DISTRICT NO. 1, FIRST GRADE.

This school was divided into three terms; twenty-six weeks in all. Here, the most advanced scholars of our district attended. The teacher was well qualified, and indefatigable in her efforts. The students, with a few exceptions, were faithful, and attentive, exhibiting good progress.

The opportunities our scholars might have in this grade, are not fully appreciated by our citizens; we have employed faithful and experienced teachers, who have devoted all their time to the advanced classes.

There should be something done for a better school room, and it would be better furnished.

DISTRICT NO. 1, SECOND GRADE.

Here also, we have had twenty-six weeks divided into three terms. The scholars are the middle classes, the same teacher has been employed each term, who has been thoroughly in earnest all the time, and the pupils have been well managed, and instructed. In this grade the scholars have to be held with a tighter rein, and experience and energy in the teacher are necessary to the best management of them. All of which we have had this year.

DISTRICT NO. 1, THIRD GRADE.

We had three terms in this grade, comprising in all twenty-six weeks. This is our Primary department, and this year, our little ones have had the best training I have ever seen. Every moment they have been busy, anxious for the next exercise, and ready to do their best. They have had frequent recesses, and the training has been of so varied a character as to exercise both mentally and physically. All this, without making the little one at all weary. With a good teacher, and proper rooms and surrounding, our children will receive the best ideas, and the best effects of the exercise of the whole body, for future mental, and bodily strength and vigor.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

This school has had two terms. The first was short. It was well set up, but I cannot report its progress as it closed without my knowledge. The second term was also, well started, and the scholars gave evidence of good training in their progress and deportment.

DISTRICT NO. 3

This is a union school with Holderness. We have but few scholars here, but their chance has been excellent. The school house is pleasant, and in a pleasant place, and the people of the district are able to furnish good and experienced teachers. The pupils have been kind and attentive, thus enabling the teacher to show in their good progress in studies and deportment.

DISTRICTS NO. 4 and 5.

Here, there has been but one term, this year, that, being taught by the same person employed last year. She is well qualified and faithful in every respect. The scholars have manifested a laudable desire to learn, and the teacher deserves much praise for her success.

DISTRICT NO 6.

This is a union school with New Hampton and Centre Harbor, in which our town has only five scholars. There has been but one term. The scholars have been well instructed, and show good improvement for the time, the term being only nine weeks.

GENERAL REMARKS.

I have often urged upon our citizens, the very faulty condition of our schools; the want of proper school-rooms, and especially the lack of almost any real interest in the whole matter by the whole people. The law obliges the Selectmen to raise on our inventory, a certain amount of tax for schools; and the literary fund is distributed among the districts; but above this, we never raise more money, or appropriate even the Rail-road tax for educational purposes. Now when all will allow, that the education of our children is of vast importance, and has to do with their character and standing in all future life, how important that all good measurers should be adopted to secure a proper and thorough education.

When we will provide as good accommodations as Meredith and Bristol have, we shall thrive, while in our present condition we are retrograding.

Please make these matters the subject of your thoughts.
