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Town Manager's Report

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Fellow Citizens:

Once again another year has come to a close and we can look back over the progress that has been made through the efforts of town officers and employees with your cooperation. Some of the projects that were completed during the year consisted of:

Road Construction: Highland street was rebuilt. It cost more than was estimated, due to the fact more work was done than planned for and instead of an asphalt penetration surface we applied an asphalt mix job, which makes for a better road.

Tree Care: All of the trees in the compact area were sprayed to do away with the moths that we were bothered with in 1953. This spraying policy will be carried out again this year.

Electric Department: With connection to the telephone conversion a lot of old lines and poles were replaced which will improve our present system.

Water Department: A lot of new copper services were installed in houses that replaced their old piping with copper. This is a good policy to continue; for copper will not rust, thus giving the water customers a maximum of pressure.

The Pay Loader which was purchased in '54 has proved itself time and time again. Not only has the town a piece of equipment that can be used all the time but it has allowed us to cut \$1,200.00 off the hired equipment appropriation on Town Maintenance.

I wish to thank the Selectmen, town employees and the citizens of Ashland for the cooperation given me in the past year. If there are any questions or problems you would like to discuss with me, please come to the office at any time and I will be more than glad to help you.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Ashland, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said Ashland on Tuesday the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 Shall the Provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws, relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town? (According to State Law this Article will appear on the printed ballot.)
- 3 To see if the Town will approve and adopt the special recommendations of the Budget Committee and vote to raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and located in the Budget as follows:

- 4 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$50,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.
- 5 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Town scales.
- 6 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the standing lumber by selective cutting near the reservoir.
- 7 To see if the Town will vote to adopt Sect. 5 of Chapter 109 of the Revised Laws relative to street names and markers as follows: "In all Towns every street shall

have a name which will be given it by the Selectmen. Said name shall be legibly marked on a suitable sign board or other marker and placed in at least two conspicuous places in said street. The Selectmen may change the name of any street at any time when in their judgement there is occasion for so doing. When a change is made in the name of any street the Selectmen shall make a return of the same to the Town Clerk who shall make a record thereof." Recommended by the Planning Board.

- 8a To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$17,300.00 for the purchase of the socalled Effie and Helen McMillan property with frontage on Little Squam Lake.
- b To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow and pay up to \$17,300.00 on the credit of the Town, for the financing of the property in 8a above, under a 5-year bond and term note issue, payable in 5 equal yearly installments, with interest not to exceed three and one-half percent.
- 9 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Old Holmes Road.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the buildings adjacent to the Town Dam and improve the general appearance of that area.
- 11 To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Budget Committee felt that this amount should be left to the decision of you voters and if you vote to buy this property to be developed into a bathing beach the purchase price will be spread over a 5-year period. The purchase price of the property is \$17,300.00. The Budget Committee will add the purchase price to the budget after Town Meeting if the Town votes to buy this property.

The Town budget for 1955 is decreased from 1954 by \$9,948.64.

If the Town approves the purchase price of the McMillan property the first year payment and interest will be approximately \$4,000.00 which will be added to the proposed budget for 1955. To pass the Article regarding the McMillan property there must be a 2/3 vote in favor of the number of votes cast on this Article.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Ashland for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereinafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Water and Electric Light Departments, Municipal Court and Library.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets

December 31, 1953 - December 31, 1954: (Exhibit A) Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1953 and December 31, 1954, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein,, the Surplus decreased by \$913.23 in 1954. Analysis of Changes in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations & Expenditures Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$3,322.92, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,288.39, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,034.53.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1954, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Ashland for their assistance during the course of the audit.

In accordance with the foregoing warrant as published, and at the time and place specified therein, the meeting was called to order by the moderator who proceeded to read the warrant.

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Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Ashland School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1954, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Application of Municipal Budget Law:

The comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures indicates a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$92.59. It is noted, however, that there were accounts payable on June 30, 1954, amounting to \$1,078.66, as shown by Exhibit G.

The Town of Ashland has adopted and operates under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 52 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, as amended). Section 5 of this Law provides as follows:

"5. Exceeding Appropriations. In towns adopting the provisions of this chapter, no board of selectmen, school board, commissioners of a village district wholly within said town, or other expending agency shall pay or agree to pay any money or incur any liability involving the expenditure of money for any purpose for which an appropriation has not been made, or in excess of any appropriation or allotment made to it, except for the purpose of paying judgments rendered against the town or school district or said village district, provided, however, that in case of sudden and unexpected emergency the selectmen or village commissioners on application

to the state board of education, after hearing, may be given a certificate of emergency authorizing them to make such expenditure or incur such liability, provided that no such certificate of emergency shall be granted unless the budget committee of the town has approved the expenditure. In cases arising during the year following the annual meeting where changes occur which make it unnecessary to use the amount appropriated for the village commissioners of such village district from one appropriation to another, provided the total amount expended for all purposes does not exceed the total amount appropriated at the town, school or village district meeting for all purposes."

It is noted that contrary to the provisions of this section (1) liabilities were incurred in excess of unexpended appropriation balances, and (2) application was not made by the school board to the state board of education for authority to incur such liabilities.

Supervisory Union Report

FINANCIAL

The union budget for the 1955-56 school year is apportioned among the six districts in this manner:

The superintendent's salary this year is \$6,300, of which \$3,800 is collected from the six local districts and the balance of \$2,500 is paid by the state.

BROPOSED GUIDANCE PROGRAM

The item of a guidance director, at an estimated cost of \$2,500, is to be matched by an equal sum from a Federal appropriation. For two years the union board has been considering the need for the services such a person could perform. Since this is a new service, however, the state law provides that each district must vote separately on this under a special article in the warrant.

A guidance director is of specific help and counsel in various fields. On the elementary level, he can direct remedial work with children who are emotionally upset or who need assistance in their learning processes; and he can help the eighth graders choose their high school courses wisely and get a confident and successful start in high school.

On the secondary level, our high school teenagers often fail to find themselves, vocationally and socially. Helping our high school boys and girls to realize their abilities and limitations and steering them into the right field of further study or of positions in business and industry is an invaluable service which the guidance director can render for our youth.

Most of our cities provide a guidance director as part of their regular staff. Small towns cannot afford to do this, but on a union-wide basis the cost would be reasonable. The Epping-Newmarket union started such a plan two years ago; it has proved very popular there, and several unions in Vermont and Maine have also reported good results from this type of service.

Our principals and teachers have in many cases been extremely helpful in guidance work. However, I feel that we need a counselor who has special training for this work, and who could devote his entire time to it. He would also counsel with teachers and principals, to assist them to do better what they are already attempting. I recommend the employment of a guidance director as an excellent investment in better education.

PROPOSED COOPERATIVE HIGH SCHOOL

Since last year's report, an active effort has been made to form a cooperative district for grades 7 through 12, for the districts in this union. Such a plan should relieve the crowded conditions existing in most of our schools, and at the same time create a school large enough to provide a curtriculum which would be impossible in any one of our three separate small secondary schools.

The towns of this union have been approved by the state board of education as constituting a unit of suitable size and property valuation. Three of the districts have already voted on the question of joining; the other three districts will take action on the matter at the 1955 annual meeting, or at a later special meeting called for the purpose.



The accompanying map shows the extent of the proposed larger district, and indicates a possible location which is approximately central, based upon a study of pupil-miles of necessary transportation. The actual location would have to be determined by vote of the district, or by a committee chosen by the voters.

The original plan contemplated a building to house grades 7 through 12, starting with about 600 pupils. An architect's sketch was prepared for such a building, but the estimated cost exceeded our bonding limit. It seems possible, however, to provide a central high school for grades 9 - 12(about 400 pupils at the start) within our means. This would mean that the cooperative or union board could maintain a central senior high school in the new location, and separate junior high school units (one in Ashland and one in Meredith at least—perhaps others if it should seem best).

New England people are traditionally conservative, and it always seems easier to vote "no" on any proposed change. However, it is a proven fact that the smaller the school, the greater the cost per pupil. Hundreds of communities throughout our nation have found the larger district a practical means of improving their educational facilities without unreasonable expense.

State aid for buildings, as well as some assistance from the Federal government, is being seriously considered. If funds from these sources could be made available, these is no reason why our new high school could not be one of the best in the state.

CONCLUSION

This is my last report as your superintendent, as I shall retire on August 31, 1955. Since I came in 1934 many changes have taken place. One-room schools have been replaced by new and modern buildings. School enrollments have increased; courses in shop have been added to our high schools; a good program of music education has been carried on; school nurse services and excellent school lunches are now available in every school. However, the most important part of any school program is what happens when the teacher meets the pupil day by day. All our expensive equipment, beautiful buildings, and comprehensive curricula will count for but little without devoted and capable teachers, and pupils who are willing to apply themselves and strive to improve.

These twenty-one years have been very pleasant ones to me, and I am very grateful for the fine cooperation of school boards and teachers, and the friendly spirit of the people in this union. I wish for my successor the same cordial welcome and hearty support that you have given me, and that he will feel the same thrill that I always experience when a child greets me with a smile and wave of the hand, and says, "Hi, Mr. Bushnell!"

Report of Superintendent and Principals

SERVICES AND CURRICULUM

The schools of Ashland are furnishing many services to children beyond the usual classroom activities. On our staff are specialists in the field of music, penmanship and nursing. We serve over 175 lunches a day, insuring the children a wholesome and satisfying noon meal. Most children are covered by the school sponsored accident insurance plan which is obtainable for a nominal fee.

The Rinehart handwriting system, introduced last year, has been found very satisfactory and we hope it may be continued in the future. The adoption of textbooks which form a continuous or uniform series from grade to grade makes instruction more effective; we have put this into practice for arithmetic and English through the eighth grade, and the same pattern for the science program is planned for next year.

Among the fundamentals in these days at the high school level is auto driving. At the beginning of the school year, this course was not offered as no one on the staff was qualified to teach it. When Mrs. Williams resigned in October, we were fortunate in obtaining as her successor Mr. Alfred Wolfe, who is capable of teaching a course in driver training; now we have a class of twelve. Pease Motor Sales of Plymouth has provided the school with a 1955 Ford which has been equipped with dual controls for the use of the class.

Instruction in gun safety, in which New Hampshire is a pioneer, is especially valuable in an area where hunting is a common but hazardous pastime. Plans are being made to include a few lessons in the proper use of firearms next fall.

After three years in which Spanish was offered as the foreign language in our program of studies, we are now teaching French instead, as we were unable to find a qualified teacher of Spanish. Instruction in personal typing is being provided for those pupils who want to learn typwriting for their own use, but who do not wish to enroll for the regular commercial course.

Four years ago the school board and teaching staff undertook a radical change in the curriculum for the freshman year or ninth grade. (a) All entering students were required to take the same course—electives were postponed to the sophomore year. (b) Four basic units were required—English, mathematics, science and civics. (c) The mathematics and science were taught by one teacher, and the English and civics by another, so good correlation was possible between different courses. (d) Short or exploratory courses in other fields (foreign language, typewriting, woodworking and home economics) were required, so students might make a wiser choice of electives in these fields after the try-out period.

In 1953, after two years of this plan, there was an almost complete change of teachers in the high school. The new staff, unfamilar with the new curriculum pattern, expressed some dissatisfaction with the results, and this year we have gone back to the old plan.

TEACHERS AND PUPILS

Our first grade meets in two divisions, which means that our six-room elementary building is inadequate, and one class (the fourth grade this year, which is the smallest) meets in a classroom of the high school building. These pupils are learning to ignore the frequent confusion of changing classes and high school students passing by the door, but under a less patient or less capable teacher than Mrs. Gammons things might not go on so well. We expect for two years more that this small class may be cared for in this room, until they complete the sixth grade work; but the other elementary classes are all too large, and other arrangements will need to be made by that time.

Ten teachers carry on our present program at the high school. Classroom space is a little scanty—we have four full-sized classrooms, two for the junior high and two for the senior high; four small rooms (one of these a basement room approved for temporary use); and no study hall. The commercial room is extremely crowded. The gymnasium is excellent except for the hard cement and asphalt tile floor; and the vocational building has room enough.

During the three-year period of 1952-55, our students in the high school have had as regular teachers twenty-two different people.

Our music department, under the direction of Stephen Norris, is doing unusually well. The Ashland high school band has shown itself capable of outstanding performance.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

No aspect of educational advance has proved more satisfying to pupils, teachers and parents than outdoor education activities. In our school this April, the seventh grade plans to spend one week at Camp Sargent in Peterboro.

A few days at camp, properly directed, can be an important educational experience. It should not become just an outdoor vacation. (a) Learning and living are closely con-

nected; direct instruction is longer remembered, and school books become more meaningful. (b) Pupils learn to appreciate parents, teachers and classmates. When lights are low, pupils are encouraged to speak from the heart. "I never realized how hard my mother has to work till I served on all the committees at camp-making breakfast, washing dishes, sweeping, gathering wood, caring for my clothes." (c) Better community relations are developed. As parents and teachers work together in planning for a week at camp-and when parents' night at camp is observed—teachers, parents and pupils grow to understand one another better. Learning is stimulated. Besides direct instruction in science. nature, conservation, geography, history, etc., there is enthusiastic overflow into oral and written English. Boys who never wanted to talk to a large group before now have something they want to say. There are letters of thanks to be written, items for the newspaper, accounts to keep, etc. (e) Better relations are developed among faculty members. Outdoor education projects are a common meeting ground for teachers of physical education, of science, home economics, shop, etc.

Located as we are in one of the most beautiful spots in God's creation, it is fitting that special effort be made to bring our young people into closer contact with nature. In addition to the week to be spent while in the seventh grade, I believe it would be worthwhile for younger classes to attempt a class experience overnight or for a weekend at some suitable location near school. If two or more small groups from different schools could plan this together, it should be even more valuable.

TEACHERS' WORKSHOP

Our teachers' annual workshops are now traditional in this union. From their very inception they have been successful, covering a wide range of subjects, such as: conservation, music, techniques in teaching reading, guidance, etc. This past November the workshop was held for three days at the Moultonboro central school. The theme was based on Moral and Spiritual Values. At first glance, this might seem a matter for controversy and argument. Rather, it proved to be a topic of vital, current importance which drew only very healthy and constructive discussion in the various groups. On the opening morning, Rev. Mark Strickland of Manchester was the key-note speaker. All local clergy, both Protestant and Catholic in this area were invited to attend and a few of them were present and contributed much in discussion groups. Also invited were parents and PTA mem-Included among our outstanding consultants were bers. Miss Anita Petrucci and Miss Pollyanne Andem, both of whom are English teachers in the high school in Weymouth. Mass., where a program for strengthening the moral and spiritual values of pupils has been undertaken with noteworthy success. Other consultants from educational circles in our own state came from Concord, Plymouth, Holderness and Laconia. It seemed to be the concensus of opinion among our consultants and our teachers that this workshop was our "best yet."

BUILDING ACCOMMODATIONS

The outstanding improvement in our school plant this year is the new heating system, which is a permanent improvement of a most satisfactory nature. Housed in a separate building, and with automatic tempature controls for each building, it takes care of our present needs and should be adequate for any future rebuilding or additions that may be contemplated for some time to come.

As a temporary measure to care for the extra elementary class in the high school building, we have moved the home economics department into our vocational building (the old town hall) where it occupies the second floor. This is a well equipped department and very attractive in appearance, although not fully satisfactory for permanent use because of noise from the shop downstairs. One of the home economics rooms has almost no window area, and no provision for ventilation.

The temporary nature of this improvement is further emphasized by the fact that the classrooms made available at the high school building are both rather small. The one in the basement has insufficient window area, is not too well ventilated and has no satisfactory emergency fire exit. For these reasons this downstairs room could not be used for an elementary school class.

Plans have been made to enlarge the present cafeteria, making use of space hitherto occupied by the boiler room.

LOOKING AHEAD

Planning for the future is a necessary but difficult assignment. In any such plan, it is appropriate to list some of the needs which must not be overlooked. We suggest the following as worth serious consideration.

a) More attention to guidance is urgently needed. We recommend the pilot program suggested in the supervisory union report, as the next step in this direction.

b) Our physical education program should include track, soccer, and winter sports, not merely basketball and baseball.

c) Art education (including various crafts such as are encouraged throughout New Hampshire) deserves a place in our curriculum.

d) Kindergartens are worth-while for all children-not just the few who can afford it.

e) Our secondary curriculum, which has followed a traditional pattern for a long time, needs to provide more variety of courses and at the same time be made more thorough in its fundamental requirements. The limitations of small size, however, make such changes a difficult proposition.

f) A union-wide high school seems to us the best solution to our problem. If federal and/or state aid for buildings can be made available, the cooperation of all districts concerned should be easier to secure, and a school plant adequate for future growth might be possible in the very near future.
