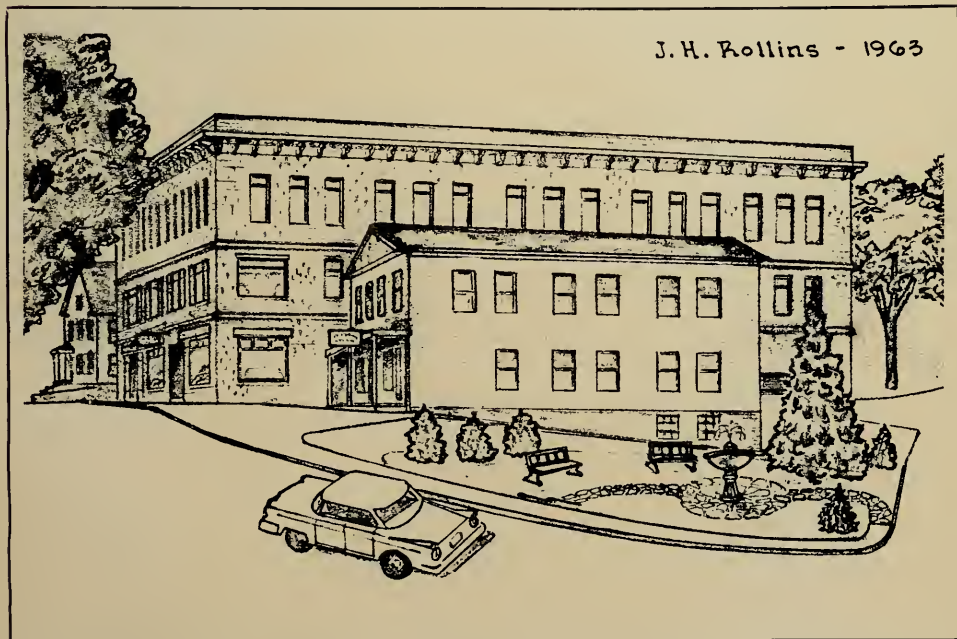

Town Manager's Letter

To the Citizens of Ashland:

This is the twelfth annual Town Report to be submitted under the Selectmen-Town Manager Plan and the first as your Town Manager. It is my great pleasure and honor to submit this report to you, the people of Ashland, for your perusal, discussion and information. The fact that a larger number of Town Reports have been requested and distributed this year indicates the great interest the citizens display in the operation of the government of the Town, indicating an enlightened population; the results of an educated democracy.

The budget for 1963 has been submitted to the Budget Committee and with some modifications was approved for submission for your acceptance at town meeting. Although we must contend with continuing price and cost increase, the amount to be raised by taxation has decreased by \$5,525.00.

The **Highway Department** requires a slight increase this year. Besides the general repair and maintenance normally required, we are requesting the sum of \$500.00 for repairs to the Squam River Bridge. This estimate of costs was made by a State Highway Department engineer.

The Winter Street bridge also requires wall reinforcement. Other needs this year will be general repair and/or replacement of numerous guard rails and post rails and culverts.

With your approval, a new truck will be purchased for the department from Capital Reserve Funds.

The Fire Department: An article appears in the Warrant requesting that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow a sum of money for the purchase of a tanker truck to replace our present obsolete truck. Financing will be by notes less the amount held in the Capital Reserve Fund. This will decrease the amount required, thereby resulting in lower interests charges.

The **Electric and Water Departments** indicate increases this year. If approved, the Electric Department will install capacitors at the sub-station thereby decreasing the cost of electricity purchased by the Town. This department realized a better than average surplus this year and in line with the suggestion of the Utility Commission, we are building a depreciation fund.

The Water Department requires a new building to house the Chlorinator system, and we also wish to modify this system to allow for the continuous flow of water through the system, when work is being done on one or the other of the chlorinators. At present, as in the past, the water must be shut off throughout the town. A great inconvenience to every-one that can be corrected for a moderate cost.

A novel change in this office this year is the installation of machine billing and accounting system. This new procedure will provide rapid accurate billing, reducing the number of routine steps followed in the past. This machine will bill electric, water, and accommodate municipal and utility accounts. It will be a great time saver, and provide immediate up-to-date accuracy.

These are some of the highlights of our recommendations for 1963. These suggestions will provide a savings as in the electric department or an improvement of service and reduce inconveniences as in the water department. We hope you will approve them.

1962 In Review

The town was a beehive of activity during 1962. The Garneau Block was finally razed to provide a widening at the intersection of River Street and Main Street, resulting in a safer approach.

The old saw mill chimney was leveled, eliminating a safety hazard of long standing.

Beside the normal repair and maintenance the highway department incurred many unplanned activity, many resulting from the severe thunderstorms of last summer. North Ashland Road suffered a deep wash-out which necessitated several truck loads of rock fill to close the opening, and the installation of a sluice to prevent a recurrence. Several trees fell during these storms, and these were removed immediately after the storms, whether during working hours or not. During these times of emergency all Town employees were pressed into service. Ashland is fortunate to have such people in its employ.

The Water Department installed new chlorinators in 1962. These were requirements by the State Sanitary Engineers. Several new services were installed and many old galvanized pipe services were replaced with copper pipe. Charlie Flanders, our water superintendent, has done an excellent job and is looking forward to 1963 with great anticipation to continue to improve our water service.

The Electric Department last year had one of its most efficient years under the supervision and operation of Elmer Marsh. The Town can take justified pride in this man. During the worst of the storm Elmer and his son, Thomas (Punky) were out repairing the lines. Public appreciation has been acknowledged, but we feel that this extraordinary effort should, once again, be brought to your attention. That we suffered some damage to the lines, we all agree, but the damages would have been much greater but for the tree maintenance and limb trimming operation of the Electric Department.

Minutes of Town Meeting

March 13, 1962

The meeting was called to order by the moderator at 9:00 A. M. and the warrant read. The motion was made and seconded to take up the business of the town at 2:00 P. M. So voted. The motion was made and seconded that the polls remain open from 9:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. So voted.

A total of 732 ballots were counted and approved for this town meeting. Total ballots cast were 509. At 2:00 P. M. the warrant was read and acted on as follows:

Article I

To choose all the necessary officers for the year ensuing.
On printed ballot.

Article II

Shall the Provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Laws, relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.
On printed ballot.

Article III

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Town Manager Plan as provided by Chapter 37, of the Revised Statutes, State of N. H. On printed ballot.

Article IV

To see if the Town will approve and adopt the special recommendations of the Budget Committee and vote to raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and located in the Budget.

It was moved and seconded that each item of the budget be voted on separately. So voted. Results were as follows:

Item #5 was reduced \$400.00 on the recommendation of the selectmen. It was explained that the water and light department paid half of the expense of lighting and heating town office and it was not taken in consideration in making up the budget.

Item #17 was increased 10% or \$1,477.50 due to the fact that our equipment was old and would likely need repair.

Item #26 the motion was made and seconded that the item pertaining to revaluation in article 4 be dismissed and the selectmen be instructed not to pay the amount of money named in this item until such time as the tax commission finishes the job subject to the approval of the majority of the voters of the town.

Item #29 The legality of this item was questioned. Letters were read from County Solicitor Batchelder, who had

conferred with the Town Attorney, and from the State Tax Commissioner, Lawton B. Chandler, who expressed the opinions that the item was in order. A suggested amendment was by-passed and the question moved. It was a unanimous vote in the affirmative.

Article V

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$100,000.00 and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year. So voted.

Article VI

To see if the Town will vote to accept the street leading from Highland Street, by the Old Town Hall, to Cottage Street. (Land belonging to abutters will be deeded to Town.) So voted.

Article VII

To see if the Town will, through its Board of Selectmen, enter into a contract with Gustave Claveau for one year commencing May 1, 1962 to provide a means for the collection and removal of rubbish and appropriate the sum of \$6,800.00 to defray the cost of same. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.) Dismissed.

Article VIII

To see if the Town will vote to accept the street known as Hillside Avenue, leading from Main Street to the L. W. Packard property, said road having already been laid out. (Land belonging to Hillside Development will be deeded to the Town, if accepted.) So voted.

Article IX

To see if the Town will vote to place a stand pipe on Owl Brook Road at a cost of \$250.00 (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.) So voted.

Article X

To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint the Road Agent, rather than having the Road Agent elected by vote of the Town. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.) Dismissed.

Article XI

To see if the Town will vote to extend street lights from in front of the residence of Mr. Victor Clark, where they

presently terminate up River Street to the residence of Malcolm Eastman. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.) So voted.

Article XII

To see if the Town will vote to place a street light at the end of Hill Street between Jordan's Apartments and the St. Agnes Church Parking Lot. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.)

Article XIII

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken by the Town to adopt the so-called Non-partisan Ballot System, the same being now in use, and to see if the Town will vote to adopt in place thereof, the Australian Ballot as provided in Chapter 59, Section 71 of the Revised Statutes, State of New Hampshire, Annotated, The Australian Ballot not to be in effect in said town until the Town Meeting next following the meeting at which such action is taken. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.) On printed ballot.

Article XIV

To see if the Town will vote to give permission to the Chamber of Commerce to build a launching ramp at the Stone Dam property which is owned by the Town. So voted.

Article XV

To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to sell Tax acquired property. So voted.

Article XVI

To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Mr. Young remarked on the sewer problem which would be facing the townspeople within a few years.

The motion was made and seconded that the Recreation Commission be allowed to keep own books. So voted.

A preference was shown by the townspeople for having the town meeting in the evening next year.

Mr. Lyublanovits explained the survey which had been started by the water and light commission which would give the town an accurate knowledge of all light poles, etc.

Rev. Walker remarked that Ashland can be justly proud of the work of our present and past policemen in keeping juvenile delinquency at a minimum.

Meeting adjourned

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$100,000.00 and to issue in the name of and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.
6. To see if the Town will vote for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund to finance all or part of the cost of the replacement and/or addition of equipment for the highway department, to include the appropriation made in 1962.
(The appropriation to this fund will be used to finance the purchase of a new highway truck in 1963.)
7. a) To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow an amount not to exceed in the aggregate \$6,600.00 on the credit of the Town, for the financing of the balance of a new tank truck for the Fire Department, under a three year bond and term note issue payable in three equal installments, with interest not to exceed four (4) percent. (Recommended by the Budget Committee).
- b) If Article 4 is passed in favor of \$1,500.00 for Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck, the

above bond issue should be reduced to \$5,100.00 in 7a for a new tank truck. (Total cost of tank truck — \$11,000.00).

8. To see if the Town will vote to lay out a highway of suitable width beginning at the intersection of the Sanborn Road and the Brogan Road, so-called, said Brogan Road leading from the Sanborn Road past the Bessom Farm to the farm building of Alfred Morton, formerly known as the Brogan Place. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters).
9. a) To see if the Town will vote to decrease the slope on High Street, so-called, starting at the northern entrance going approximately 200 feet or more.
b) To see if the Town will vote to place street lighting on High Street. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.)
10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint the town manager to also be collector of taxes within and for the Town of Ashland and to fix his compensation therefor. (Chapter 37:16, of the Revised Statutes, State of New Hampshire, Annotated.)
11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax acquired property.
12. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Ashland for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Water and Electric Light Departments, Municipal Court and Library.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1961 - December 31, 1962: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$698.23 in 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$2,962.90, plus a revenue surplus of \$587.67, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,550.57.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Water and Light Departments: (Exhibits G-1, G-2, G-3 and G-4)

Statements showing the financial condition of the Water and Light Departments as of December 31, 1962, and the financial activity in these departments during the fiscal year, are presented in Exhibits G-1, G-2, G-3 and G-4.

Statement of Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by

source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$5,901.77, from \$22,808.33 to \$16,906.56, in 1962 as shown herewith:

Scribner Memorial

To the Citizens of Ashland:

Emma H. Scribner, late of Ashland, died September 1936. Articles nine and ten in her will read as follows:-

“Ninth. To the town of Ashland, in the State of New Hampshire, the land which I own, which is situated at the corner of Main and Pleasant Streets, Ashland, in the State of New Hampshire, together with the buildings thereon, in trust, nevertheless, for the following uses and purposes: to forever hold and occupy the same as a Community Center* and park, to be known as the Scribner Memorial. Buildings are to be used for this purpose as long as they are needed or remain in good condition, then removed and grounds graded in, so to use all the land as a Park.

Tenth. To the town of Ashland, in the State of New Hampshire, the rest and residue of my estate, both personal and real, but in trust, nevertheless, for the following uses and purposes: the income only, to be used for this purpose and no other, namely, to keep and maintain the Scribner Memorial as a Community Center and Park for the people of Ashland, New Hampshire. It is my request that the town of Ashland, in the State of New Hampshire, shall elect or appoint, trustees to have charge and care for the grounds, and to invest the funds.”

* (Note: Webster’s International Dictionary defines a Community Center as follows:-

“Community Center. A place used for or as an organization promoting educational, philanthropic or other work for the betterment of a community.”)

Article 17 of the Ashland Town Warrant for 1937 reads as follows:-

“To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of the house, land and trust funds, as provided in the will of the late Emma H. Scribner.”

The following action was taken:-

“It was voted to accept the bequest of the house, land and trust funds as provided in the will of the late Emma H. Scribner, agreeably to the following resolution.

“Resolved, that the gift of the late Emma H. Scribner, of the land and buildings situated at the corner of Main and

Pleasant Streets and the residue of her estate as provided in the ninth and tenth provisions of the will probated by the Probate Court of Grafton County on the 26th day of September 1936, be accepted with gratitude, and that there be hereby created a Board of five trustees to manage said lands and buildings and invest said residue; said trustees to have full power and authority to make and enforce regulations, not inconsistent with the terms of said gift, for the public use of said land and buildings and to invest the assets of said residue as soon as the same can be; liquidated, in the same manner and only in such securities as are legal investments for trust funds held by the town; said trustees to account for their receipts and disbursements annually to the Board of Selectmen and at such more frequent times as said board may require; said trustees to give bond to the town for the faithful discharge of their duty in such amount and with such surety as said Board of Selectmen may require and approve; said Board of Trustees to consist of the three trustees of town funds who shall serve ex-officio and two other members to be appointed by the selectmen, one for the term of one year, one for the term of two years, and thereafter each for the term of two years, each trustee to serve until their successor qualifies, and the selectmen to have power to fill all vacancies for the unexpired term; and that said Board of Trustees be hereby authorized and empowered for and in the name of the town to receive said gift and receipt to the legal representatives of Mrs. Scribner's estate therefor.

Article 7 of the Ashland Town Warrant for 1938 reads as follows:-

“To see if the town will vote to move the Town Library to the Scribner Memorial Building and raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for this purpose.”

The following action was taken:-

“It was voted that the Town Library be moved to the Scribner Memorial Building upon satisfactory arrangements with the Trustees regarding same, and the sum of \$500.00 was raised and appropriated for this purpose.”

* * * * *

The above bequest could not have come at a more opportune time. The Fire Department, in whose building the Library was housed, was expanding and needed the space occupied by the Library for its own use.

When the Scribner Estate was finally settled, the amount accruing to the town was \$40,475.70 consisting of real estate, stocks, bonds and bank deposits. By the end of the

year 1961 this had attained a market value of \$93,113.39 an increase of \$52,637.69.

It must be borne in mind, however, in terms of the purchasing power of goods and services, the 1937 dollar was worth 100 cents. At the present time, with the devaluation of the dollar (worth to-day approximately forty-six cents) and the increased cost in purchasing power for those same goods and services, the present fund of \$93,113.39 in its relation to the original bequest of \$40,475.70 is worth exactly \$41,832.16 or an increase of \$1,356.46 over the original bequest.

Early in March 1962 representatives of the Scribner Trustees and Library Trustees met in Concord with Mr. Ernest R. D'Amours, former Att'y. Gen'l. for New Hampshire and presently serving as Director (under the law) of all Trust Funds in the State of New Hampshire.

Acting on his suggestion, the Scribner Trustees engaged the services of Mr. William B. Horrocks, accountant of Plymouth, to make a complete audit of the funds in order to correctly separate capital gains from ordinary income. At a cost of between five and six hundred dollars this was done.

At this point it might be pertinent to enumerate some of the items covered by expenditures over the years.

A tool house was built to house tools and equipment.

The buildings were painted and presently are due for another coat of paint.

A new furnace was installed.

The sun porch which had been usable only in the summer months was provided with heat and suitable lighting that it might be used throughout the year, especially by pupils studying.

Aluminum windows, doors and awnings have been provided.

The Library has been redecorated, as has the Dist. Nurses' room including in the latter other necessary work and lighting fixtures.

Recently the Historical Room has been redecorated as has the one formerly occupied by the Green Grove Cemetery Ass'n. This latter has been made available to the Library Trustees and is presently being used for reading and studying.

Minor repairs have been made from time to time on the building, and the grounds kept in excellent condition.

In addition, and no small item, are the bills for lights, heat and janitor service.

It is hoped that in the not too distant future there may be available for use of the Library Trustees limited funds for books or to facilitate the present library services. We have in our files from said Trustees a letter with this request which we sincerely hope to be able to honor.

The Library Trustees co-operate to the fullest extent (with their limited budget) with the High School and its needs, and we realize with additional funds they will be in a position to serve not only the school but all of our citizens more efficiently.

In the meantime we respectfully suggest if you have not already done so, you visit YOUR LIBRARY, take time to look around, and if you really want to see a beehive of activity, visit it some evening during the school year.

This report of the Scribner Fund, its origin, purpose, administration and present status is respectfully submitted that a complete report may be easily accessible to all who are interested, and that you may be informed how your duly elected representatives strive to serve you.

Dear Sir:

The following is a report of the activities conducted in the town of Ashland, by the N. H. Division of Public Health Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1962. Please have printed in your town report.

The Plymouth Medical Society sponsored Sabin Oral Polio vaccine clinics for Ashland and surrounding towns at a small fee to cover cost of vaccine and supplies for age groups over 6 years. Under 6 years the vaccine was furnished free by N. H. Division of Public Health. A series of four clinics were held in the fall. Total attendance as follows:

Completing three types — Pre-school group 147. Over 6 years 132.

The duplicate record of preschool children having the Sabin has been given to family physicians as designated on the card signed at clinic. If three types of vaccine have not been received, individuals needing more vaccine should consult their family physician.

The Sabin clinics were serviced by the following: Medical supervision Dr. Henry Crane and Dr. Laurence Rockwood. Local Public Health Nurses and local registered nurses administered the vaccine. A very efficient committee, obtained by the Local District Nursing Association nurses handled the clerical work. It all made for a very efficient clinic.

A number of school age children are being followed at the Chest X-Ray Clinics held in Plymouth in the fall and spring. These are conducted by the N. H. Tuberculosis and Health Association and the N. H. Division of Public Health.

These children are followed as a result of the Tuberculin Sterneedle Testing program conducted in the school in 1961.

Reports of results of X-Rays are sent to School Nurse and parents of children involved with recommendations for follow-up.

In the late fall the State Mobile X-Ray Unit visited Ashland. A total of 201 X-Rays were taken at Industries and 67 of the community of adults over 30 years of age. This survey is under the direction of Mr. Jenson of the Division of Public Health. Follow-up visits are made as necessary by the Local Public Health Nurse and State Public Health Nurse. Patients are advised on follow-up care.

My sincerest thanks to the following for their part in the Health programs for Ashland:

Plymouth Medical Association and Local Doctor,

Ashland District & School Nurses, for excellent cooperation in all programs,

The clinic clerical help,

The school personnel - including janitor,
and the School for the use of the Gymnasium.

All of the services were greatly appreciated.

Forest Fire Warden's Report

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farm, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

Annual Report of The Planning Board - 1962

The Planning Board has had an active and productive year. We have held ten regular or special meetings; completed several projects; worked on several already begun; and initiated several new ones.

The correction of the dangerous traffic conditions at the intersections of Main, River and Highland Streets has occupied much of our time and effort. Facts were gathered, legal opinions secured and consultations held with the State Dept. of Public Works and Highways. "Our" case was presented at the Annual Town Meeting last March and \$5,000 was voted toward the cost of purchasing and demolishing the Garneau Block and rounding off the intersections in question. The Garneau Block has now been purchased and demolished and the rounding off and landscaping of the intersection is scheduled for completion this Spring. We hope, if allotted funds permit, that widening of Main Street may be undertaken at the same time the rounding off work is done - to further insure free flow of traffic along Main Street.

The development of plans for the location of Interstate #93 in the Ashland area has been another major concern in 1962. We have been in frequent contact with state and federal officials on the subject. We have stressed Ashland's need for a second Interchange with Interstate Route #93 - where it will cross Route 3-B some two miles south of town. We feel our present road system and the predicted traffic increase coincident with the arrival of Interstate Route #93 in the area make such a second Interchange important to Ashland's future growth and development. Present plans call for the State to purchase rights-of-way necessary for the proposed Interchange with actual construction to be delayed until the need is indicated by actual traffic loads.

This past Fall we worked closely with the Town Manager, Board of Selectmen, Chamber of Commerce and an unofficial Citizen's Committee to secure a full-time, 'resident' physician for Ashland. Most of the monies spent on this community project came from the Planning Board's budget. We can report that, after four months of effort, contact has been made with an interested physician, Dr. Glenn W. Bricker. Dr. Bricker is expected to be 'in residence' in Ashland by February 1st. We expect to be associated in 1963 with similar efforts to secure a resident dentist and, perhaps, a resident lawyer.

In December we entered into discussions with the State Dept. of Resources and Economic Development concerning our participation in the 'Urban Planning Assistance Program' of the federal government. The purpose of this program, called the '701' program, is to aid communities in developing a 'Master Plan' as a guide for future development. The imminent 'arrival' of Interstate Route #93, our efforts to attract new business and industry to town, development locally of several 'mobile home parks' etc. indicate a growing need for a local 'Master Plan' - developed NOW, before the problems become acute.

In addition, our members have attended a number of meetings and conferences and discussed topics such as: tax abatements for local industries, local zoning, establishment of a Tourist Information Booth, improving highway directional signs, the mobile home problem and, recently, a proposal to develop an airstrip near Union bridge.

We regret to report loss of the services of Mr. Elroy Marine who moved to Vermont in December. Our Chairman, Mr. Marine was one of our most interested and active members. Special thanks also to Mr. James Rollins for technical assistance given on several projects during the year.

Your Planning Board continues to welcome your comments and suggestions with regard to matters under study or which you feel should be considered.

School Board Report

Last spring the School Board was asked to work with Plymouth and the neighboring towns to set up plans for a Secondary Cooperative School District. Many meetings were attended and a great deal of time and study went into this project. An excellent brochure was printed and distributed to each family of the town.

On June 28th a special school meeting was held to vote on whether Ashland would enter this Cooperative District. The article was defeated by forty votes.

It was apparent that the people of Ashland preferred to run a Small High School of its own. With that decision in mind, several factors must be considered.

1. It is more expensive to operate a Small High School.
2. Minimum Standards set up by the State and Legislature must be met. This includes hiring more teachers, dual track program, the addition of Guidance and Art to the Curriculum, and a Librarian who has had at least six semesters hours of training in that field.
3. The minimum salary for teachers is being raised each year. The salaries of our teachers must be raised to meet this current trend.
4. The price of all supplies, textbooks, equipment and labor is much higher.
5. An increase in enrollment and operation of the dual track program have created a shortage of classroom space. This next year four additional rooms will be needed. At present there are twelve rooms available with the Commercial room inadequate in size. There will be fifteen teachers on the staff and all need rooms in which to teach.

Proposed Plan:

1. Build a four room addition to the Ober School.
2. Move Grades seven and eight to the first floor of the old Grammar School.
3. Use the second floor for Art and Commercial subjects.

4. Move office to Commercial room and use office for Guidance.

One realizes that this will add a few dollars to the present tax rate. Good schools cost money and good **Small Schools** cost more. Ashland has had good schools in the past, proven by the successful careers of its graduates. To continue this record your financial backing is essential.

On September 10th Catherine Rockwood resigned as Chairman of the Board as she was leaving for California. Ruth E. Morrison was elected Chairman for the remainder of the year.

A great deal of time and thought was spent on preparing the budget. The Board realizes full well the tax burden. However, in order to have a Comprehensive Approved High School and one which will assure your children the best education possible, many items are a must for the operation of the schools.

Problems arise from time to time but thanks to the understanding and cooperation of our Superintendent, Martin E. Heffernan, Principal Kent F. Bailey, the teachers and parents, problems have been solved.

It has been a pleasure working with the above mentioned and all of us are vitally interested in the education and welfare of every child.

Article 2

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ACTION: On motion, seconded, of Philip Guyotte, it was voted to have each article in the Warrant taken up item by item.

On motion, seconded of Mary Ruell, it was voted to accept the reports of the audit of the General Fund, Treasurer, School Lunch Program and the Activities Accounts of the Ashland High School that was made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission and the reports of the Agents of the District as printed in the Annual Report.

Article 3

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate, etc.

ACTION: Motion of Ruth Morrison, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151,846.05 for the support of schools lost.

Discussion and misunderstanding of the motion made by Philip Guyotte, which he stated he intended to mean taking up the School Budget item by item was clarified by Mr. Guyotte repeating his motion made under Article 2 above, i. e. that the budget be taken up item by item. Special School District Meeting

Ashland School District

June 28, 1962

In accordance with the foregoing Warrant, and at the time and place stated therein, the Special School District Meeting was called to order by Moderator Thomas Pryor, and the Warrant read. The polls were declared open with members of the School Board acting alternately as Ballot Clerks.

Then Catherine C. Rockwood, Chairman of the Ashland School Board proceeded with the following report: "Good afternoon. According to Article 5 of the Ashland School District Warrant acted upon March 20, 1962, I hereby submit the report of the Study Committee and School Board, appointed to investigate participation in the secondary cooperative school district.

Because of the fact that all the voters were sent reports of these meetings, I shall make this report brief. One member of the selectmen was chosen to represent the town, Mr. Homer Young. The moderator selected 2 voters, George Ober, Jr. and Arthur Marcroft, the School Board appointed Andre Paquette and Howard Guyotte. With the School Board, these members joined the study groups from 8 other towns — Campton, Rumney, Plymouth, Holderness, Thornton, Warren and Wentworth. New Hampton also sat in on a few meetings. After two and a half months of intensive study, the following report was submitted.

- Needs.
1. The 2 high schools, Ashland and Plymouth were rapidly becoming overcrowded. Within 2 years neither school would be able to handle their own students, to say nothing about the tuition students.
 2. New minimum standards, set by the N. H. Board of Education and affirmed by the legislature, would require more personnel and physical facilities than either could financially secure.
 3. A cooperative school would answer all these problems more economically, and offer far more educational advantages to the students, which is, after all, the PRIME reason for the existence of our schools.

Six subcommittees were formed, representatives from each town were on each committee.

BUILDING NEEDS COMMITTEE met with architects, and after establishing the future population and desired program plans, arrived at an estimated figure of \$2,000,000 for a junior and senior high school for 1200 pupils, this includes estimated site cost, water, estimated sewage, landscaping and equipment.

The SITE COMMITTEE listed possible locations to be decided upon by the Interim Committee, each site with its possibilities and liabilities.

The TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE arrived at an estimated figure based on the total estimated population of September 1964 of 1,000 students of \$70,000. After the votes are counted, and definitive action has been taken by all the towns, this figure will probably be adjusted.

The FINANCE COMMITTEE had to piece all these figures together and then try to arrive at a formula of cost that would be equitable for all . . . under THIS formula, the cost to Ashland would be approximately \$121,183.40, our projected elementary costs for 1964, 1965 are estimated to be \$73,-328., thus giving us a total estimated projected cost of \$194,511.40.

The local committees then estimated the costs to the individual towns, if nothing was done, if building more rooms were approved, and if it was possible, the cost of sending out students on a tuition basis. All costs were, of course, estimated and all possibilities were investigated. These costs, for any of these possibilities all totalled at least as much as the cooperative, some were exceedingly more. It is the considered opinion of the majority of the combined committees that this is the most feasible plan, educationally and financially."

There were very few voters in attendance and there was no other discussion at this time.

At 8:00 P. M., the Moderator declared the polls closed, the ballot box was opened and the ballots counted with the following results announced by the Moderator:

ARTICLE 1. Yes Votes 106 No Votes 146
and the motion lost.

ARTICLE 2. The moderator announced that in view of the vote under Article 1 being in the negative, that a motion to dismiss this article and to adjourn was in order. Thereupon, it was so moved and the vote being in the affirmative, the meeting was adjourned.

The ballots were then sealed and signed as prescribed by law.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board
and Citizens of the Ashland School District:

I respectfully submit my eighth annual report as Superintendent of the Ashland School District.

Staff

The schools opened in September of 1962 with seven new members on the staff. Six in the Junior-Senior High School and one in the Elementary School.

Mr. William G. Andrews, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, class of 1962 and a major in Social Studies, replaced Mr. Hugh O'Donnell in the Junior High as Mr. O'Donnell was assigned to the fourth grade. Mr. Andrews is also coaching the Boys' J. V. Basketball and is Driver Education Instructor.

Mrs. Beverly J. Felten, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, class of 1961 and who was a member of the Concord Junior High Staff last year, was employed as the additional teacher and is teaching English in the Junior High and High School.

Mrs. Clarese W. Fitch, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, and a former teacher in Pittsburg, Lancaster and Portsmouth, N. H., replaced Mr. Harold J. Proulx as Junior High and High School Mathematics instructor. Mr. Proulx joined the staff of the Franklin Junior High School.

Mr. Robert B. Foster, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, and who has been an assistant in the Science Department at the University of Connecticut for the past three years, is teaching the science classes as Mr. John J. Cote is attending the New Mexico Highlands University under a science fellowship in the graduate program.

Mr. Melvyn D. Hale, Jr., a graduate of Springfield College, and a member of the Milton, Mass. School system for the past three years, replaced Mr. Irving B. Wilkinson who accepted a position as an Assistant Professor of Health and Physical Education at Cobelskill College of the State University of New York.

Mrs. Josephine B. Hayslip, a graduate of the University of Vermont, with a master's degree from Temple University, and who has been a teacher in the Brandywine Heights Joint High School, Topton, Pennsylvania for four years, is teaching

the English classes in the High School and replaces Mr. Samuel E. Worthen now a member of the staff at New Hampton School for Boys.

Mrs. Thelma W. Spohrer, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, and a former member of the elementary staff replaced Mrs. Elizabeth Gregory in the combination third and fourth grade. Mrs. Spohrer formerly was a teacher in West Thornton, Tilton, Portsmouth and Winchester, Massachusetts.

Mrs. Mary E. Nielsen who was on a year's leave of absence returned as grade one and two teacher, and Mrs. Dorothy Guyotte was assigned to grade three replacing Mrs. Kathleen A. Nelson.

Maintenance of Plant:

Mr. Leonard Duguay who has served so ably as custodian for the past five years resigned in November to operate a grocery store, and Mr. George Brunt was engaged as his replacement.

During the summer vacation the following areas were painted, room zero in the High School, grade six room and the boys' toilet area in the Elementary.

The curtain and cyclorama on the stage were flame-proofed and some of the electrical wiring in the Elementary was replaced and a new entrance box and distribution panel was installed.

Additions and Improvements:

The following additions and improvements were made: The swings in front of the Ober School were installed, a 180 foot section of chain link fence was placed at the rear of the Ober School, a Master T. V. Distribution System was installed in the Ober School with one-half of the cost being paid under the National Defense Education Act, and a 30 foot section of a black top sidewalk was placed in front of the Ober School.

The following items of equipment were purchased: 1 filmstrip projector, 1 record player, 1 electric typewriter, 1 duplicating machine, 1 auto harp, 2 aquariums, 1 microscope, and an overhead projector.

Regional School Study:

The Regional School Study Committee submitted a report in June suggesting that Ashland become a part of the proposed Pemi-Baker Cooperative School District consisting

of the Districts of Ashland, Plymouth, Holderness, Campton, Wentworth, Thornton, Rumney and Warren. A special school district meeting was held on June 28, at which time the vote was in the negative 146 to 106. Plymouth was the only district that voted in the affirmative.

Minimum Standards:

Approximately two years ago a special committee was appointed by the State Board of Education "to develop a detailed statement of the standards for approval of Comprehensive High Schools and High Schools" as the State Board is obligated by State Laws to approve High Schools.

In June 1962, the "Minimum Standards and Recommended Practices for New Hampshire High Schools, Grades 9 - 12" were officially adopted by the State Board of Education.

The "Minimum Standards" go into effect September 1963, and in order for Ashland to meet the additional requirements, the following requirements must be met: Additional class sections for the College-Preparatory and the non-college preparatory students which will necessitate at least one additional classroom teacher at this time. The Principal must devote full time to administrative and supervisory duties so a member of the staff will have to devote part time as a guidance counselor, and adult clerical assistance will have to be made available in the office on a part time basis to handle the records of the lunch program, activities, and class accounts, pupil records and transcripts.

At the present time in the fine arts area there is the Band and Glee Club, and in order to provide a third in this area classes in art will have to be offered, and it is planned to engage a part time instructor on a two day per week basis.

Additional space is needed for a Principal's office, guidance facilities, and classrooms, and in order to meet this need the School Board is proposing that a four room addition be constructed on the Allen K. Ober Elementary School for Grades 4-6 and the present Elementary School be used to house the seventh and eighth grades instead of using the present cafe and Room Zero in the High School. The Business Education classes to be moved to the Elementary School and the fourth room to be used for art classes. This change would make it possible to have the Principal's office on the first floor and the present office could be used as a room for Parent conferences and Guidance.

Conclusion:

Again it is my pleasure to express my appreciation to the School Board and teaching staff for their cooperation and

sincere devotion to their responsibilities to the children, parents and citizens of the Ashland School District.

At this time I also wish to express my appreciation to the Selectmen, Town Manager, Chief of Police and personnel of the Highway Department for their continued help and cooperation.

Report of the Principal of The Ashland Schools

To Mr. Martin E. Heffernan, Superintendent of Schools:

The following is my report as principal of the Ashland Schools.

Graduates 1962:

The class of 1962 was graduated June 15. There were eighteen graduates taking part in the graduation exercises. Ten of the eighteen seniors, or 55% went on for post-secondary training. Of the seniors going on, 33% entered four year colleges; 22% entered two year technical or business training programs. One of the six seniors that entered the four year colleges has dropped out and of the four that entered the two year training program only two are still attending.

The post-secondary schools in which the members of the class of 1962 enrolled are: University of New Hampshire (3), New England College (2), Wellesley (1), Manchester Technical Institute (3), The McDonnell Airline School (1).

Open House:

The Ashland elementary schools held open house on November 12th. Most of the grades had close to 100% of the parents of the pupils coming in to observe some of the fine work being done. We feel that the composition and the art work in these grades have been improved considerably the past few years. It is hoped that a uniform system in handwriting will be used throughout the grades next year. We are also in hopes of beginning to up grade the math program.

The Ashland high school had its open house on November 13th. This year the students and parents came in for a night session. We ran three class periods, actual class situations, to give to parents a chance to observe the fine teaching, the shortage of classroom space and the difficulties that arise when students must travel between buildings each period of the day. I was very pleased to see that all students returned for the evening session as well as a large percentage of the parents.

Practice Teachers:

We are pleased to be able to aid the Teachers College in their educational program by including practice teachers in our system. This year James Grant worked the first nine weeks in the areas of physical education and junior high science. James Hennessy followed the same program the second nine weeks of the first semester. Malcolm Murray worked the first nine weeks of the second semester in high school mathematics, under the supervision of Mrs. Hodsdon. Mrs. Beverly Bailey and Mr. Richard Chandler worked 18 weeks of the second semester under the supervision of Mrs. Mary Mekkelsen and Mr. Melvyn Hale in the areas of business education and physical education respectively.

Conclusion:

In closing, I would again like to express my appreciation to Mr. Martin E. Heffernan, the school board, the faculty and the students for their fullest cooperation throughout the year.

Report of the Music Supervisor

This year it is the pleasure of the Ashland Music Department to announce a definite growth in all activities. This growth would have been extremely difficult without the cooperation of Students, Administrators, and interested parents alike. With this type of cooperation we are better able to concentrate our activities to the interested student.

Encompassed in the Music Department are the following groups: Band of (20) twenty musicians; Glee Club of 30 singers; Majorettes of six members; Junior Band of 20 students; Music and Art Appreciation Class; and the General Music Program for all 7th and 8th grade students.

The Elementary Instrumental Instruction Program, which is in steady growth, is teaching approximately twenty students weekly through the aid of the following instructors: Mr. Rene deLathauwer - Clarinet and Saxophone; Mr. Bruce D. Heald - Brass and Percussion. Within this program we have a Junior Band for Elementary students only amounting to twenty players. All instruction is given after school so as not to interfere with the academic program.

In response to many requests, it is anticipated that the Music Department will have its annual Spring Concert in Exchange form with Plymouth High School during the early part of April. This type of Exchange Program will enable the students to perform with another school separately and together. This same performance will be given in both towns. One addition to the performance will be the Junior Band, that will render several numbers. This program is presenting a new challenge for the groups, for the quality and quantity of music has been doubled in grade of last year.

New for the department is the Music & Art Appreciation Course for high school College Preparation Students. This course encompasses the growth and development of both Art and Music through history.

With the growth of these activities there still exists a need for further concentration in each phase in order to meet the needs of the students.

Our sincere appreciation is extended to all who have contributed to our development and we trust this growth will continue for the future.
