## Selectmen's Letter

---

To the Citizens of Ashland:

It has been a pleasure to serve as Selectmen of Ashland this past year.

We have strived to promote better relationships, business-wise, setting up standard rules and regulations for all departmental procedures with no exceptions permitted. As a result, everyone is happier, and the business end of affairs are functioning to the fullest capacity possible.

As it is the duty of your Selectmen to ascertain that all property within the Town is kept on an assessment basis whenever possible we had published for Sale by Bid and did sell the following; obtained by Tax Collector's Deeds through Tax Sales:

Eastman Mill and Land, so called—River Street  
Apartment house & land - Gordon Street

As was voted last March, three street lights were installed on High Street, using the same medium that we have used in the process of modernizing our present street lighting system, which was begun this year by the replacement of twelve old type street lights. We highly recommend the continuance of this renovation before further extensions are considered. The capacitors were installed as voted, and should create an overall saving in KWH usage to the Town.

Again this year, we employed the Laconia Lab to exterminate the rodents at the Town Dump. There were three applications given and we plan to have another series for this year, to keep them under control.

The State of New Hampshire purchased that portion of the dump area which we had bought a few years ago, for the sum of five hundred dollars, due to the new Route 93 highway approach.

The insurance coverage on all Town property was rechecked and we found that the program needed adjusting to meet the rising costs of today values. Where the need was apparent we increased coverage to value, creating sound security for Town owned property.

In November of this year, we felt there was a definite need to re-establish the curfew recorded on the books. As the original order was some years old, we amended the age limit to read sixteen, as it was the consensus of opinion that there were many eighteen year olds that were usefully employed (age limit in old curfew) and should not come under the curfew law.

As voted last March, the highway department acquired the new Town truck - a 1963 GMC purchased through Bartlett Motors, Inc., Bristol, N. H. A fine piece of equipment with modern accessories that should serve the department for a number of years.

The Fire Department has purchased a 1962 International Tank Truck, which has 1,000 gallon capacity. This truck will not only give added protection to the people on the outskirts of Town but will prove very useful and provide good service in town. A new 33.9 Motorola Radio was purchased and installed in this truck, bought by the Ashland Firemen's Association, which gives us more efficient service calling for Mutual Aid.

The installation of a posting machine, in the Electric Department created a step forward in business procedure. In actuality, the process of day to day usage, finds the office with speed, accuracy and a double record of all entries. Whereas in the past it was very possible to miss a payment in posting from the cash journal to customer ledger sheets, it is now just as impossible, as a three-way check is constantly maintained daily.

During the past summer, the Reservoir Road was repaired and although certainly not a boulevard, is still in very good condition from the renovations performed.

The chlorinator house was completely rebuilt, as voted at Town Meeting and the chlorinator, itself was repaired.

It has been a pleasure to serve in the capacity of Selectmen and we are looking forward to continuous progress for betterment of the Town of Ashland in this new year.

# Minutes of Town Meeting

## March 12, 1963

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Thomas Pryor, at 9:00 A. M. and the warrant read. The motion was then made and seconded that the business of the town be taken up at 8:00 P. M. and the motion was defeated. The motion was then made and seconded to take up the business of the Town at 2:00 P. M. So voted. The motion was made and seconded that the polls remain open until 6:00 P. M. So voted. The moderator read the following telegram.

From Tucson, Ariz.

March 12, 1963 9:45 A. M. @ Town Office

I'm extremely saddened by the news of the death of Charles Hall. Out of respect for this very devoted member of our Budget Committee, I wish to submit the motion that we observe one minute of silence before taking up the Articles of the Town Budget.

The motion was seconded and so voted, and a minute of silence was observed in accordance with the motion.

The warrant was read and acted on as follows:

### Article I

To choose all the necessary officers for the ensuing year. Elected by ballot, were: Selectman — Norman C. Weden; Town Treasurer — Max Weisberg; Town Clerk — Marion K. Merrill; Budget Committee for three years — Milton S. Graton, G.R. Tuxbury, Andre Paquette, Laurent Ruell; Budget Committee for two years — Philip P. Guyotte; Library Trustee — Margaret P. Whitcomb; Town Trustee — James C. Hinds; Fire Wards — Ernest J. Paquette, Donald Knowlton, John Hughes; Tax Collector — Alfred J. Puccetti; Road Agent — James T. Harriman; Chief of Police — Raymond L. Knowlton.

### Article II

Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Laws, relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Results: Yes—271 No—40

### Article III

To see if the Town will vote to continue the Town Manager Plan as provided by Chapter 37, of the revised Statutes, State of New Hampshire, Annotated.

Results: Yes—166 No—174

### Article IV

To see if the Town will approve and adopt the special recommendations of the Budget Committee and vote to raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and located in the budget as follows:

The motion was made and seconded that Article 7A and 7B be acted on before Article 4 was considered. So voted. Results will be shown under these items.

Following the disposal of Article 7 the motion was made and seconded that the budget be considered article by article. So voted. The results were as follows:

#### Article V

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Manager to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$100,000.00 and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.

So voted.

#### Article VI

To see if the Town will vote for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund to finance all or part of the cost of the replacement and/or addition of equipment for the highway department, to include the appropriation made in 1962. (The appropriation to this fund will be used to finance the purchase of a new highway truck in 1963.)

So voted.

#### Article VII

A) To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow an amount not to exceed in aggregate \$6,600.00 on the credit of the Town, for the financing of the balance of a new tank truck for the Fire Department, under a three year bond and term note issue payable in three equal installments, with interest not to exceed four (4) percent. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.) So voted.

B) If Article 4 is passed in favor of \$1,500.00 for Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck, the above bond issue should be reduced to \$5,100.00 in 7A for a new tank truck. (Total cost of tank truck—\$11,000.)

### Article VIII

To see if the Town will vote to lay out a highway of suitable width beginning at the intersection of the Sanborn Road and the Brogan Road, so called, said Brogan Road leading from the Sanborn Road past the Bessom Farm to the farm building of Alfred Morton formerly known as the Brogan Place. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.)

The motion was made to dismiss Article 8. Motion lost. The motion was then made to accept Article 8. Seconded. A ballot vote was requested.

### Article IX

A) To see if the Town will vote to decrease the slope on High Street, so called, starting at the northern entrance going approximately 200 feet or more. Dismissed.

B) To see if the Town will vote to place street lights on High Street. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters.) So voted.

### Article X

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Town Manager to also be collector of taxes within and for the Town of Ashland and to fix his compensation therefor. A motion to dismiss the article was lost.

The motion was made and seconded that Article 10 be amended to read as follows: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Town Manager to also be collector of taxes within the Town of Ashland and at no extra cost to the Town of Ashland. Said office to include duties as town manager. Voice vote in doubt and a show of hands was requested. Results Yes—76 No—14

## Article XI

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell tax acquired property. So voted.

## Article XII

To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The motion was made and seconded that the town buy the systematic record machine for \$1450 from funds appropriated for record system in 1962. So voted.

The motion was made and seconded that a committee of 12 consisting of the Board of Selectmen, fire wards, foreman and assistant foreman of each fire company be formed to purchase a fire truck. So voted.

The motion was made and seconded to apply for funds to make necessary repairs on the dam. So voted.

The motion was made and seconded that the Board of Selectmen also act as Commissioners of the water and light departments if the Town Manager plan does not go into effect. So voted.

# Town Warrant — 1964

## State of New Hampshire

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Ashland, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Ashland High School Auditorium in said Ashland on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the special recommendations of the Budget Committee and vote to raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and located in the budget:
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town, an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$45,000. to be made by the United States to the Town of Ashland in aid in defraying the cost of final construction plans for sewerage and sewerage treatment facilities for the Town of Ashland, and, further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$313.62 for Town Road Aid. (State to contribute \$2,090.80)
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$360.00 to provide group plan life and medical insurance benefits for all regular employees of the town and their dependents. (RSA-31:4/1963 NH 90)
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$200.00 to install a street light on the street know as Cottage Place, said light to be

located on Stewart's land, between St. Arnauld's and Jordan's land. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters)

7. To see if the Town will vote to widen the present Church Street by eliminating the existing sidewalk, and paving this extra strip for use as part of the street. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters)
8. Shall the Town of Ashland continue to maintain its existing municipal court so long as its present judge remains in office. (This article will appear on the printed ballot.)
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the Housing and Home Finance Agency for an interest-free loan of \$20,000. to be drawn upon by the Planning Board in hiring a consulting engineer to work with them in developing plans for a minimum adequate sewerage disposal plant to meet the present needs of the Town of Ashland. When the Planning Board has developed a plan which it believes to be best for the Town of Ashland, it shall through appropriate channels exhibit same to the voters at a regular or special town meeting for the purpose of raising enabling funds. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters)
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 (seven thousand dollars) to reimburse the State of N. H. for the construction of 300 feet of 30" reinforced concrete pipe at Station #2083 under Interstate 93 or crossing Rte. 93 at right angles at such a point that a projection of this line crosses the Collins Street Bridge. The invert elevation to be 465 at East end and 464 at West end. This pipe to be come the westerly section of the out-fall line when sewer is completed. (Petitioned by 10 legal voters)
11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200. to be used for the perpetual care of the Lamond lot in Green Grove Cemetery. Requested by Josie B. Lamond.
12. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for the year 1964 the air navigation facility known as "Riverside Flying Service" owned by Norman P. Smith, Sr. provided such facility is available for public use without charge and the owner holds a certificate from the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commis-



sion that it is necessary for an effective airways system. The property to be exempt shall include the surfaces maintained and available for take-off, landing, taxiing, open air parking of an aircraft and any navigational communications facility and any passenger terminal buildings available for public use without charge pursuant to RSA 72:38 as inserted by 1963, 79:2.

13. Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Laws, relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town. (According to law this article will appear on the printed ballot.)
14. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention. (This article will appear on the printed ballot.)
15. To vote on the question 'Shall sweepstakes tickets be sold in this Town?' (This article will appear on printed ballot.)
16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$100,000. and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,420. for participation in an Urban Planning Assistance Program, known as the '701 Program'. (Recommended by the Planning Board.)  
(Note Federal share - \$12,824.; State share - \$1,000. Town share - \$5,420.)
  - (a) To see if the Town will vote to raise the above appropriation as follows:
    1. \$2,710. by taxation in 1964
    2. and will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow an amount not to exceed in the aggregate \$2,710. on the credit of the Town, for the financing of the balance of the Program so voted, under a one year term note issue payable in one installment. with interest not exceeding four (4) percent.

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow the tax collector to accept prepayments after April 1, and before tax bills are sent out pursuant to RSA 80:52a as inserted by 1963 N. H., 36.
19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax acquired property.
20. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Ashland for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Water and Electric Light Departments, Municipal Court, Library, and Scribner Memorial Fund.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

**Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963: (Exhibit A-1)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a net Debt of \$4,893.44 to a Surplus of \$17,597.24 in 1963.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

### Change in Financial Condition

#### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated & Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$8,527.39, plus a revenue surplus of \$12,457.22, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$20,984.61.

#### Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### Water and Light Departments:

(Exhibits G-1, G-2, G-3 and G-4.)

Statements showing the financial condition of the Water and Electric Departments as of December 31, 1963, as well as the financial activity in these departments during the year, are presented in Exhibits G-1, G-2, G-3 & G-4.

#### Statement of Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected

taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

### Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$20,972.68, from \$16,906.56 to \$37,879.24, in 1963, as shown herewith:

The Tax Collector and Selectmen should carefully go over the uncollected lists on the tax warrants of 1960 and prior years and such taxes as appear to be uncollectible should be abated by the Board of Selectmen. To include such uncollectible taxes on prior years' warrants as assets in the Balance Sheet, year after year, tends to distort the actual financial condition of the Town.

The two year period which the law provides for redemptions from tax sales has expired in the case of all unredeemed taxes from the sales on account of the levies of 1960 and prior years. Therefore, the Tax Collector should pass deeds to the Town on all properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens.

**Conclusion :**

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Ashland for their assistance during the course of the audit.

## Public Health Report

---

In the spring of 1963 a Sterneedle Tuberculin Testing program was conducted in Ashland Schools for students of all grades. The testing program was approved by Dr. Glenn W. Bricker, School Physician and carried out by Lois Reed, R. N. of the New Hampshire Public Health Nursing Division assisted by Mrs Helen Fisher R. N. and Mrs. Lumina Straw R. N., the school's nurses. A total of 400 tests were performed of which 19 were found to be Reactors. Home visits to families of the Reactors were made. Arrangements for Chest x-rays of contacts were established. Several residents of Ashland took advantage of the Chest X-ray Clinics conducted by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association at Plymouth during April and October. The attending physicians of persons attending x-ray clinics received a written report.

In August a neighborhood testing program for Tuberculosis determination was conducted by the nurses. 53 individuals were tested. 7 Reactors were found, and all of the Reactors subsequently had the benefit of chest x-ray examination.

In October and November clinics were conducted for the administration of Sabin Type Polio Vaccine. This program was instituted because of the occurrence of Type 3 Polio at epidemic levels in Canada, 200 individuals received Type 2 vaccine. Some of the doses administered were boosters. It is intended that this immunization will be completed early in 1964.

At the request of the State Office of the Division of Public Health, home visits were made in connection with individuals suffering from communicable diseases.

There are many other duties which the nurse does throughout the year that would be too numerous to mention. Such as a pair of shoes for the one needing it. # Annual Report of the Planning Board — 1963

---

The Planning Board held seven regular or special meetings in 1963. One major project was completed, work continued on several others already begun and several new projects were started.

Mr. Jesse Bartlett was elected to replace Mr. Elroy Marine as Chairman of the Board due to Mr. Marine's removal to California.

1963 saw the completion of the project to remove the "Garneau Block" at the corner of River and Main Streets and to 'round off' the corner in the interests of driver safety. This project was initiated by the Board two years ago and we are happy to report its completion. Present plans call for additional landscape work at the corner to be carried out by interested local organizations and individuals.

Last year (March 1963) at Town Meeting the Planning Board was asked to investigate the present physical condition of the Squam Lakes Dam and to develop reasons for and against 'sale' of the dam to the State of New Hampshire. Our investigations revealed that competent authorities feel the dam is not now in need of major repairs and that reasons for the town's retaining title to the dam outweigh those for disposing of the dam at the present time. Our complete findings have been forwarded to the Selectmen.

Much of the Planning Board's time and effort in 1963 were spent looking into the town's possible participation in an "Urban Planning Assistance Study" — commonly called the "701" program. The purpose of the "701" program is to help participating towns develop detailed factual information regarding existing local conditions, facilities and resources and to suggest methods and plans for making the most effective use of same. The Planning Board feels strongly that the completion of Interstate Highway #93 through Ashland plus the rapid changes taking place in the industrial and recreational "pictures" in the Lakes Region will produce important changes locally — changes which can not be foreseen or planned for adequately on the basis of information now available. Properly planned for, these changes can be turned to the town's advantage. Without such planning they could easily do serious damage to local business, industry and property values. After interviewing several firms of planning consultants, the Board has expressed its preference for the



firm of Atwood and Blackwell of Boston — should the voters see fit to make the necessary funds available. Total cost of Ashland's participation in the "701" program would be \$19,260, of which \$12,840 would be borne by the Federal Government and \$1,000 by the State Government. Ashland's share would be \$5,420. We feel Ashland's participation in the "701" program at this time is important. We are therefore planning to insert an appropriate Article in the Warrant for this year's (1964) Town Meeting. Once authorized, the work would take approximately 18 months to complete.

The Planning Board continues to be concerned about lack of specific plans to lay adequate sewage pipes under Interstate Highway #93 — now under construction. Such pipes are essential to eventual construction of a town-wide sewage system such as is called for by Anti-pollution legislation now in force. They can not be laid once the highway is complete. Time for appropriate action is short.

The Planning Board has been assured by state officials that land for a possible 2nd exit from and entrance to Interstate Highway #93 has been secured at the intersection of #93 and 3-B just south of town and that necessary construction will be undertaken whenever traffic loads warrant it. Efforts to have "Ashland turnoffs" on #93 well marked with appropriate signs continue.

Early in 1963 at the request of a local business man, the Planning Board investigated the possibility to developing a local airstrip. Existing terrain features and the probable cost of the project ruled out serious consideration. But this is the sort of suggestion the Board is happy to receive at any time. Our objective is simply to make Ashland a better town in which to live. Your interest and suggestions can and will help us to acheive this objective. They are always welcome.

# Forest Fire Warden's Report

---

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience—a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump — it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

In accordance with the School Warrant as published and legally warned, the meeting was called to order by Moderator Thomas Pryor at 2:00 P. M. in the afternoon on March 13, 1963 at the Ashland School Auditorium-Gymnasium, and the Warrant was read.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Ashland School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

##### Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1962 and June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$5,684.11 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963.

##### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

##### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,831.60, less a revenue surplus of \$1,581.53, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$250.07.

(Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit F.

**Statement of School Lunch Account:** (Exhibit G)

A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the School Lunch Account for the fiscal year is shown in Exhibit G.

**Statement of Student Activity Accounts:** (Exhibit H)

A summarized statement of the Student Activity Accounts is included in Exhibit H.

**Statement of Bonded Debt:** (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

**Statement of School Tax Account:** (Exhibit J)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Ashland is presented in Exhibit J. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1963, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1962-63 School Tax, \$121,808.69, plus a prepayment of \$1,000.00 of the 1963-64 tax on account of a deficiency appropriation of this amount voted at the annual meeting in March 1963.

**Current Surplus:**

It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$13,434.04 to \$749.93, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, as shown herewith:

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

---

To the School and Citizens of Ashland:

I respectfully submit my ninth annual report as Superintendent of the Ashland School District.

## Staff

The schools opened in September of 1963 with seven new members on the staff. Six in the Junior-Senior High School and one in the Elementary School.

Mr. William H. Marston, a graduate of Plymouth State Teachers College, Principal of Bethlehem High this past year and former Assistant Principal and Teacher at Gorham High School, replaced Kent F. Bailey, who had served as Principal for three years, and accepted the position of Assistant Principal at Littleton High School, Littleton, Massachusetts.

Mrs. Erma T. Ahern, a graduate of Plymouth State Teachers College and a former Teacher in Bethlehem High and Portsmouth Junior High, replaced Mrs. Mary E. McKelsen who joined the staff at Franklin High School.

Mr. E. Ray Brown, a graduate of Indiana State Teachers College, replaced Melvyn D. Hale, Jr. Mr. Hale assumed the duties of Physical Education Director and Coach at Inter-Lakes High School.

Mr. Donald B. Stephenson, a graduate of Harvard University and who has done graduate study at Plymouth State College, was elected as Teacher of Mathematics in the Junior High replacing Mr. Donald F. Jacques. Mr. Jacques was shifted to the Social Studies area replacing William G. Andrews as he accepted a position in Amherst, N. H.

Mrs. Alice W. Sterling, a graduate of Ohio State University, was elected as the additional teacher in the English Department. Mrs. Sterling was formerly a teacher at Fryeburg Academy.

Mrs. Helen H. Flaherty, a graduate of Mount Holyoke College, was elected as teacher of Art on a two day per week basis.

Mrs. Lorraine G. Foster, a graduate of Plymouth State college and former teacher in Dover and Ashford, Connecticut, was assigned to Grade Four and Five.

## **Additions and Improvements**

The yard at the Vocational Building was graded and it is planned to oil the area this year.

Another section of chain link fence was installed at the rear of the Ober School completing the project.

A hot water line was installed in the Science Laboratory.

After school started it was found that it was just not possible to use the Cafeteria as a classroom for Art and other subjects, and as a result the room on the third floor of the Vocational Building was painted and opened as a classroom.

The Business Education Department was shifted to Room Zero in the basement of the High School and the former Business Education Room was made over as the Office for the Principal as the former space on the second floor was set up as the Guidance Office.

## **Regional School Study**

The past session of the legislature enacted many favorable changes in Cooperative School Law, and also set up legislation for area or regional schools to better serve the educational needs.

The School Board has placed an article in the warrant to permit the District to appoint a committee consisting of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the School Board.

The School Districts of Campton, Holderness, Plymouth, Rumney and Wentworth plan to have articles in their warrants for the appointment of committees. Under the new legislation the committees then form a Planning Board to study the advisability of establishing an area school or forming a Cooperative School District and submit their findings for action by the districts involved.

The school year 1962-63 noted the organization of a number of Cooperative School Districts namely: the Newfound Lakes area Cooperative at Bristol, the White Mountains Cooperative at Whitefield, the Mascoma Cooperative at Canaan, and the Governor Wentworth Cooperative at Wolfeboro.

The new Cooperative High School at Bristol encompasses the districts of New Hampton and Bridgewater, and so in the future Ashland High will no longer receive tuition students from these towns. There are only five tuition pupils

anticipated next September and these will be from Holder-ness.

### Costs

The property tax assessment for the school year 1963-64 is \$122,745.93 which is 59.34% of the total property tax assessment. Considering the state as a whole, an average of 57 percent of all local property taxes are earmarked for the support of schools, and one-half of all New Hampshire School Districts designate at least 65% of the property tax for school purposes. The school tax rate per \$1000 of assessed valuation in Ashland is 24.33% and the state average is 29.35%.

The cost per pupil in Ashland High School this past year was \$508.14, while the state average is \$449.00 per pupil. With the dual track program of College Preparatory and General Education Courses in a Comprehensive High School the course offerings are almost doubled and as a result the costs increase.

The larger high school in the vicinity of 400 pupils appears to be the answer to this problem as the costs in these schools are nearer and in many cases below the state average.

The per pupil costs for the elementary pupils in Ashland was \$246.82 and the State average is \$295.00. One of the reasons for the lower cost is that we are operating with more than 25-30 pupils per classroom.

### Conclusion

Again it is my pleasure to express my appreciation to the School Board and Teaching Staff and especially to the Principal for the fine cooperation and sincere devotion to their job.

I also wish to thank the P. T. A., Selectmen, Highway Department and Police for their continued help and cooperation.

The cooperation and team work is most appreciated and the education of your children is a direct result of the fine cooperation from all areas.

The Superintendent's salary for 1963-64 is \$10,500.00. The Supervisory Union's share is \$8,000.00 and the balance of \$2,500.00 is paid by the State, from the fund established by the per capita tax of \$2.00 for each resident pupil.

The new school year of 1963-64 began with split grades in grades 1 and 2 and in grades 4 and 5. This arrangement seems to work nicely at the primary level but recommendations for changes at the intermediate level are now under consideration. It was possible to departmentalize a social studies class in grade 5 and, although a larger class number has to be dealt with, seems to be creating a better academic

environment. It is hoped that more departmental work can be scheduled for grades 5 and 6 next year.

Due to the desire to re-evaluate our junior and senior high school curriculum towards strengthening certain phases of our offerings, it is also necessary to re-evaluate the elementary curriculum.

A new modern math series published by the Britanica Publishers is being conducted on a trial basis in grade two. It is possible that before the end of the current school year a modern math special consultant will conduct a workshop for all elementary teachers. It is imperative that we know as much as possible about these new programs coming into the field.

It is also our desire to survey the educational publishing field for the most desirable academic materials for our elementary classes. It is deemed educationally sound, and necessary, that more emphasis be placed on course transition from one grade to the next. All teachers are preparing a subject matter syllabus for each grade. With these outlines it will then be easier for us to evaluate the effectiveness of class and grade preparation and instruction.

It is now possible to schedule one physical education period per week for each of the grades one through six. Grades seven and eight have regularly scheduled physical education classes once per week. Special art instruction is being offered in grades five and six and special music and reading instruction is being offered all grades one through six.

With such diversity of subjects a problem involving space has naturally evolved. Every room is utilized most



every period of the day. Most of the classes are small and this tends to improve the classroom academic environment. However, any possible projected enrollment is going to create problems that we cannot physically overcome.

Our science program is initiating two new approaches to already existing courses. In biology we are teaching the new B. S. C. S. Yellow Version. This approach places more emphasis on learning via the inquiry method. More practical lab work is essential in this approach. A similar method of approach is being tried with P. S. S. C. physics. It is hoped that we can try a similar tact in relation to chemistry another year. There are several good chemistry programs now available.

In correlating our physics program with good supplementary materials, several trips to Dartmouth College physics lectures and demonstrations have taken place with more to follow before June.

In math we are currently evaluating the feasibility of developing a math tract that will allow our more advanced math students to take accelerated courses in their senior year. We currently have several students taking a programmed algebra course, published by Britanica Publishers, as a supplement to their regular math courses.

In our English classes three out of four entries in the State Forensic Tournament, held at the University of New Hampshire, have placed in the finals to be held in March.

A group of 15 Contemporary Problems students went to the United Nations last Fall as a supplement to their regular class work. It is hoped that next year we can add another course in social studies as is recommended by the State Department of Education. This course would be entitled "Modern Eurasian History - From 1850." This would allow us an added elective for those students interested in the social studies area.

It is also our plan to revise our junior high school science program in an attempt to more properly challenge and prepare our better students for the new approaches to science at the secondary level. It is thought necessary to introduce an earth science course at the 7-A level to replace general science. This would be followed by a physical science course at 8-A level. It is hoped that if this plan is adopted our college preparatory students will be better prepared for the accelerated secondary science courses.

Our newly formed Guidance Department has been running extremely well. The services that our guidance personnel offer our youngsters is varied and up-to-date. Individual

guidance is available to all students in grades seven through twelve. The testing program that we offer at Ashland is set up to serve the needs of our student body. The New Hampshire State-wide Grade Eight Testing Program is offered. The Metropolitan Achievement Tests (Advanced Battery) are given. The Otis Quick Scoring Tests are available at certain levels. We administer the New Hampshire State-wide Grade Ten Testing Program each year. We also make available the School and College Ability Tests. Each teacher has available the individual standardized tests for each of their respective classes. It is hoped that our Guidance Department can be further enlarged as a result of requesting N. D. E. A. funds. If we qualify for this financial help we can do even more for our young people in this vital area.

Opportunities for students to participate in boys and girls basketball, cross-country, baseball, band, glee club, dramatics, cheerleading and majorettes are available.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the superintendent of schools, the school board, teachers, townspeople and students for their wonderful cooperation and helpfulness in making this year a successful one.

The Music Department again is proud to announce a growth in all activities. This growth can be attributed to the cooperation of students, administrators and parents. Without this type of cooperative aid, our students would not have been able to develop the sense of growth which is necessary in such a program.

Presently the Music Department encompasses a chorus of thirty singers; Band of twenty-seven instrumentalists; Fine Arts Course for high school students only; Junior Instrumental Program for elementary students, and General Music Program for all 7th and 8th grade students.

The Ashland Band has grown by seven musicians over last years twenty members. Through graduation we lost two members but gained a total of nine new members to the ranks. Presently the Band is preparing for the Spring Concert which is hoped will be an Exchange Program.

The Ashland Glee Club of thirty singers made its first and successful attempt in a complete sacred Cantata work during the Christmas Program this year and is now rehearsing for a Lakes Region Choral Festival which is programmed for the month of April or May to be held in Laconia with the combined efforts of the surrounding communities. The chorus will also make their annual appearance at the Spring Program. The music performed by the chorus is a variety of sacred and secular compositions.

Even with the enlargement of these activities there still exists a need of concentration in each to meet the needs of each student.

Our sincere appreciation is extended to all parents and administrators for their assistance in making our programs successful and certainly trust this growth will be constant in each growing year.
