

We would call attention to the fact this is one department that has not for some years requested an increase in its appropriation, and it is only by looking ahead we are able to accomplish as much as we do.

New copper piping has been installed throughout the building, replacing old galvanized piping.

The interior of the main building was redecorated to the extent of painting and papering the directors' room, the bathroom and the cemetery room, and the floors of these rooms were refinished. A door was cut through the lower toilet room so that this room is now accessible from either the library or the District Nurse rooms.

It is the thought of the Trustees that an emergency reserve should be held back each year from the income, so that any major repair may be taken care of when necessary. It is planned to have the buildings repainted this coming year and purchases have been made to that end.

For most persons the detailed financial report does not present a good picture of the accomplishments and procedures of the various departments and units of government. So that you may better understand, a brief review of some of the accomplishments are presented in the following paragraphs.

Policy :

In addition to their duties as assessors of all properties, the Board of Selectmen had a very busy year. They met with the Manager every week of the year with one exception. In considering the welfare of the Town they :

Approved the use of Church Street for children to slide.
Arranged a temporary lease of the Town Hall for use by the Paper Mill.

Established the policy that all departments should be separately metered for electricity consumed and a separate account be maintained for each meter.

Reactivated the Planning Board.

Signed an agreement with the State and Federal Government to accept O. A. S. I.

Transferred the T. R. A. project from Leavitt Hill Road to Highland Street.

Transferred the Town Hall to the School District as directed by Town Meeting.

Authorized spraying of ragweed and poison ivy in cooperation with the Woman's Club.

Authorized employment of full time Supt. of Water Department.

Determined location of Street Construction projects.

Established terms and conditions for the administration of the Water Department.

Legalized an ordinance regulating parking of vehicles on certain streets.

In addition there were many more questions considered and answered, far too numerous to try to list here.

Administration :

The problems in this field were many. The winter in the early part of the year was an extremely difficult one because of the frequency and magnitude of the storms. It became evident before the year had progressed very far

that the budgetary limitation on clerical assistance meant that more than a fair share of the manager's time needed to be spent as a bookkeeper. The records of the electric department were improved and many delinquent accounts collected under the terms of an ordinance adopted the previous year. Under the provisions of the same ordinance a deposit of \$5.00 was to be secured from all new accounts. It was the signified intention of the Selectmen that eventually all customers would have such a deposit with the department, to be returned when the account was closed. Some have felt that for some reason it should not apply to them, but in all fairness if it applies to one it must apply to all. Nearly all purchasing was done through the Manager's office with competitive bidding for major expenditures. Due to continued shortages, particularly in brass and copper, many materials had to be purchased wherever they could be located.

The alarming drop in the level of our water supply was for several months a real cause of concern. Nature provided the solution with rain in the nick of time, however, had it been snow instead the situation would have been extremely serious. The accounts of the Water Dept. were found to be inequitable as far as the application of rates were concerned. These were brought into line. Some customers experienced a raise in rates and some were decreased, but to the best of our knowledge all customers have been assessed for the coming period on the same basis, without discrimination or favoritism.

Many hours of the Supt. of the Electric Department have been spent in the search for local causes of radio noise. The new street lighting transformer on the circuit covering the north and west parts of Town accomplished its purpose, with illumination much improved. The transformer on the other circuit is now being checked to see if that circuit can't also experience a similar improvement.

Due to the fact that property owners abutting Leavitt Hill Road, which had been set up as the T. R. A. project for the previous year, were unwilling to provide land determined necessary by the State engineering staff who control this construction, the Selectmen abandoned this road as the current project and designated another where this problem would not be encountered.

The problems were numerous and no doubt there will be just as many for the future although of a different nature.

Municipal Court

Ashland's Municipal Judge experienced a slight increase in his judicial duties during the past year. The trend toward increasing complexity in reporting details to other governmental units is evident here as well as in the other branches of local government which means the preparation of additional records and their preservation for immediate reference.

The activities of the past year included 26 criminal cases, of which 16 were motor vehicle violations; 7 for drunkenness and 3 various misdemeanors; 2 juvenile cases were entered and in addition 79 small claims cases. In 51 cases judgment was entered after hearing and judgment was entered after default in the remaining 28.

Public Safety

The Police Department experienced a change in its leadership when on April 14, Chief Hodgdon resigned to accept other employment. The applicants to fill this post were not numerous and of those submitted, on the basis of apparent qualifications, education and experience, Harold E. Knowlton, Jr., a local man, was elected to fill this post. His experience was in the military service rather than as a civil officer, so he had and still has, a great deal to learn in his present office. There were 14 arrests necessary during the year. Of these, six were Motor Vehicle Violations; two for assaulting an officer; three for disturbing the peace; two for drunkenness and one for petty larceny. There was one fatal accident when an oil tank truck plunged into the river at Little Squam Bridge and the driver was drowned. The transient problem was noticeably less with but 12 meals furnished to individuals during the entire year as compared to 75 for 1951. The past policy of giving courtesy warnings for minor traffic violations on the first offense is being continued but it is the intent that other action will be taken upon repeated offense. In general we have been what might be considered a peaceful community.

The Ashland Fire Department experienced an unusually quiet year. There were eighteen still alarms, two of which were out of town chimney fires; six of the remaining 16 runs were for chimney fires in Ashland; six for grass fires, and four trips were to extinguish rubbish fires at the dump, which is an exceptionally small number when compared with the record for previous years. There were seven

whistle alarms, with three of those being for out of town buildings. Once, the equipment was called to a grass fire, another was to the Packard Mill when the wool on the dryer became ignited, and twice runs were made to the Ashland Paper Mill when pulp dust around a machine caught fire. The sprinklers were very effective in preventing a major conflagration, and it was here that the only real loss was suffered and a rough estimate would place that at somewhat less than \$4,000.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

TEAM WORK WILL DO THE JOB

Team work has won victories from time immemorial—for families, towns, cities, states and nations. Team work is the highest form and most democratic example of co-operation. Without team work, America and Americans would never have achieved the greatness that is theirs. We are all aware of its power and appeal. It is no less needed now than in the past.

Team work among those who live, work and recreate in and near the woodlands, is vital. There never was a time when our woodlands as a whole were in such precarious condition as they are now.

Since the hurricane, nearly 900,000 acres of slash have been added to our already sizeable slash problem. If we are to avoid unnecessary trouble with fire in our woodland areas, everyone must cooperate—we must have team work.

Highway Department

Snow removal costs for this year were extremely high with nearly \$8,000. or approximately one-half of all available funds for operation of the Department being spent for that purpose. Mr. Cross, the foreman, resigned in February, necessitating the appointment of another. Kenneth Symonds accepted temporarily and was later replaced with our present foreman, Edwin Roby, who seems to be proving quite satisfactory. Because of the large expenditures for snow removal, the activities of the department were somewhat curtailed for the remainder of the year. Money for essential culvert pipe and other materials just wasn't available. The resurfacing accomplished was much less than it should have been because necessary money was not provided in the final budget. Construction work was done on Washington, Collins and Thompson Streets. Washington Street was widened, graded, graveled and given asphalt surface; Collins Street was widened, graded and graveled, and Thompson Street was widened and graded preliminary to gravel base planned as part of the coming year's program.

The T. R. A. money was spent in reconstructing a portion of Highland Street. The land considered necessary for the Leavitt Hill project was not available and the Selectmen relocated the project to the Highland Street location. Here five culverts were installed, the road widened and rough graded for a distance of approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile. The gravelling and surface treatment remain to be accomplished under that program. Ashland was somewhat instrumental in presenting a bill before the Legislature which would permit a Town to borrow and complete a plan-

ned T. R. A. program, retiring the principal debt by the usual annual appropriation of the Town combined with the annual State allotment. The interest cost would be an added expense to the Town but would be small indeed for the economy, convenience and good will of having the roads in good shape at the start. The financing period has not been determined at this time, but will almost surely be for five years, and possibly ten.

Electric Department

Mr. Marsh, the Superintendent of the Electric Department, has managed to keep busy through the year. About 25% of his time is spent in meter reading and collecting done. Many hours were spent trimming in an endeavor to maintain the lines free of branches and limbs. Many more were spent searching for conditions causing the severe radio interference in some localities. Some were found in the electric lines, which have been corrected to the best of our knowledge. Many other sources are known but it is not in our power to have corrected because they are inside the houses or business establishments and while the cause can be pointed out there is now no legal way to force its correction. Neon signs, fluorescent lights and power oil burners are without doubt the worst offenders.

An extension of nearly 2,000 ft. was constructed for the Gallup Lumber Co., formerly Bernard Avery's Mill near the Union Bridge, under the provisions of the revised terms for extensions.

A new transformer of greater capacity was installed on River Street and the unsatisfactory lighting which prevailed formerly in the northern and western sides of the Town has been overcome. A similar improvement to the other circuit is planned, but at the present time it is not considered necessary to replace the transformer as preliminary investigation indicates considerable reserve capacity. It is in need of repairs, however.

Water Department

There was a marked departure in the conduct of the Water Department during the year. It is expected that all were aware that it had been conducted as a part time

operation in the past. A situation arose in August when it became necessary to employ the Superintendent on a full time basis or search for another individual. Consideration of the situation indicated that the wise move was to employ the former Superintendent on a full time basis as a public works employee, having in addition to the responsibilities of the Water Dept., several other regular duties, and subject to assignment to any department and type of work as his services are needed.

Maintenance in the past has been merely corrective in nature, practically nothing having been done in the way of preventive maintenance. Mains should be flushed several times a year to clear them of dirt and loose scales; all valves should be operated at least once a year to see that they can be closed tightly and that packings do not leak; hydrants should be checked every year to see that they operate readily and drain properly. Many of the older services need replacement, and there are a few new ones each year. In addition the chlorinator must be checked daily, and the injection pumps overhauled periodically, and the discharge gate at Jackson Pond has to be regulated to maintain the reservoir full but not overflowing, so as to waste much needed water.

During the past year there were but three leaks in the mains which required repair, a very small number considering the age of the system.

Thirteen services were repaired and nine were renewed. The hydrant at the intersection of Collins Street and New Hampton Road which has been hit by vehicles several times in past years and again this year was set back from the road so that the hazard from that cause should be greatly reduced. Guard posts were set to protect hydrants where cars are regularly parked as a preventive measure. Seven other hydrants were repaired. A new line was laid on Murray Street where the old line was found to be badly filled up.

The reservoir was completely drained and the accumulated silt cleaned out and the basin flushed down with water. A channel was blasted through a bar which lies between the intake and the deeper part of Jackson Pond, which enabled us to draw the pond down to a lower elevation during the critical period of last fall.

While the playground was in session there were 211 different children who signed up. There were no doubt a goodly number who did not sign. The average attendance was 110. For a period of four weeks the children were transported by bus three times a week to Little Squam for swimming instructions. The Arts and Crafts consisted mostly of basket weaving, finger painting and doll making. Plymouth Playground children enjoyed a field day at Ashland. The children were transported by bus to Bristol playground once for a field day and to Wellington Beach three times. Don Mullen, Life Guard at Wellington Beach, complimented the Ashland children by telling our instructors that they were the best behaved group that had been there during the season.

The Ashland Firemen's Auxiliary donated \$99.98 for tarring the skating rink near the Honor Roll. At the time the first coat was applied we did not expect that it would be sufficient to hold water but hope to apply another coat this year and expect that will complete the job. We, the Playground Commission, wish to express our thanks to all groups and individuals who contributed to make the playground a success this past year.

Minutes of School Meeting

March 6, 1952

The Moderator, Richard E. Merrill, read the Warrant and opened the business of the meeting as follows:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
On Motion, seconded, Richard E. Merrill was elected as Moderator, by the clerk casting one ballot.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
On motion, seconded, Lillian M. Young was elected Clerk, by the casting of one ballot by Clara Hinds. Then Richard E. Merrill and Lillian M. Young were sworn in as Moderator and Clerk, by Judge Thomas Pryor, and the meeting proceeded as follows:
3. To choose two members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
E. Alden Brown was elected a School Board member for the ensuing three years; and Letitia Calley, succeeding herself, was elected a School Board member for the ensuing three years.
- 3a. To choose a Member of the School Board for one year.
Mary Elizabeth Nielsen was elected a member of the Board for the ensuing year.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
Lillian M. Young was elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
On motion of Laurent Ruell, amended by Dr. Kaplan, it was voted to raise the sum of \$155.00 for this article.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
On motion of Hiram Gingras, it was voted to dismiss the article.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
On motion, it was voted to dismiss the article.

8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
After discussion of this article and a statement that the budget of the School Board embraced the appropriation made in article 5, Hiram Gingras made a motion, which carried, that article 5 be reconsidered. Upon motion of Dr. S. Feiner, it was voted that the District appoint a salary of nothing for the School Board members, a salary of \$100 for the Treasurer, and a salary of \$7.50 per meeting for the Moderator, a salary of \$25.00 for the Truant Officer, and a salary of \$15.00 for the census taker, a total of \$155. Motion carried. It was then moved by John A. Bilodeau, and seconded by Herman Pearson, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$79,191.77. Motion carried.

9. To see if the District will authorize or instruct the School Board to sell the land on which the school shop was located.
Homer Young made a motion to dismiss, which failed. Hiram Gingras then moved that the District be authorized to sell the land on which the school shop was located. Motion carried.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
On motion of Dr. H. S. Kaplan, with amendment attached, it was voted that the method of becoming a candidate for membership on the Board of the Ashland School District be by filing with the Clerk of the Ashland School District, at least two (2) weeks before the date of the Annual School District Meeting, a petition signed by at least ten (10) legal voters of the Ashland School District, and the candidate, declaring his or her candidacy. Only such candidates who have filed with the Clerk of the Ashland School District at least two (2) weeks before the Annual School District Meeting

shall be eligible to have their names appear on a printed ballot, which legal voters shall have distributed to them at the time of the Annual District Meeting, for the purpose of selecting the required member or members to the Ashland School District Board for whom there shall be vacancies. This method to become effective, upon passage for the future, beginning March 1953.

Amendment Attached. Should there be no candidates who file, then the School District will proceed to ballot from nominations made at the School District Meeting.

John A. Bilodeau requested a report on the remodelling of the Town Hall and this was given by Dr. S. Feiner with a statement that, due to increase in the over-all town budget, that the Board had agreed to go along with the Town and use only the insurance money to take care of the necessary remodelling and outfitting of the Shop.

Report of Superintendent and Principal

Increasing Enrollment

The problem of increasing enrollment is beginning to hit Ashland. This year's first grade is composed of thirty-six children; the second grade was small this year, so six first graders were moved into the second grade room to carry on first grade work.

From the census report it appears that the first grade for 1953-54 will be about thirty-eight. As this is too many for any first grade teacher to do a good job with, it seems that a new classroom and teacher will be necessary if these children are to have a fair chance to get off to a good start.

As next year's second grade will be composed of about thirty-six, there will be no room in the second grade room for first graders next year.

We firmly believe the start made in the first grade will largely determine a pupil's successes in years to come, and therefore overcrowding cannot be permitted in this grade in fairness to pupils.

Progress in Fundamentals

Our improvement of reading work has produced very marked improvement in the reading and study habits of the students. The several tests show that individual and grade achievements have been raised several points. With this improvement, it has been possible to raise our standards, and we should continue this program and progress.

A number of districts in the state have been well pleased with results of the Rinéhart Handwriting System. This program involves monthly visits by an expert instructor, who provides guidance and materials for the regular teacher. The cost for Ashland of such service would be about \$500 a year, and we believe it would be a good investment.

The teachers are increasingly using parent-teacher pupil conferences to help give parents a better idea of the achievement, strength, and weaknesses of each pupil. Through this understanding should come greater cooperation which will foster more pupil growth.

As pupils come to understand themselves better, they should increasingly desire greater growth; this can come only through better work habits; these can come only through more study at school and at home.

School Marks

The topic, "Methods of Reporting Pupil Progress," has received much attention in teachers' meetings and parent-teacher groups throughout this supervisory union during the past year. An individual conference between a teacher and a parent (sometimes the pupil also being present) seems to be the most satisfactory method of reporting, especially for the lower grades.

In November, a three-day workshop of teachers and parents on this subject was held at Ashland. As usual, many questions were raised and few answered at these meetings; but several points seemed to be generally accepted. A few of these are stated below:

(1) School marks (either "A-B-C-D" or percentage) are undesirable because they emphasize unfair competition and create fear of failure.

(2) A pupil's growth in learning involves so many factors that it is impossible to reduce it to any single mark, either letter or number.

(3) A mark of C may be given by one teacher for a certain piece of work, whereas another teacher might give a mark of A for the same. No clear definition of marks has ever been made that can overcome this difference of opinion.

(4) Parents seem to favor having more detailed reports, covering a pupil's growth in character, good work habits, etc., even though the reports do not come so often.

(5) Parents are becoming accustomed to the idea of discussing with the teacher the progress of their children. No longer do they dread the teacher's coming, or meet her at the door with the question, "What is wrong now?" A friendly visit to the school by each parent is coming to be accepted as regular routine.

Our Vocational Program

Our new shop is developing into one of which we may well be proud. The new equipment makes precision work possible and already much better projects are being produced. This builds up gradually and should show improvement each year.

For pupils desiring vocational courses not available locally, the State will pay tuition at a vocational school elsewhere. One of our Ashland boys is taking a course in agriculture at Laconia high school, under this plan.

The need for variety of courses of a vocational nature becomes more evident year by year. This need can never be met within the curriculum of the small high school. Other states are finding the regional or cooperative high school the best answer to this problem; and we firmly believe that Ashland would benefit by joining with other nearby districts to work out its plan for improved school facilities, rather than trying to carry its own burden alone.

Preparation for Further Study

More of our students are going on to school. This is as it should be. A high school education is now comparable to an elementary education fifteen years ago, as far as getting jobs is concerned. The industrial pace now requires much better preparation of those seeking jobs; therefore the school and pupils have a much greater responsibility to meet these higher standards. More studying, better preparation, and greater achievement must be our goals. To all this must be added social and emotional health, and civic training. It is a big order, but by parents, teachers, and pupils working together, it CAN be done.
