# A Victory for Health Officers

# Local Control Prevails! HB 1479 Indefinitely Postponed

In a stunning victory <u>for</u> local control and local government, the House defeated <u>HB 1479</u>, the anti-lobbying bill that would have criminalized YOUR speech, on a 211-129 vote. That defeat would <u>not</u> have been possible without YOUR advocacy.

What's more impressive is that a majority of the House determined that a <u>tabling</u> motion was not enough. The dispositional motion – Indefinitely Postpone – made it crystal clear that local control matters.

In NHMA's records of legislative testimony stretching back to the early 1980s, there is no bill that we have a record of that generated more outcry from local officials than this bill. We have not had any other bill in recent memory where so many local officials from across the state volunteered to come hand out information to legislators walking into the House chamber as **HB 1479**. Thank you for your advocacy.



Thirteen independent regional public health networks (RPHNs) are funded by DHHS to identify regional public health priorities and help coordinate public health efforts.

Each RPHN is made up of leaders from multiple public health initiatives and services, as well as others involved in public health, including health departments, health care providers, social service agencies, schools, fire, police, emergency medical services, media and advocacy groups, behavioral health, and leaders in the business, government, and faith communities. Every RPHN has a Public Health Advisory Council (PHAC) that develops a regional Community Health Improvement Plan, which outlines health goals and objectives for the region. The PHAC then helps coordinate groups working to meet those goals.

## **NH Division of Public Health Services**

The NH DPHS Health Officer Liaison Program is very excited to welcome our newest part-time staff member, Joanne Cotton! In addition to our exciting staffing update, the program is also introducing a new format for the Health Officer Manual Chapters. This change provides documents that are easier to navigate, simpler to read, and more engaging to review. You can find our first versions of the format here: <u>Mold and Moisture</u> and <u>Role of the Local Health Officer</u>.

Finally, as a reminder, the new section of the lead statute, RSA 130-A, A:5-d, Sale and Rental of Property, will go into effect July 1, 2024. All pre-1978 properties being converted into rental housing as well as newly licensed child care facilities will be required to have a lead safe certificate prior to occupancy.

### The NEW Health Officer 101 Training Portal has arrived!

As you are aware, RSA 128 requires that all local health officers take a required training course that provides an overview of your authority and duties under State law. Health officers are required to take this course upon their initial appointment and every 3 years after that (every new or renewed appointment). The course is entitled "*Introduction to the Duties and Responsibilities of the Local Health Officers*", and is currently provided by NH DPHS on its virtual platform only (no in-person offerings).

We are very excited to announce the launch of a newly updated version of the required course. This course features updated information in an interactive and newly designed format.

### For those of you who HAVE taken the course within the past 3 years

There is no further action from you at the moment.

### For CITY health officers:

You are not required to take this course, although you may if you would like the training opportunity.

### A few important things to note when using the Cornerstone Learning Management Platform:

- 1. When you log into the site, your Username is the email address you entered in the registration process
- 2. This course works best when taken on a computer as opposed to a tablet or phone (google chrome is the preferred browser).
- 3. This training is "on-demand", meaning that you can save your work and return to the course at a later time.
- 4. At the conclusion of the training, you will be able to download a copy of your certificate of completion.
- 5. If you need technical support, please let me know.
- 6. The modules of this course open in separate pages. Check your popup blocker if the course content isn't loading for you.

#### The Communication and Marketing Subcommittee - Working to Improve Communication

The Communication and Marketing Subcommittee, chaired by Liam Ehrenzweig, has been busy working on ways to improve communication between the membership and the board of directors. #### The NHHOA Data Committee

The NHHOA Data Committee has been working with the DPHS Health Officer Liaison Unit and Caitlin McMonagle, UNH Masters Student, on a Health Officer Case Tracker data capturing tool. Caitlin worked to develop a data tracking tool utilizing google forms to capture health officer case data entry, an associated database, and a dashboard to visualize an array of data "at-a-glance." There were several health officers who volunteered to beta test the data tracker and provide feedback on the system. Version 1 on the data tracker is now complete and the NHHOA will be able to share the data tracking tool to any health officer who wishes to have their own municipal data tracker tool. More information on how to request your own copy of the data tracking tool will be available in the coming weeks. Stay tuned!

#### Legislative Committee Update

One of the activities of the NHHOA is to track legislative activity that impacts our field. A number of bills are introduced each year that deal with Health Officer issues. Over the years this has included our enforcement authority as well as changes to the laws and rules on septic systems, food regulation and so on. The NHHOA has formed a committee to track and inform our membership about these types of bills. This year we tracked several bills that were of interest:

House Bill 531 was amended to allow communities to conduct background checks of Health Officers. Senate Bill 63 amended RSA 147:1 to change the language regarding the adoption of Health Ordinances. HB 1479 attempted to prohibit local officials from any form of advocacy and was defeated.

NHHOA DATA COLLECTION TOOL







"The NH Health Officer Association in partnership with the NH DPHS Health Officer Liaison Program has had the exciting opportunity to work with a UNH Masters of Public Health Student to develop a data collection tool health officers can utilize to track their workloads and monitor their inspections/complaints. In addition, it has the capacity to produce simple graphs and statistics you can share with municipal leadership about your workloads. While we are still in the piloting phase, every health officer in the State is able to receive a free version of this tool to use in your work. # IMPORTANT UPDATE ON LEAD

The DHHS Healthy Homes and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (HHLPPP) would like to bring to your attention a section of New Hampshire's Lead Paint Poisoning Prevention and Control law that will be going into effect July 1, 2024.

## 130-A:5-d Sale and Rental of Property. -

After July 1, 2024, the following shall require certification of lead safety pursuant to this chapter prior to being used as either a residential rental unit or as a day care facility: I. Newly-constructed rental units within buildings erected prior to January 1, 1978. For the purposes of this section "newly-constructed rental units" means rental units being converted from a use other than residential rental housing.

II. Newly-licensed day care facilities within buildings erected prior to January 1, 1978.

This section of NH's Lead law was passed April 9, 2018 however, will just begin to go into effect this summer.

### What does this mean for health officers?

All pre-1978 properties in your town being converted into rental housing will be required to have a lead safe certificate prior to occupancy. The Department of Health & Human Services, Healthy Homes and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (HHLPPP) will be looking to town health officers and building code officials to help educate property owners and notify us of properties so that we can help property owners achieve compliance and ensure any new rental housing being offered is lead-safe.

This law does not require those rental properties already in existence to have a lead-safe certificate however, it would require any pre-1978 building that had not previously been used for this purpose to have a lead safe certificate prior to rental. So not only would this include properties such as mill buildings or other large buildings being converted into rentals it also would require those properties that might have previously been single family owner-occupied homes that are being converted into multi-unit rentals or single family homes that used to be owner-occupied that the owner has decided to put on the rental market to have a certificate of lead safe.

The same goes for childcare facilities. The law does not require currently licensed childcare facilities to obtain a lead safe certificate but, would require any newly licensed childcare facilities opening in a building built prior to 1978 to have a lead safe certificate prior.

In the next few months The HHLPPP will be conducting education sessions to educate on the new law, answer any questions, and help identify ways to work together to identify those properties and property owners in your town that this law would effect.
